AMERICANISM REPORT

To Albany County Committee, Dept. of New York, American Legion

- 1. From William Wilson of Sullivan County we learn he, after several years as Third District Americanism Chairman, has been succeeded by Arthur Johnson of Valatie, N. Y., Columbia County, from whom to date I have had no communication.
- 2. Neither have I had any response from Dept. Chairman Ed Lee of New York City to whom I wrote on Nov. 11 suggesting his committee arrange for a meeting during the Legislative Conference next month with the N. Y. State Commissioner of Education and representatives from the N. Y. State Legislative Committees concerned with education to discuss the atmosphere in the classrooms of the public schools relating to the display of the American Flag, the Pledge of Allegiance and related topics.
- 3. The minutes of our County Meetings of last year should show a motion was made and approved for the County Meetings to be started with a Pledge to the Flag. It is not being done. If we are to set an example of what we preach we should proudly assert ourselves via this symbolic ceremony.
- 4. It is especially significant that we think about the Pledge of Allegiance when we hear situations such as the recently reported Detroit, Michigan newly elected judge, a self-asserted Marxist, who refused to stand for the Pledge at official swearing-in ceremonies, and of a

condition here in Albany County where at a high school there is at least one classroom which has 30-plus students of which more than half, and at times 95% do not participate in the ceremony. The teacher of this class in which there are reputedly some self-styled communists, is reported to disregard the snide remarks, the miswording and similar behavior during the recitation of the Pledge by those inclined to such actions. This is brought to your attention to alert you to conditions about which you may not be aware. From it we should hear the alarm, "Wake up, America!" And remember, you are America.

- 5. In the current TV season there is a program on the NBC network available to us over Channel 6 on alternate Tuesday nights at 10 p.m., which, to me and others with whom I discussed it, merits commendations. It is titled "America." Written and narrated by Alistair Cook. an English-born naturalized American, the program offers an exciting documentary on the origin, the background and growth of our Nation. It would appear to be for the Good of the American Legion for a resolution, to be initiated at a Post level, calling on the National Convention of our organization to make a formal commendation to those responsible for this splendid presentation.
- 6. Last May 27 in a supermarket in this county I witnessed the American

Flag hung on a wall in front of which was a mound of oranges partially covering the bottom portion of the Flag. To me it was an improper display of the Flag and I brought it to the attention of the store manager who, after I complained that the manner in which the Flag was displayed made it appear it was being used for advertising he, with some reluctance, removed the Flag from the wall. Subsequently, I sent a letter to the store's owner expressing by appreciation of their manager's responding to my complaint.

- 7. More recently, last week in fact, I found another occasion to call on a store manager to correct the situation where the American Flag was improperly displayed. It was a mall store which has branches in several eastern states. This time the Flag, on a short staff, crossed with that of a non-American Flag, was crossed in the direction opposite from that prescribed. I'm waiting the results of my call.
- 8. Also, I'm waiting for results for my calls on a Post in the County to whom I made two referrals. One has to do with a Flag that is worn and faded and publicly displayed. The other concerns a situation in a private school where, it was reported to me, those in charge of the institution removed the Flag from a position of prominence. For the corrective action it was suggested the Post in whose area the school is located offer to donate a Flag of adequate

IT HAPPENED

"Can you imagine a school teacher's being fired for daring to issue the mildest possible criticism of Communist Angela Davis?

"Incredible as it may seem, that is exactly what occurred a short while back at a junior high school in the Bronx, New York. According to researchers at the anti-Communist Cardinal Mindszenty Foundation, a social studies teacher at this school had asked his students to write an essay about someone they admired. One student responded by offering a statement in behalf of Angela Davis, asserting that 'monuments should be built' in behalf of Miss Davis, who is of course a self-avowed Communist.

"The teacher, William Burke, gave the student a B plus for the composition, but wrote in the margin that in the future he hoped that the student would find 'someone else, black or white' to admire. His audacity in making this suggestion provoked a furore in the Communist Party press, brought pressure on the school where Burke taught and, finally, led to his dismissal.

"The Communist *Daily World* jumped on the incident and ran a story entitled, 'A Child Teaches a Racist Teacher.' A committee including a Black Panther leader, the student's mother, and staff employees of government-funded poverty projects descended on the school and demanded that the principal fire teacher Burke. The principal said he lacked the authority to discharge the teacher.

"Five days later, however, the Daily World reported that Dr. Felton Lewis, Superintendent of District No. 12 of the Bronx school system announced yesterday that William Burke, seventh grade teacher at J.H.S. No. 98, in the Bronx, 'is no longer with us.' The Daily World headed the story: 'Bronx Racist Teacher Ousted for Vilifying Angela Davis.' The paper proudly noted that 'the story first broke in the pages of the Daily World.'

"So there is a taste of newfangled civil liberties in action—teacher harassed and ousted from his job for daring to suggest that an American school child have more appropriate heroes than acknowledged Communists! The irony deepened by the fact that the persecution of this teacher was aided by employees of government programs—working in tandem with the publicity apparatus of the U.S. Communist Party."

9. A month ago there were strong signs from both sides of the Vietnam conflict to suggest a settlement was in sight. At its height it will be recalled the President's emissary ended his sessions with his counterpart from North Vietnam with smiles and a handshake. Then the picture changed. Events occurred which brought an acceleration of American bombing of North Vietnam. With this renewed bombing the anti-war activists revved up their machinery. Their actions, we are all aware, get the space and time in the news media. They would have the world believe that America is all to blame for what is happening in Southeast China. More directly they blame only the American President for this unhappy turn of events. About eight years ago, you will recall, the American President was getting endorsements for what he was doing about Vietnam. The situation in that respect hasn't much changed except today there is very little heard of endorsing the presidential actions concerning Vietnam. It would be in the interest of Americanism for American Legionnaires as individuals, or as a Post activity, to send messages of encouragement to the President for his position and actions in trying to ensure
