The announcement from Washington last month that the Albany regional Veterans' Administration Office was among those and some VA Hospitals to be closed has brought a storm of protest. The nearest hospital to be closed is at Tupper Lake. Its closing would certainly mean a heavier workload for the Albany VA Hospital.

The American Legion is on record as opposing the shut-downs of these federal facilities for veterans. Congressman O'Brien has expressed his concern about the matter. The closing-out is still subject to congressional action.

In this connection, the National and Department Commanders of the Amer-

ican Legion call upon all members of the Legion to express themselves on the issue.

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STRONG ROOTS

The following excerpts from the "Christopher News Notes" is offered as a reminder lest we forget:

Any attempt to eliminate the Declaration of Independence would bring indignant protests from tens of millions.

But the Declaration may become a "dead letter" if too many people forget or ignore its basic truth: *that each person derives his rights from God and a chief purpose of government is to protect those rights.*

FACTS TO BE FACED:

■ Few Americans have ever read the Declaration — only 1321 words long — even though it explicitly sets forth the principles that are the cornerstone of our nation's freedom.

■ Fewer, still, appreciate that without the Declaration, which strongly affirms the divine origin of human rights, the Constitution and Bill of Rights lack a clear, profound basis.

■ It is up to you to help reverse this dangerous trend — to make facts like these known in your home, church, classroom, shop, office, organization:

THE DECLARATION MAKES FOUR REFERENCES TO GOD

When our Founding Fathers drew up and adopted a Declaration of Independence in 1776, they made it unmistakably clear that God is the very foundation of the freedom of "all men." They deliberately included in the Declaration 4 significant references to Him—2 at the beginning and 2 at the end.

The task of writing it fell to Thomas Jefferson, only 33 at the time, whose draft was slightly revised by the other members of the Committee: John Adams, Benjamin Franklin, Robert Livingston and Roger Sherman. Then they submitted the Declaration to the Continental Congress.

1: THE LAWS OF NATURE AND OF NATURE'S GOD

These words in the first sentence are the only reference to God in Jefferson's

draft. Far from claiming that freedom is founded on caprice or naked force, he stressed that basic human rights are rooted in "the Laws of Nature" and more precisely in "Nature's God."

2: ENDOWED BY THEIR CREATOR WITH CERTAIN UNALIENABLE RIGHTS

Before the draft of the Declaration was submitted to Congress for approval, the Committee inserted in the second sentence another specific reference to God... Congress passed it in this form:

"We hold these truths to be self-evident, that all men are created equal, that they are endowed by their Creator with certain unalienable Rights, that among these are Life, Liberty and the pursuit of Happiness..."

3: APPEALING TO THE SUPREME JUDGE OF THE WORLD

The members of Congress then took it upon themselves to add 2 more references to God, thereby going on record before the world that they turned to divine authority to justify their forthright action. Here is the first phrase they added:

"We, therefore, the Representatives of the United States of America, in General Congress, assembled, appealing to the Supreme Judge of the world for the rectitude of our intentions..."

4: WITH A FIRM RELIANCE ON THE PROTECTION OF DIVINE PROVIDENCE

In the closing sentence of the Declaration, Congress made one last profession of trust in God in these compelling words:

"And for the support of this Declaration, with a firm reliance on the protection of divine Providence, we mutually pledge to each other our Lives, our Fortunes and our sacred Honor."

SEE THAT THE DECLARATION IS TAUGHT IN THE CLASSROOM

Under existing laws, the whole story of the Declaration not only can be taught in all schools, *but should be.* Every student has a right to have it taught and explained to him as part of his national heritage.
