FLAG ETIQUETTE

How would you rate yourself on these questions regarding our American Flag?

Question: Is it necessary for a person to stand and salute when the National Anthem is played?

Answer: When the National Anthem is played and the Flag is not displayed, all present should stand and face toward the music. Those in uniform should salute at the first note of the anthem, retaining this position until the last note. All others should stand at attention, men removing their headdress. When the Flag is displayed, the salute to the Flag should be given.

Question: Is it necessary for a person to stand and salute when the National

Anthem is sung?

Anthem: If the National Anthem is sung by the entire audience, or a soloist, those persons present should stand but not salute.

Question: Is it correct to sing the National Anthem while saluting the Flag?

Answer: No, it should not be done, since this would be awkward, unnatural and incongruous. You may or may not remove your Legion Cap while singing.
