OUR NEW COMMANDER

The esteem and popularity with which he is regarded brought the largest audience in recent years last month to witness the installation of the newest commander and 1967-68 officers of Blanchard Post. Our new executive is Sidney M. Kaplan.

The installation ceremony was conducted by Past Post and County Commander Harold Barkhuff.

Inducted with Sid were his brother officers Vice Commanders William J. Campbell, Joseph Reohr and Walter Van Wormer; Adjutant Merwyn K. Atwood and Finance Officer Eugene F. Fitz-Patrick.

Re-inducted in their posts were Judge Advocate George F. Wenger, Historian Winthrop P. Robinson and Chaplain Reverend Charles H. Kaulfuss.

Our first and only (to date) Vietnam Vet Kenneth N. Simpson, Jr., was installed as the new Sergeant-at-Arms.

Ex A/L Essayist

Commander Kaplan, a World War II Air Force vet, has been a member of the American Legion since 1960. His Legion relationship, however, goes back way beyond that year. While in grammar school in his native Larchmont, New York, he was a participant in an Ameri-

can Legion sponsored Americanism essay contest. Sid won and for it he was awarded a silver medal.

His war-time service, as an aerial engineer, earned for him four bronze stars on his ETO ribbon.

We know Sid for his enthusiasm and co-operation in Blanchard Post activities. Whether it be Irish, German or Italian night Sid was in there helping. He was Vice Commander in charge of Activities for 1965-66. A highlight of that year was the "Roaring Twenties" show which had a two-nights run. He has long been a member of the Post Firing Squad.

Looking ahead to his commandership, Sid says: "We must think, talk and act Americanism. This we must do to show our support of our Government. We must let the men and women who are serving in the Armed Forces, and particularly those in Vietnam, Korea and the other troubled world spots, know that we are behind their efforts and what they are doing for America and freedom for mankind. We must discourage those who would try to disunite us and bring discredit to us to the relish of our foes."

Sid's best asset for his new post is his wife, Mary. He encouraged her to come to our community from New Rochelle,
