DEPARTMENT CONVENTION

BY HAROLD BARKHUFF

The 51st Annual Department Convention of New York took place in Niagara Falls, N. Y. on July 16 to 19, 1969. Commander Hugh Stowers and Past Commander Harold Barkhuff had the privilege of representing Blanchard Post as delegates. Approximately 5,000 were in attendance.

The convention convened at 9:00 a.m. on July 17 in the Strand Theatre. After the customary ceremonies, greetings were extended by the mayors of Niagara Falls, N. Y. and Niagara Falls, Ontario, Canada, and the convention chairman. Reports were submitted by the Department Commander, Michael Kogutek, the Department Treasurer, the Credentials Committee and Resolutions Committee. An Americanism presentation was made by the Commander to the Reader's Digest for the distribution of millions of American Flags to the citizens of the United States. Lieutenant Governor Malcolm Wilson, who is also a Legionnaire. was the principle speaker of the day.

After recess for the day, a caucus of the Third District was held at Schrafft's Motor Inn. Following routine business officers for the coming year were elected and installed. Elected were Ralph Melion as District Commander and John McKenna, Fort Orange Post, as Vice Commander.

At 9:00 a.m., July 18, the session was reconvened. Several committee reports were given and awards presented by Department Membership Committee, Boy Scouts Committee and Bowling Committee. An address was given by the Hon. Henry P. Smith, III, member of the House of Representatives (40th District). Probably the highlight of the convention was the presentation of SACLANT/NATO Briefing Team by Admiral Ephriam P. Holmes, U.S. Navy, Supreme Allied Commander—Altantic. Speakers included the Admiral, and representatives of the Royal Navy, Royal Netherlands Navy, Canadian Air Force. Italian Navy, Portugese Air Force, the Royal Norwegian Navy and Canadian Navy. Each spoke on their respective parts in the NATO Atlantic Command. The presentation was the first of its kind to be given and, with the use of charts, made it most interesting. The session recessed for the day and reconvened at 9:00 a.m. July 19.

After further committee reports, an address was given by the Governor of 1969 Boys' State. The convention was visited by Mrs. John Mazzie, Department President of the American Legion Auxiliary who presented a \$5,000 check to the Legion for rehabilitation. The principle speaker of the day was Hon. Martin McKneally, member of the House of Representatives (27th District) and Past National Commander, the American Legion. Presentations were made to the retiring commander, followed by the election of Department officers.

Commander — Richard M. Pedro, Owego, Tioga Co. Vice Commanders — Joseph Keppler, Suffolk Co.; William J. Votraw, Clinton Co.; John Glegota, Erie Co.; Daniel J. Pinsky, Bronx Co.; and Robert Johnston, Tompkins Co.

Friday evening was the convention parade which took over two hours to pass. Saturday was devoted to competition of bands, color guards and drill teams as well as Junior Drum Corps. In the evening, finals of the competitions and awarding of prizes took place.

Among resolutions approved were: Urge the National Organization to adopt a program of "Stamps for Hospitalized Veterans" on a national scale. Request Congress to enact federal legis-

Request Congress to enact federal legislation to eliminate Social Security as income for V.A. pension purposes. Petition the Legislature of the State of

Petition the Legislature of the State of New York to amend Section 148 of the General Municipal Law so as to provide funds for the burial of indigent veterans and/or their dependent in the amount at least equal to that provided under Section 141 (\$500) of the Social Services Law.

Vigorously support ROTC programs on our college campuses throughout the country.

Directs the Department Legislative Committee to oppose any legislation that would regulate and control the ownership of rifles and shotguns.

To disqualify from public employment any person advocating the overthrow of government by force, violence or any unlawful means.

To maintain the U.S. Coast Guard as a uniformed military service and an armed force of the United States.

SPECIAL BULLETIN: BOYS' STATE SCHOLARSHIP

This just concluded Boys' State session was held during the GOLDEN ANNIVERSARY OF THE AMERICAN LEGION, and DEPARTMENT ADJU-TANT MAURICE STEMBER felt that we should do something outstanding for the young men of this session. He therefore, proposed a one-time \$4,000.00 college scholarship for the outstanding boy of the 1969 program. The Board of Directors of Boys' State of New York unanimously adopted this proposal at their meeting at Morrisville on June 26, 1969. That evening at Boys' State Inauguration of Officers, the DEPARTMENT COMMANDER MICHAEL J. KOGU-TEK, announced the Scholarship Award to the assemblage and it was most enthusiastically received.

Since that time several inquiries have been received as to who was awarded the scholarship. PLEASE NOTE THAT HIGH SCHOOL JUNIORS ONLY ARE QUALIFIED TO ATTEND BOYS' STATE. Therefore, the outstanding boy coupled with eligibility cannot be selected until late in his senior year, which means late in the spring of 1970. GEORGE A. MEAD, EXECUTIVE DI-RECTOR EMERITUS, is the Chairman of the Committee to select the two outstanding boys for Boys' Nation. It is this same committee who will make the selection for the Scholarship Award. The award will not be made to a young man who has been awarded other full scholarship or scholarships. He must be accepted and admitted at a duly accredited college or university. The scholarship monies will be paid to the college or university direct at the rate of \$1,000.00 per year for tuition, books, fees, etc. The scholarship ceases for dropout or failure to return each fall except for medical reasons. All these qualifications were adopted by the Board of Directors. As we said above this is a one-time grant to signify the 50th Anniversary of The American Legion, Department of New York.
