The purpose of these studies is to enlighten us with regard to conditions, customs, needs and accomplishments of other nations sometimes little known to the majority of the people in our prosperous and fortunate U.S.A. The American Legion Auxiliary CARE program for 1964 seeks to provide one hundred water pumps for Ecuadorian communities, the pumps and accessories to cost \$125.00 per unit. The situation resulting from the lack of pure water in villages and communities in rural Ecuador is deplorable, bringing disaster to human beings, livestock and crops alike. Diseases caused by contaminated water claim many lives each year. "Pennies for Pumps for Pan America" is the slogan adopted by the Auxiliary for this worthy program.

With spring just around the corner, Ruth Jorgensen, Poppy chairman, will

be ordering the 2,600 Poppies voted for in January. Many volunteers are needed in order to make this annual project the grand success we want it to be. Ruth will appreciate all the help she can muster, so let's keep it in mind and plan to set aside a little time to help when she needs us in May.

Also, have you been remembering to clip coupons for June Wilcox but forgetting to give them to her? Whatever you have on hand, please bring along to the next meeting or give June a call so they can be picked up (HE 9-4732). It is amazing what the Department accomplishes each year through this coupon program.
