## Grand Marshal For Memorial Day Parade To Be Major General A. C. O'Hara

When stalwart good-looking Major General Almerin C. O'Hara steps off as grand marshall of Bethlehem's annual Memorial Day Parade on May 30 he will have as an aide another Blanchard legionnaire with whom he has had close association in the American Legion, in the military during war-time and peacetime and in the many walks of life that bring men together. The aide will be Charles E. Walsh, Jr., of Delmar, who retired from the military as a brigadier general. It is Charlie Walsh who several years ago brought General O'Hara into Blanchard Post as a member. It is Charlie Walsh who is responsible for the New York Army National Guard commanding general and Chief of Staff to Governor Rockefeller to be the parade grand marshal.

Here's how it happened. Parade Chairman Bob Ballantine last month was at the Post discussing the arrangements. With him was Legionnaire Walsh. The subject of the grand marshal arose. Bob expressed a wish for general O'Hara. Walsh offered to contact the C. G. Upon being called General O'Hara said "Charlie, if you'll be my aide, I accept."

General O'Hara is a resident of Loudonville. He was born in Hudson, N. Y.

His military career began 32 years ago when he became a private in the 10th Infantry of the New York National Guard. In 1940, as a first lieutenant with the 106th Infantry of the 27th Infantry Division of the New York National Guard, he went into Federal service.

World War II came along and the 27th Division was sent to the Pacific Theatre of military operations. His accomplishments in his combat career brought successive promotions and decorations. He recorded history by planning and leading the first night attack by American forces in the Pacific spearheading the United States 10th Army against the enemy Japanese on Okinawa.

For his war-time service General O'Hara won the Silver Star for gallantry on Saipan; Bronze Star with Oak Leaf Cluster for valor on Okinawa. These are but a few of the decorations among the multi-rows of military honor ribbons he is entitled to wear on his chest.

After World War II the General rejoined the 27th Infantry Division and continued his military rise to become a brigadier general in 1957. Three years later he became the Division's commanding general after the Division had been

converted to an Armored Division. Upon the retirement of his predecessor, General O'Hara was appointed by Governor Rockefeller to become head of the New York State Division of Military and Naval Affairs in the Executive Department of New York State. The Governor also appointed O'Hara Chief of Staff.

Another of his accomplishments for his country was his 3-year appointment as a member of Reserves Forces Policy Board of the Department of Defense. Aside from his long and colorful military career General O'Hara has had a 15-year span of experience in business, industry and banking. He and Mrs. O'Hara have two sons.

**PARADE PLANS**

As this is being written for the 1040 TIMES, Chairman Ballantine is bringing together all details essential for his second year as Parade Chairman. He plans another colorful and inspiring event dedicated to the memories of the men and women who in war-time died for their country.

Unless other instructions are issued it is expected the pattern for the program will follow previous years. More than five divisions will make up the parade. With the American Legion and the Veterans of Foreign Wars Bethlehem Memorial Post and their Auxiliaries, the Boy Scouts, Girl Scouts, 4-H Clubs, military and naval units, Bethlehem Lodge of Elks, Fire Companies and their auxiliaries will be in the march line-up.

Formation for the parade commences at 9:30 a.m. in the vicinity of Blanchard Post at Elsmere Avenue and Poplar Dr.

Precisely at ten o'clock the Grand Marshal will give the signal and commence the parade onto Elsmere Avenue toward Kenwood Avenue where the marchers turn west at the Bethlehem Cemetery. Here there will be a pause long enough for the annual service at the grave of Nathaniel Adams Blanchard who died in World War I and for whom our Post was named. The service will be conducted by Post Chaplain Reverend Charles H. Kaulfuss of St. Stephen's Episcopal Church. The service will include the placing of wreaths by Post Commander Ed Costigan and his wife, Auxiliary President Betty Costigan at the grave-stone. A firing-squad under the direction of Past Commander Dick Lenseth will fire a volley and a bugler will sound "Taps".

The marchers will then continue to Delaware Avenue and Bethlehem Memorial Park where Grand Marshal O'Hara with other dignitaries will review the parade.

At the conclusion of the parade services at the Park will include prayers by the clergymen, the annual presentation of a new American Flag for the Memorial Park flag-pole and other ceremonies appropriate for the occasion including another wreath-placing, three rounds of

firing by the Rifle Squad and "Taps".

**PARADE TURN-OUT**

Because Memorial Day this year is on a Monday the parade planners are concerned that it may affect the attendance. Commander Costigan says: "In winding up a very pleasant year as Commander of Blanchard Post I am hopeful for a good turn-out of Blanchard Legionnaires for our Memorial Day Parade. I salute our members who will be among the marchers either in our Post's division or some other division of the parade. I especially appeal to you other Blanchard Legionnaires who in past years we've seen along the side-lines. I suggest those places be left for the convenience of the very young and our senior-citizens while you take your place where you rightfully belong—among the marchers. If you can't walk the route contact Parade Chairman Ballantine and he'll see what can be done about letting you drive or getting a ride."

On the matter of parade etiquette, Flag Chairman George Reeber has these thoughts: "Start now to see if you have or need in your home an American Flag to display on Memorial Day. Check with your neighbors to see if they have a Flag or need one. If a Flag is needed contact me or any of the Post officers about getting a flag. Let's have a memor-

able 1966 Memorial Day for our Town by this year showing more American Flags in front of our homes or places of business than ever before."

**VIET NAM IMPACT**

The world-wide turn of events in the past year will have its reflections in the 1966 Memorial Day Parade. To the memories of all those who died in military conflicts of our Nation from the War Between the States, to the Korea Conflict over a decade ago is added the Viet Nam Crisis which already has taken a heavy toll of American lives. An appeal has been made by the Bethlehem Committee That Cares which had its origin in Blanchard Post to use this occasion to dedicate this Memorial Day to thoughts and prayers for a peaceful solution to the Viet Nam Crisis and that whatever solution occurs it will not be at the expense of human freedom in the battle-torn Southeast Asian country.

After the parade and ceremonies the Post will be open for refreshments for the participants of the Parade.
