AN EDITORIAL: FOR GOD AND COUNTRY

The continuing and persistent attack directed against our government's Viet Nam policy has droned on belaboring our senses cluttering our news media to where it is now at the boring stage. The attempt to confuse the American people has been discredited to the tune of about 99-44/100%, by any honest estimate. The people have demonstrated once again that they will not be deluded by charlatans, montebanks and clowns, whether masquerading as newsmen or clergymen. They have shown themselves much more knowledgeable, intelligent and analytical than the Fulbrights, Morses, Lippmans, Restons, Severeids, Childs, fuzzy-speaking college professors and assorted kooks, would have us believe.

All of us can take great pride and encouragement from the results of this so-called "dialogue" even though the great giant which is the American people will continue to be bombarded by pigmies who are out of the mainstream of American thinking. We now have the same animals in different garments. No further comment!
