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A THOUGHT TO REMEMBER

Following custom, after the Veteran's Day Parade in the City of Albany there is a luncheon to honor the Gold Star Mothers. This year it took place at the DeWitt Clinton Hotel. Past Department American Legion Commander Edward J. Delehanty of Albany served as master of ceremonies. The guest speaker for the occasion was Assemblyman Fred Field, Jr. What he said had such historical significance that it deserves to be recorded publicly. Your 1040 Times for the Good of the Legion is privileged to be the publication, through you, to bring this speech to all who will read it and absorb its content. Here it is:

Ladies and Gentlemen:

This is the first year we are celebrating Veteran's Day in October, but the meaning is just as important as ever. We come here today to salute those men and women who took time out of their lives to serve our country. In some cases, they made the supreme sacrifice of life itself.

Not everyone serves his nation in exactly the same way. These men and women were very personally involved in protecting your life and mine. We owe them, at the very least, the gratitude we show today.

While some people dedicate their lives to a military career, no one really wants a war. Because one war is more popular than another is not the point. All wars, even the most totally supported one, mean hardships and death. The veterans we honor today didn't pick their war. They happened to be born at a particular time in history, and fate gave them a challenge and responsibility they might not have wanted by choice. The important point is they accepted this responsibility despite inconveniences and interruptions to their personal lives. Even if their service did not include actual combat—they still gave up their time. They did this because they believed in a free world and a free America. Or, to put it another way, they believed in the future. They believed in everyone of us here today—even though they may never have known us personally.

To stake your life for people you do not actually know is not an easy thing to do. But this is what Veteran's Day celebrates—this very dedication to a faith in the future, a faith in the unborn generations of free men everywhere!

Is there any way we can ever repay these men and women for their gift to their country? Is there any way, for example, that we can return the gift of life? Here in this audience are Gold Star Mothers who gave their sons to America. How can we ever repay them? A life is so unique and so sacred that it can never

be exchanged or replaced. No person, really can ever take another person's place.

The truth is, ladies and gentlemen, we can never directly repay any veteran, living or dead, for what he has done for his country. Nor can we be so bold to suggest that we can ever repay his family. For time, once gone, never returns, to say nothing of life! How, then, can we possibly make some dent of return to these "Accounts Receivable"—the time and talents and lives given so freely and fully by American Veterans? We owe so much to so many with so little way of return!

The only way we can truly show our gratitude is by living out our lives with a sense of purpose—the sense of purpose necessary to make a valid contribution to democracy.

For, ladies and gentlemen, these men and women took an oath of office to protect free citizens in a free land. They did this believing that we were worth their time and effort. And so I ask you today, to repay them by being responsible citizens.

We cannot hope to return their time or their life directly. That is impossible. But for that matter, rarely can we directly return all the various good deeds that people do for us. We can, however, do something for someone else — and in the broad view of humanity we achieve a sort of equity.

Look today at America. A local newspaper has recently run a contest on "What Is Right With America." We would do well to think about this. What is right? Freedom for one thing... freedom to stand here in an assembly without fear of secret police or censorship. Freedom to earn a livelihood, to compete, to follow our own consciences. Freedom to work together to solve problems we know we have.

We take this freedom so completely for granted that we sometimes forget how very fortunate we are.

Last summer a friend of mine visited West Germany. One day he and his wife went close to the border that divides the Western Zone from the East. All around them were the beautiful Hartz Mountains. The pines and spruce trees might have been in our own Adirondack Mountains. The air was crisp and clear. But then suddenly a burst of machine gun fire brought them back to harsh reality. The border guards were practicing! A little ways down the road, they saw row on row of barbed wire. If they were quiet, they could hear the low growls of German police dogs. If they looked up, they saw the watch towers where searchlights at night would seek out people escaping to the West. This was no television "make believe," ladies and gentlemen . . . this was the West and East German border in the summer of 1971! I'm sure some of you have had personal experiences similar to that of my friends. They were shocked and horrified almost beyond belief that in the same world that we live in

this sort of thing still went on ... only about

seven jet hours away.

I tell you this only to illustrate how wonderful an experience it is to live in a free land. I know that we have much to work toward in America. No society is perfect. But I also know we have much to be grateful for. And our gratitude must go in a large part to the men and women who served in our nation's Armed

By celebrating Veteran's Day in October, we are remembering our men and women in a particularly beautiful month of the year. The harvest is in. The trees have turned to gold and scarlet. The world seems at peace in the final glory of fall. This month and this day symbolizes a grateful nation.

Some years ago, these men and women left their homes and gave us part-or all-of their

lives for this country.

Sure, we can say "thank you" to them, but it will be an empty phrase if we do not follow through by living purposeful lives. This is the only real way we can truly thank them.

What do I mean by a life with purpose? I mean a respect for other men and women that recognizes the dignity of every human being. I mean a code of absolute honesty that respects property of other people-whether it's a penny or thousands of dollars. I mean a dedication to do your daily job in the best way you know how. I mean a determined effort to be decent to other people, to be human toward others.

In short, I mean living up to the Golden Rule-do to others as you would want them to do to you. If everyone did this, we certainly would have a better America. We would have a city and a state and a nation which our Veterans could honestly feel was worth their time

and their life.

We cannot do every other person's job-but we certainly can resolve to do our own and do it well. We can resolve to live a life that we are proud of ... that our country can be proud of ... and that the men who died for us can

regard with respect.

Ladies and gentlemen, you know and I know that there are only two events in life that we all have in common with one another. One event is that we were born-the other is that some day each of us must die. In between we have a responsibility to live the best life we can.
