WORLD WAR 1 VETERAN TO BE MEMORIAL DAY GRAND MARSHAL

For service to his country, the community and in the interest of veterans, Charles J. Wiley, a Blanchard Legionnaire who lives in Voorheesville, has been named Grand Marshal for the 1964 Memorial Day Parade.

In selecting Charlie, Post Commander Dick Dalton said: "For the past decade we have had World War II veterans leading our annual Memorial Day Parade in the Town of Bethlehem. This year I determined that distinction would go to a World War I vet. I am happy that our good friend, Charlie Wiley, has accepted the honor of being our Grand Marshal. I am very confident that with Charlie heading the parade we will have a good turn-out of other World War I vets to join with our Post members who are World War II and Korean vets in making the parade a success."

Parade Chairman again this year is Robert E. Mulligan of Brockley Drive, Delmar. Bob is a Colonel in the New York State Guard.

Grand Marshal Wiley was among the first four residents of the City of Albany who volunteered for military service in World War I. On April 11, 1917, he enlisted in the 10th Infantry and was sent to Spartansburg, South Carolina for training. There on his eighteenth birthday he was transferred to Company D of the 105th Infantry of the former 27th Infantry Division.

After his military service, Charlie became a Legionnaire in the Capitol City Post of Albany in 1920. He transferred to Blanchard Post in 1941. Twice he's been a Vice Commander of our Post. For eleven years he was chairman of the Post-sponsored drum corps when it was active; for many years he served as Service Officer as well as Sick Call and Relief Chairman; he headed several successful fund-raising campaigns for the Post. In 1948 he founded the Post Bowling League of which he is now secretary. He has also been very active in the 40 & 8 in Albany County.

Grand Marshal Wiley has selected for his aides, Parade Chairman Bob Mulligan and Past Commander Al Woehrle with whom Charlie served one of his terms as a Vice Commander.

In the arrangements for the Parade, Chairman Mulligan is following the pattern of last year. He is calling on the

division marshals to have their units commence forming at 9:30 a.m. on Saturday, May 30, in the vicinity of our Post headquarters on Elsmere Avenue and Poplar Drive.

There will be five divisions. Behind Grand Marshal Wiley and his aides will come the Color Guard followed by the First Division which will be the Colors, Commander Dalton and his aides and the marching members of Blanchard Post and the Post Auxiliary. Second Division will have military units; Third Division will be the Bethlehem Memorial Post of the V.F.W. and their Auxiliary; Fourth Division will be the Boy Scouts, Girl Scouts and the 4-H Clubs; Fifth Division will be the Fire Companies. Preceding Marshal Wiley will be a Town of Bethlehem police car serving as escort and radio contact with rear elements.

Town Supervisor Bertram E. Kohinke who is a Past Post Commander, will be the Honorary Grand Marshal.

Promptly at 10 a.m. Grand Marshal Wiley will step out and march south on Elsmere Avenue to Kenwood Avenue where the parade turns west on Kenwood Avenue and will stop for a graveside ceremony at the resting place of Nathaniel Adams Blanchard, for whom our Post is named.

For the ceremony, the Post Commander and the Auxiliary President with the Post Color Guard and the Post Firing Squad under the command of Past Commander Dick Lenseeth, and the Post Chaplain, Rev. Charles Kaulfuss, will

WE JUST GOTTA DO IT!

Vice Commander-Membership Chairman Fred Stahlhut reported at the April 20th meeting that the Post must get 64 more paid-up members, either new or renewals, to meet our 1964 quota. leave the ranks of the parade and proceed inside the gates of the Bethlehem Cemetery. Father Kaulfuss will officiate at the graveside after which two memorial wreaths will be placed at the Blanchard grave by Commander Dalton and President Conner. The Firing Squad will discharge the traditional three volleys and a bugler will sound taps.

Following the ceremony at the World War I hero's grave, the parade will continue along Kenwood Avenue to Delmar's Four Corners where it will turn east on Delaware Avenue to the Bethlehem Memorial Park where Honorary Grand Marshal Kohinke, Grand Marshal Wiley and other dignitaries will review the parade.

Upon completion of the parade, the annual Memorial Day Services will commence. Because of the dedication this year of a new veterans' memorial, there will be a special program. At press time it was not yet finalized. Chairman Mulligan is coordinating the parade program with Bethlehem Memorial Committee Chairman, William Johnston, Jr., also a past Commander of Blanchard Post.

Because of the combined events of the parade and the unveiling and dedication of the new veterans' memorial monument Commander Dalton has expressed a strong appeal to all Blanchard Legionnaires who can do so, to become a marcher for the occasion and he says "This is the one day in the year that we veterans in the Town of Bethlehem can unite in a single purpose. That purpose is to pay tribute to our comrades-in-arms who gave their lives for our nation. It was through the Grace of God and the events of war that we are here and they are not. Let's show our gratitude by letting our townsfolk see that we remember and we care. Only by a large turn-out of our members for the parade can we do this. I'm counting on you to respond."

Should anyone wish to acquire an American Legion cap for the parade and future use, they can give their order with their size to Adjutant Charlie O'Hara right away so that the caps will arrive here in time. He has the prices.
