BLOOD—BETTER TO GIVE THAN RECEIVE

Comdr. Greenwood reports that last month's call was very gratifying. The Blood Bank is scheduled to give Blanchard Post an accounting which was not received in time for this issue. Post records, however, show that of the 27 who offered to donate blood and were phoned to set a date for their donation, 18 agreed to go to the Bank at Albany Hospital. Of these we know of some who have fulfilled their commitments, others who required postponements or cancellations. Our account in the Bank as of December 31 was seven donor credits.

You should know that our list is not adequate to raise the Post's Blood Bank account to a satisfactory level of from 50 to 100 credits. To do this we need more names from which to get donors and the names an include Legionnaire's family mempers—or anyone who wishes to contribute to this cause. You are urged to do your part in this program on which some day you may have to call for help.
