BLANCHARD POST BASEBALL

This was the "almost" year for Blanchard Post. After winning the Southern Division championship in grand style we lost the County Championship in a tough two out of three series with Colonie Post. The overall record this year was sixteen wins, five losses and two ties. One of the ties was the first game of the playoffs in which Don Boone pitched a no-hitter for six innings only to see the game rained out in the seventh with both teams scoreless.

Spectator interest in the team improved greatly this year. The last game of the season with Colonie really drew a large crowd, including many baseball scouts, Legion officials, and Town of Bethlehem dignitaries. It was unfortunate that our season came to such an abrupt end, but the interest in the team should carry over to next year when we will try again.

Some of the highlights of the season:
The win over Brooklawn, New Jersey
— this team is annually a standout in
Jersey competition and came here after
a successful tour of New Hampshire.
Dave Spence amazed the crowd in an

unfamiliar role of relief pitcher to save this game.

Dick Broom's almost perfect game against Ft. Orange. Only one baserunner reached first base (via a walk). He was quickly thrown out on an attempted steal by Denny Empie.

Arnie Skogstrand's hitting against Voorheesville, two homers and two doubles to singlehandedly ruin the hopes of Charlie Crow's boys.

The come-from-behind win over North Albany, in which Jim Gallaher and Denny Empie produced the big bats.

Arnie Skogstrand had a terrific hitting and fielding record for the year. He led the team with an average of .408; his five doubles, four triples, five home runs, and batted in twenty-five runs, besides playing errorless ball in center field. Dave Spence had a great year on

third base, making only three errors all season while hitting a steady .315, and getting many clutch hits.

Paul Bradley batted .362, lead the team in scoring and stolen bases and sparked the infield from his shortstop position. Denny Empie was a tower of strength behind home plate, and very few teams even tried to run on him. Denny's hitting improved tremendously over a year ago, which indicates that he will really be a big hitter next year. Don Boone and Dick Broom both had great years on the mound. Don was undefeated winning eight games, striking out 81 in 58 innings. Dick lost three tough games, while winning four. He struck out 87 in 49 innings. Both of these boys have another year to improve these records.

Jeff Hutchinson and Denny Emery along with Skogstrand, Spence, and Bradley finished their Legion careers this year. Jeff and Denny were real assets to the team for the past three years and will be sorely missed by the management.

Returning next year in addition to Boone, Broom and Empie will be Jeff Arnold, Jock Walsh, Jim Shea, Jim Gallaher, and Chip Estey. These boys are all fine ballplayers and form a strong nucleous for 1964. With some fine prospects coming out of the Babe Ruth Leagues (Delmar and Guilderland), we hope to field a County champion in 1964.

At this time we wish to express our thanks to Jim Hamlin who has coached the team for the past four years and who helps to calm down the blood pressure of the manager. Incidentally it was Jim who discovered that Dave Spence was a pitcher.

The annual baseball dinner will be held in the Post Rooms on Thursday, September 5th. The time is 6:30 p.m. Team members and staff will be guests. Others who with to attend the function will be asked to contribute two dollars a plate.

LEGION IN ACTION

The next time you hear the question "What has the American Legion accomplished in the way of legislation in behalf of veterans?" use this for a reply:

Through its National Legislative Commission with offices in Washington, D. C., The American Legion has sponsored and piloted through Congress practically every piece of legislation of benefit to men and women who served honorably in the armed forces of the United States during World Wars I and II and the Korean emergency. Some outstanding examples of basic veterans' laws accomplished after World War I are: Public Law 11, 66th Congress, providing vocational rehabilitation of disabled ex-servicemen; Public Law 47, 67th Congress, establishing the Veterans Bureau (now the Veterans Administra-tion); Public Law 194, 67th Congress providing a hospital construction pro-

gram for World War veterans; Public Law 120, 68th Congress, the Adjusted Compensation (Bonus) Act; Public Law 78, 73rd Congress, restoration of compensation reduced by the Economy Act of March 20, 1933; Public Law 484, 73rd Congress, widows' and children's pension, or Compensation Act. Other examples applicable to World War II veterans are: Public Law 16, which provides vocational rehabilitation for those who served in the armed forces during World War II who were honorably discharged because of disabilities incurred in service; Public Law 346, the G. I. Bill of Rights and its amendments; and Public Law 550, the G. I. Bill of Rights for Korean veterans. Many state Legislative Committees have secured beneficial legislation for men and women of both World Wars and the Korean emergency.

CONVENTION REPORT

The 45th annual convention of the American Legion, Department of New York was held in Rochester on August 1-2-3, 1963, with Harold Barkhuff and Richard Dalton attending as delegates from Blanchard Post.

J. Arthur Petty of Great Neck, L. I., was elected Department Commander to succeed F. Herrick Conners of Cohoes. Mr. Petty, a Postal employee is the first World War II veteran to be elected Department Commander.

The Legion was addressed by Lt. Governor Malcolm Wilson, C. D. DeLoach, assistant director of the FBI, and by Senator Kenneth Keating.

Among resolutions passed were the following.

Urging action by the President to use appropriate and necessary steps to effect

removal of Communist troops from Cuba and eliminate the Communist government which enslaves the Cuban people.

ment which enslaves the Cuban people.

Urging disapproval of action by U. S. delegates to the United Nations in abandoning opposition to admission of Communist representatives from Hungary to the United Nations.

Endorsing support of every lawful and orderly effort by every citizen of the United States to obtain for himself those rights of equal opportunity provided in the U. S. Constitution.

Reaffirming support for a referendum on a constitutional amendment for paying a state bonus to Korean War Veterans.

Harold Barkhuff was elected a delegate to the National convention in Miami. This convention will be held in September.
