Attendance is highly encouraged. Please RSVP NLT 14 January 2026. We hope you'll join us and help make this a strong and well-attended event.

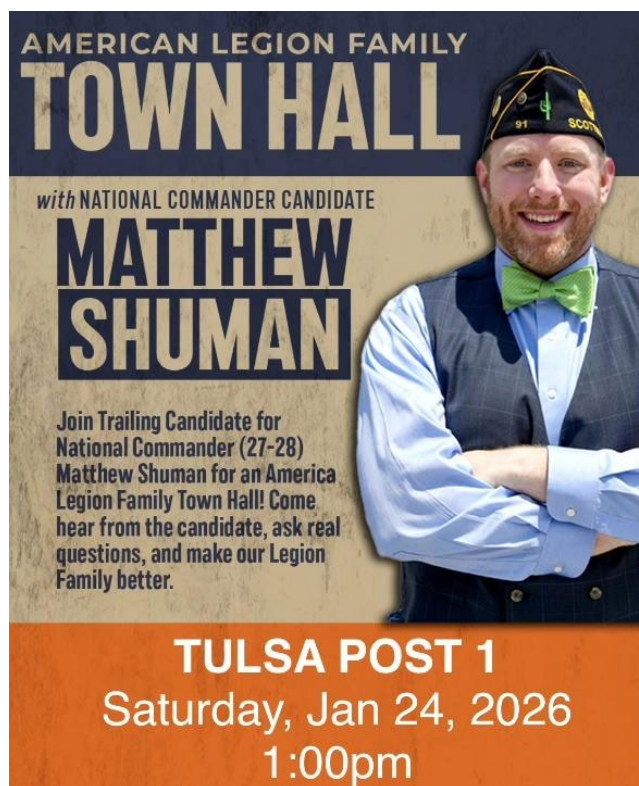

No One Left Behind

Leadership Requires Preparation, Not Just Aspiration

Leadership is not about the title you wear it is about the tools you carry and the responsibility you are prepared to shoulder.

In organizations like ours, where history, mission, and service matter, running for office should never be viewed as a résumé builder or a personal milestone. Leadership positions exist to move the mission forward, to support those doing the work, and to protect the integrity of the organization for the next generation.

Too often, we see individuals seek officer positions without the necessary tools in their tool bag. When that happens, leadership becomes reactive instead of strategic. Decisions slow. Momentum stalls. Progress becomes harder not because the mission is flawed, but because the leadership foundation is unprepared.

Experience matters. Institutional knowledge matters. Understanding policy, procedure, finances, people, and culture matters. Without those tools, even the most well-intentioned leader will struggle to guide an organization forward.

To put it plainly: appointing or electing an unprepared leader is like the mayor of New York appointing someone to oversee the New York City Fire Department who has never served in or alongside the fire service. Passion alone does not replace experience. Good intentions do not substitute for training. Leadership without preparation puts the entire organization at risk.

This is not about gatekeeping it is about stewardship. Those who aspire to lead should first commit to learning, serving, listening, and building competence. Leadership should be the result of preparation, not the starting point.

Our veterans, our members, and our communities deserve leaders who are equipped, confident, and capable. Moving the goal forward requires leaders who understand where the goal posts are, how we got here, and what it will take to advance them responsibly.

We owe it to those who came before us and those who will follow to take leadership seriously.

A December to Remember for the American Legion Auxiliary Department of Oklahoma

December truly lived up to its reputation as a season of service, connection, and goodwill for the American Legion Auxiliary Department of Oklahoma. From extensive travel across our great state to hosting national leadership, the month reflected the heart of our mission and the dedication of our members. It was a busy month, filled with meaningful moments, long hours, and many miles driven in support of our veterans and military families.

Our annual Christmas Tour took place December 8–11, with Auxiliary members traveling across Oklahoma to visit every VA home in the state along with both VA hospitals. Over the course of 924 miles and approximately 14½ hours on the road, members delivered holiday cheer, encouragement, and personal connections to veterans during the Christmas season.

A highlight of the tour was attending El Reno High School's *Gifts for Yanks* assembly. The students raised more than \$11,000 to purchase gifts for veterans at the Oklahoma City VA Hospital. Following the assembly, we traveled with the students to the hospital, where they helped distribute the gifts directly to the veterans. Auxiliary members also passed out Christmas cards collected from members across Oklahoma.

The response from our units this year was outstanding. Members provided significantly more cards than were needed, giving us a strong start on next year's Christmas card collection. We truly appreciate the time and effort members put into having cards signed by students and community organizations. These cards bring comfort and joy to veterans during what can be a difficult season for many.

A special shout-out goes to the Fletcher Unit, whose members created more than 170 goodie bags for veterans at the Lawton VA Home. Each bag was distributed along with Christmas cards, adding an extra touch of care and thoughtfulness.

Despite the long hours and many miles, a great time was had by all who participated, and the impact of the tour was felt everywhere we went.

