REINOW TO BE P.C. DINNER SPEAKER

This year's Past Commanders Dinner takes place at the Post Hall on April 20. Past Commander Alexander J. Woehrle is dinner chairman. Highlight of the program will be a talk by Robert Reinow a member of Blanchard Post who is also a professor of government at Albany State College of Education and an author of educational textbooks and magazine articles. He has been a contributor to the American Legion Magazine on numerous occasions. Last year he was Grand Marshal of Blanchard Post's Memorial Day Parade.

QUESTION ON DUES

In view of the recent increases in the assessment by National Headquarters, Commander Fryer recently appointed a committee to study the adequacy of the present annual dues of \$5.00 and to report thereon at the first meeting in March. The members of this committee were George Wenger, Ed Tostigan, Al Greenwood, Henry Voorhees and Charles J. O'Hara, Chairman.

Of the \$5.00 that we now collect, the Post receives \$1.50. The balance of \$3.50 goes for National, Department and County assessments. (\$.25 for County, \$1.00 for Department, \$2.25 for National of which \$1.00 is for the magazine).

The committee found that the present level of dues is inadequate in view of the current amount of these assessments. It also felt that the dues should assume a

The committee recommended and the membership approved the following procedural steps in the discussions and final actions subsequent to the submittal of the report. No motions were to be entertained at the March 6 meeting concerning what the membership would finally propose to vote upon, such motions to be made at the first meeting in April and the voting to take place at the meeting of May 6. This would provide for an adequate period of deliberation and would give us an opportunity to more fully publicize what we are doing. Thus, it was hoped that a more truly representative number of interested members would be involved in the final decision.

The point was also made that the membership would have to face up to this problem with the realization and acceptance of the fact that we are part of a national organization. This is not a local country club and whatever we do is not purely localized. Thus, it was felt that an immoderate action that would seriously deplete our membership is not for the

good of the Legion.

It was the conclusion of the committee that a disproportionate share of running the Post activities comes from the income of the bar. It was realized, of course that without this income we could not exist in the style to which we have become accustomed. We all know that the membership, either by voting participation in the decision or through default by failing to register a protest, has decided that we would assume a sizable debt. It was not suggested that the dues pay off this debt but it was felt that the total membership should share a small portion of this burden and thus make more of our principal income available for payment on this debt. Naturally, this can only be done by increasing the only other certain source of revenue we have, namely dues.

The committee pointed out further that there hasn't been an increase in dues since 1946 and added that there are not many organizations that can make such a claim. It was the unanimous opinion of the committee that an increase in dues is justified and recommended that they be increased to \$7.50 a year for 1964.
