In this era of abbreviations and initials these four letters have a tremendous meaning for a comparatively few and no meaning for a great many for whom it should have.

Harold Barkhuff at the mid-March Post meeting gave us a strong interpretation of the meaning of VAVS when he said "Last year I was a patient at the VA Hospital. Then I really learned what a great program the VAVS is."

Spelled out, for those who don't know, VAVS means Veterans Administration Voluntary Service. It comprises a group of warm-hearted men and women who volunteer their time and effort to lighten the darkened periods our one-time comrade-in-arms are confined to, in the Veterans Hospital.

Harold is the American Legion's National representative to the Albany Veteran's Hospital for this activity. He was appointed to the committee for this purpose four years ago. He tells us there is "a crying need for volunteers" for this program. To fill this need, this month there will be a two-evenings indoctrination course, from 7:30 p.m. to about 10 p.m. on Wednesday, April 20 and 27.

The program is not limited to Legionnaires, nor to men. You can do your part in this merciful cause by giving of your own time — or by encouraging your spouse or other members of your family to answer the call for helping in the recreational efforts at the VA Hospital.
