

EDITORIAL

THE INTELLIGENCE PROBES

After nine months of Congressional digging into the secrets of America's intelligence operations, we must wonder what national purpose remains to be served. Damage to our image has been severe. A lessening of public support and understanding of the intelligence function is daily more evident. In combination, both have resulted in an incalcucable cost to national security interests.

It is said that already the files accumulated by the Senate are larger than in any single investigation previously conducted by that body. The committee under Senator Church employs a staff of over 100 and Representative Pike's committee more than 40. This extraordinary expenditure of time and money will have been well spent if the investigations are totally objective—designed to determine what malpractices may exist. But it is also vital that revelations and findings not be based on caprice nor political motivations. The question each person involved in the process must ask himself, over and over, is "How should I handle this in the best interest if my country—today and, more importantly, for the future?"
