# WE INTEND TO BE COUNTED AGAIN

The Preamble to the Constitution of The American Legion is a statement of the basic principles of our organization, one of which is an obligation to our community, state and nation. This obligation is the most important ingredient in the foundation on which the structure of the Legion rests. We would render this obligation meaningless if we failed to become involved in current happenings in our community because of lethargy or timidity. We know, of course, that the 55-year history of the Legion is one of courage and forthrightness, and that timidity and lethargy are no more a part of today's Legion than they were in the past. The Legion is strong and virile and will continue to be heard from and be a potent force for enlightened, forward looking and patriotic Americanism. In that context the members of the Legion are ever ready to stand up and be counted when the time comes to take a position on an issue. Hence, the reason for this article.

When a viciously ignorant attack is made on our beloved country and is aired for public viewing in our local high school paper we would be remiss if we failed to respond.

The January 18, 1974 issue of the Bethlehem Star (student newspaper of Bethlehem Central High School), published such an article, written by a staff member of that paper, and given a position of prominence on page one. The article is entitled "America" and describes one adolescent's feelings about his country. Since we feel that the current sickness that it spotlights should be given greater exposure we are reproducing it below for our readers, some of whom would not have seen it. Read it and make your own judgment.

### AMERICA

"This Delmarian thinks it is time to put America in its place as one of the most selfish and devious countries in the world. As long as 10 years ago when I first started reading newspapers. I learned of political corruption and graft of useless wars and inflation—brought about by U.S. government.

"Vietnam, Germany, and to a lesser extent, Japan and Korea were bombed, ripped apart, and in many areas almost completely demolished. Whom do they have to thank for this? Their good friends the Americans.

"When the Vietnamese people were hunger-ridden, the U.S. made sure many thousands of Vietnamese died from starvation by blocking the ports of Vietnam. Also when the South Vietnam economy was in danger of collapsing it was the U.S. who made sure it did. And our reward from them for letting us ruin their economy was to let us demolish and ruin half their country.

"Here at home when famine invades Appalachia there is no help for these poor souls; instead we're sending men to the moon, not once, but twice, three times, four times...

"Let's hear it! What other country in the world can build a plane that can pollute as well as ours! You talk about Japanese technocracy and you get clean, efficient industry. You talk about German technocracy and you get well-made cars. You talk about American technocracy and you get large smoke-belching factories spewing out large amounts of pol-

lution. You talk about scandals and we've got plenty of them. Watergate being the most siginificant of these. And do we try to get it out in the open? NO! If it wasn't for a few hard working newspapermen we still wouldn't know about Watergate. The list of scandals goes on—the Agnew affair, ITT, Nixon tapes—where will it end?

"And even the draft dodgers aren't allowed back into our country. Yes, men who wouldn't kill are treated like common criminals. They may never see their families again because the U.S. will not let them back into our country.

"And now we have an energy crisis. Is it real? We don't know because we no longer have confidence in our country. Now as I close I read about the rise in the cost of living here in the good old United States of America."

As a matter of community interest the above article was discussed at our Post meeting of January 21, at which time there was general agreement, and rightfully so, that this was a perfectly valid exercise in free speech and freedom of the press. However, since the tone of this article clearly establishes it as more than just the time-honored schoolboy "high-jinks" or attention-getting shooting off of the mouth, we feel it incumbent to comment although in a more rational, mature and civilized manner than the author saw fit to employ, or was capable of employing.

It is a sickening experience to see young Americans grow to adulthood so ignorant of the history and heritage that have guaranteed them a freedom second to none in the world. The response to this poor soul, and to all similar poor souls wherever they may be, should be a charitable one of pity, not of anger or recrimination. We have here a sickness spawned by a philosophy dispensed by academic communities throughout the nation, a philosophy of doom, despair, cynicism and negativeism, a philosophy that has been primarily instrumental in shaping the truly ugly American, uneducated, uninformed and unhappy. To the everlasting credit of our young people this prototype represents a small minority of our total youth population.

The arrogant purveyors of this philosophy, which has as its core thesis the "rottenness" of this country and is dedicated to the age-old tactic of rule or ruin, have substituted articulateness, bluster and ignorance for knowledge, reason and truth. As the ancient adage tells us, there is a time for everything, and the time is now to stand and be counted.

Thus we are again being counted in expressing our continued and strong concerns for the welfare of the youth of our community, state and nation. False prophets have arisen before in our time to threaten the liberties and freedom of this nation and of the world and have been consigned to oblivion by our response and the response of other free men around the globe. The foundations of the Republic will not be toppled by ignorance alone but all of us have lived during a time when devastation and horror have been visited upon our planet by dictators of various hues preaching the "big lie." You can believe that it works—
