O'HARA ARRANGING FOR PAST COMMANDERS' DINNER

Colonel William J. Smith, Commandant of Cadets at Christian Brothers Academy, Albany, will be the speaker at the 35th Annual Past Commanders' Dinner, it was announced by last year's Commander, Charles J. O'Hara. Traditionally, the immediate past commander is chairman for this annual event.

The dinner will be in the Post Hall at 7:30 p.m., Saturday, April 23. A social hour usually commences at 6:30 p.m. The dinner is open to all members of the Post and their guests.

A combat veteran of the Pacific Theatre during World War II, Colonel Smith will talk on "The War in Viet Nam". His war-time service for three years was with the 165th Infantry Regiment of the 27th Division, successor to the famed "Fighting Irish" 69th Infantry Regiment of New York. More recently he was on the staff of Major General Almerin C. O'Hara, who is Chief of Staff to the

Governor, Commanding General of the New York National Guard and a Blanchard Post Legionnaire. Colonel Smith retired from the staff position after 25 years active military service for his country to accept his present assignment.

In addition to honoring those who have served Blanchard Post as commander, the event is the occasion for presenting the Past Commanders' award, a diamond-studded American Legion lapel button to the Blanchard legionnaire chosen by the Past Commanders as having contributed of his time and energy to the American Legion and our Post in an outstanding manner. Announcement of the recipient is withheld until the occasion of the dinner.

SALUTE FOR A SERVICE FAMILY

An American Legion program to recognize the family of every Armed Services member has been put into operation by Blanchard Post it was announced last month by Commander Ed Costigan. The recognition comes in the form of a three by four inch decal on which is inscribed "The American Legion *SALUTES* A Service Family." The black letters appear in a field of white on a red-bordered shield which has five white stars across the top. The decal is suitable for display in windows of residences and other buildings or on automobiles.

Department Adjutant Maurice Stemmer stated "This new program has been initiated in part to counteract the harmful morale effect of demonstrations against military service and the nation's efforts to maintain independence in South Viet Nam. The American public should be reminded of the sacrifices being made by today's military forces and their families. Here is a simple and effective manner for each Post to provide recognition to these families."

To put the program into action, Commander Costigan appointed Army Korean-Veteran Legionnaire Robert Rosenfield, 508 Kenwood Avenue, Delmar, chairman. Bob has issued a call for the names of all families presently having a member in the Armed Forces. The names may be submitted at the Post, to any officer of the Post or mailed to Bob's home. To get him by phone, evenings, call HE 9-6225.

Of the first hundred decals received Bob has issued 14 to the Committee That Cares through the Post's chairman for the Committee Earl S. Jones, Sr. These are for the families of men from the Blanchard Post area serving with the Armed Forces in Viet Nam.

When the present supply of decals is exhausted Bob will seek approval for a new supply.
