National Headquarters News

Washington (ALNS)—A recent Supreme Court decision has established the principle that military service must be counted in computing pension eligibility when a veteran returns to the same employer after military service. Ruling in favor of the plaintiff in the case of Davis vs. the Alabama Power Co. on the pension eligibility matter, the Court decision is expected to benefit thousands of veterans. Veterans who have already retired may apply for recomputation of their pensions based on the decision.

Indianapolis (ALNS) — Representative John Myers (R-Ind.) was successful in denying funds to the Carter Administration to process the President's pardon of Vietnam-era draft dodgers and deserters. The House added Rep. Myers' restriction to an appropriations bill providing funds for the Department of State, Justice, Commerce and the Judiciary for fiscal year 1978.

BURIAL ALLOWANCE FOR VETERANS

We receive numerous inquiries as to burial allowance for veterans. The following information is presented in an effort to clarify the regulations:

Families of veterans should be aware of the burial allowance available to former servicemen and women, i.e., the VA provides a payment of up to \$250 toward the burial expenses of eligible veterans. An additional \$150 is available as a plot or interment allowance when burial is not in a National Cemetery or other cemetery under jurisdiction of the Federal Government.

Burial or plot allowances are not paid to the extent that payment has been made by a state agency or political subdivision of a state.

When the veteran's death is serviceconnected, payment of an amount not to exceed \$800 will be made in lieu of the usual burial and interment allowances.

With the exception of Arlington National Cemetery, burial is available to eligible veterans at all National Cemeteries having space. Burial in these cemeteries may also be authorized for an eligible veteran's wife or husband, minor children and, under certain conditions, unmarried adult children.

Since 1967, burial in Arlington National Cemetery has been limited to persons dying while on active military duty, Medal of Honor winners, former service personnel on official service retired lists who are eligible for compensation stemming from their active service; certain high officials of the Federal Government and certain members of the immediate families of those listed above or those already buried there.

Veterans eligible for the plot allowance are those who were discharged under conditions other than dishonorable and who served in the Spanish-American War, the Mexican Border period, World Wars I and II, the Korean Conflict, the Vietnam Era, or peacetime veterans entitled to service-connected compensation at time of death or discharge, or who were retired for disability incurred in the line of duty.

GRAVE MARKING FOR DECEASED VETERANS

This article is offered to explain some misunderstanding that exists with respect to the furnishing of emblem-type organizational grave markers and the flat, plaque-type, governmental marker that is provided through the United States Veterans Administration.

Organizational Markers

In the Bethlehem Cemetery here in Delmar there are now markers bearing the symbol of 16 various organizations. Alphabetically, they are:

> American Legion Benevolent Order of Elks Daughters of the American Revolution Delmar Fire Department Disabled American Veterans Elsmere Fire Department Grand Army of the Republic Guilderland Center Fire Department Masonic Lodge Order of the Eastern Star Order of Odd Fellows Revolutionary War Veterans Spanish American War Veterans Veterans of Foreign Wars Veterans of Foreign Wars-Auxiliary World War I Veterans

The graves, generally, with these markers are those of members who at the time of death were members in good standing of the organization which furnished the emblem. There are graves at which more than one organizational marker is mounted. This indicates the deceased had belonged to more than one organization. We find an American Legion marker beside one furnished by the Elks Lodge, or a VFW marker accompanied by a Masonic emblem.

A most misunderstood problem in the grave-marking program arises when an interment occurs in a distant cemetery from the community in which the deceased had been active in an organization. An alert organization will, upon learning of the burial of any of its members in distant places, or the burial in its community of another distant Post's member, make contact to take necessary action for providing a grave marker.

Finding veterans' graves un-marked, especially on Memorial (Decoration) Day is a source of distress to many persons. It should be. If the proper steps are taken this distress can be lessened. The cost of providing grave markers should be borne by the organization to which deceased had been a member. Where markers have been removed from a grave through vandalism or other acts of desecration, the issuing organization should be notified by a member of the family or other interested party so that a replacement might be made.

Governmental Markers


Federal legislation provides for the grave of every American war veteran—who dies before or after honorable separation from the services—to be suitably marked. The markers may be in granite, marble or bronze. Bronze markers are usually sent to the family via parcel post. On the marker is inscribed the essential information which appears on deceased veterans' discharge papers.

Funeral directors usually have the required application form for these markers. They also have federal forms required for the American Flag to be used at the time of burial and, where applicable, the \$250 burial allowance.

Different cemeteries have their own rules on these matters. Some will permit only bronze markers because the marble or granite ones have a tendency to chip. Others forbid placing of any organizational type marker. The funeral director can be relied upon to advise in which cemeteries such restrictions apply.

With respect to veteran burial, the important thing to remember is: location and availability of the person's service serial number and/or discharge papers.
