1960-61 COMMANDER TAKES OVER

Under the provisions of the newly adopted Constitution and Bylaws, Blanchard Post is now operating with a new administration headed by Commander Given Hynds. The election of Given and the slate of officers with him took place without opposition at the mid-May meeting at which 28 members attended.

The new officers were selected by a nominating committee headed by Dr. Stanley Klett. Their selections with Given Hynds were: Fred E. Buker, Jr., Patrick H. Igoe and Alexander J. Woehrle for Vice Commanders; Rodger J. Fryer, Adjutant; William I. Hayes, Finance Officer; Hugh W. Stowers, Sergeant-at-Arms; George F. Wenger, Judge Advocate; Rev. Charles H. Kaulfuss, Chaplain and Otto de Heus, Historian.

For nominees on the initial Board of Directors set up under the new Constitution the nominating committee chose: Harold C. Barkhuff, Alvin W. Greenwood and Richard C. Lenseth for 3-year terms; Herbert G. Drew, Arnold F. Mosmen and William Johnston, Jr. for 2-year terms; and William Segur, Joseph V. Von Ronne and George F. Wenger for 1-year terms.

The Board will take the place of the former executive committee and, as intended by the new Constitution, will be responsible for the business affairs of the Post whereas the Commander and his slate will function as a Post Affairs Committee concerned with promoting the principles for which the American Legion stands.

A County Committee with Alternates was also selected. These are: Commander Hynds with Harold Barkhuff, Pat Igoe, Herb Drew, Bill Johnston, Doc Klett; and for alternates, Russ Adams, Warren Moessner, Hugh Stowers, Henry Voorhees, Frank Walsh and Charles Wiley.

As required these names were read at the first meeting last month. At the next meeting they were again read and their acceptance was moved by Wayne Davis and seconded by Roger Reynolds. Commander Greenwood asked for nominations from the floor and received no response. Nominations were closed and the new slate of officers was elected by acclamation.

TO BE A PAST COMMANDER

Another year has rolled around for Blanchard Post and another past Commander has been added.

As I retire to become one of those "low down" past commanders I would like to take this opportunity to extend my sincere thanks to every member of the Post who assisted me in making my tenure a very successful one. I believe many things have been accomplished during the year and trying to realize these accomplishments required a great deal of effort on the part of many members of the Post.

I would like to reminesce covering some of the major accomplishments: Post receipts were increased approximately \$1500; our assets increased about \$1000; our building was improved by painting; the beauty of our grounds was enhanced by removing weeds and trimming shrubbery; a new colored TV set was installed; an ice cube machine was purchased; a lawn mower was purchased to keep our lawns looking as well as others in the area; and last, but not least a complete change in the Constitution was accomplished in fitting with our major operation which is necessary for this modern age.

Thanks again for the cooperation of everybody.

Post Renews Bypass Move

It is hoped that action commenced by Blanchard Post members may cause the State Dept. of Public Works Highway Dept. to revive action for the Delmar By-Pass. SCHOLARSHIPS AVAILABLE

The American Legion's educational handbook, "Need a Lift?" containing information about hundreds of college and vocational school scholarships has been made available to the advisory staff at the Bethlehem Central Sr. High School by the Blanchard Post.

The handbook gives special listings of scholarships available to children of veterans who served in WW1, WW2 and the Korean conflict. Many of these scholarships are not used because they are not applied for by young people who are eligible.

The handbook draws particular attention to the 156,000 children of veterans who died in or as a result of serving in the armed forces and are eligible for the "Junior G.I. Bill" which may give qualifying students between 18 and 22 as much as \$110.00 a month. Legionnaires who know of children of a deceased veteran who intend to go to college should make them aware that such assistance is available.

While it is advisable for high school students to begin preparations for college during their second year of high school, interested seniors should likewise talk with the senior advisor at the high school. The Education and Scholarship Chairman of the Blanchard Post, Wayne M. Davis, HE 9-5565, will likewise be happy to be of assistance.

Junior Baseball Items