December 18–21 brought the visit of our American Legion Auxiliary National President to Oklahoma, providing a wonderful opportunity to highlight the incredible work being done throughout the department.

Her visit began at the Del City Post, where she joined local volunteers in distributing food and presents to airmen from Tinker Air Force Base. Nearly 40 families received food baskets valued at more than \$130, along with both a ham and a turkey. Local organizations also donated toys, allowing airmen to select gifts for their children. This annual event is a cornerstone of the Del City community, and participating alongside the National President made it especially meaningful.

Friday included a visit to the Oklahoma City VA Hospital, where donuts, coffee, and adorable candy cane reindeer were passed out to veterans. The reindeer were handmade with help from PDP Debbie Bertolasio and other dedicated members. After a quick lunch, the group traveled to Sallisaw to visit Oklahoma's newest VA home. While the facility currently houses only a small number of veterans, the National President was very impressed with the modern and welcoming facility.

Saturday began with a visit to the Oklahoma City National Memorial, a powerful and emotional reminder of the strength and tenacity of the people of Oklahoma. The group then traveled to POPS in Arcadia, where unit members joined for lunch. While there, Donna Snodgrass brought her patriotic car for a special photo opportunity, and the National President presented a charter to our newest Auxiliary unit.

Welcome to the family, Unit 1776!

The afternoon continued with a visit to the Arcadia Round Barn and concluded with a relaxing water taxi ride through Bricktown. With beautiful weather and great company, the visit wrapped up on a high note and left a lasting impression of Oklahoma hospitality and Auxiliary pride.

December showcased what is possible when members come together with dedication, compassion, and a shared mission. The energy from this month carries us into the new year with excitement and purpose.

Our next major event will be Midwinter Conference, held in Norman, January 16–18. We hope to see you there as we continue the important work of serving veterans, military members, and their families.

Awards

We (The Department of Oklahoma) would like to have nominees for every award from every Post. That is what we would like to have. However, we know that isn't going to happen. You don't have to nominate someone for every award but please nominate someone for something. I know you all know someone who deserves to be recognized for the extra effort they put into serving Veterans, for that extra little bit of professionalism that goes beyond the job requirements, the things that make you feel comfortable putting your life in their hands. Filling out the form is not difficult "BUT". There are a few very important things that have to happen along the way. The nominations for the individual awards have to have an endorsement of some type from the nominee's Department Chief before the nomination can be considered. If the Fire Chief, Police Chief, City Manager or VA Department Director say no, it stops right there. Don't argue, don't alienate the Department Head. We don't have to like it, but we do have to respect their decision.

The Deadline for "ALL" Award Nominations is April 30th. May 1st the Awards Committee starts the selection process. May 1st Nominations cease. Don't ask for an extension, it will just make both of us mad.

If a Post wants to be considered for a Pillars Award or the Post of the Year Awards a hard copy of the Post's Consolidated Post Report (CPR), must be mailed to the Department Headquarters. The Department does not have the ability to download CPRs that are filed electronically. The new software at National doesn't provide Departments with that capability. "YET." I'm sorry but that is the way it has to be. If your Post wants to be considered for Pillars Awards and Post of the Year recognition, You have to mail a hard copy of your CPR to the Department before their suspense date. The Department will set that date later.

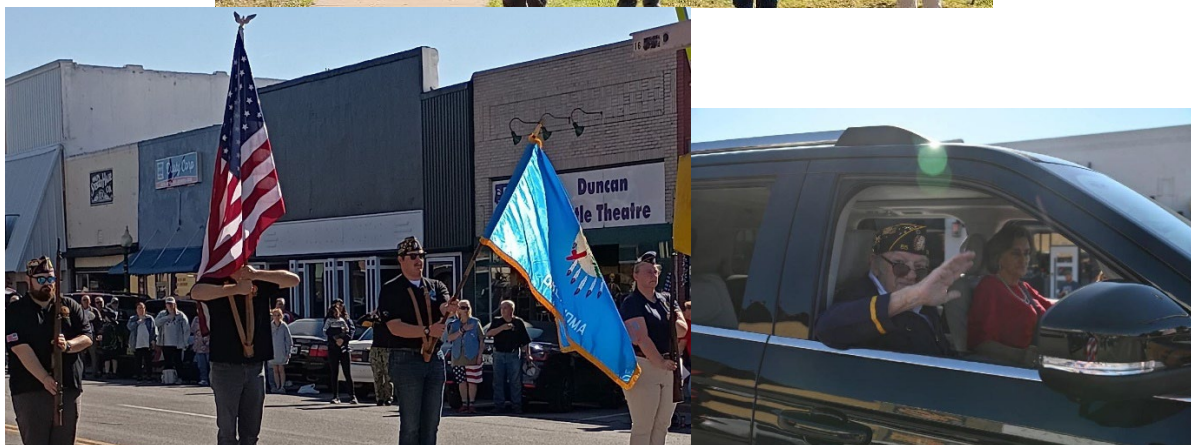

Dec. 6th, 2025: participated in the Christmas Parade.



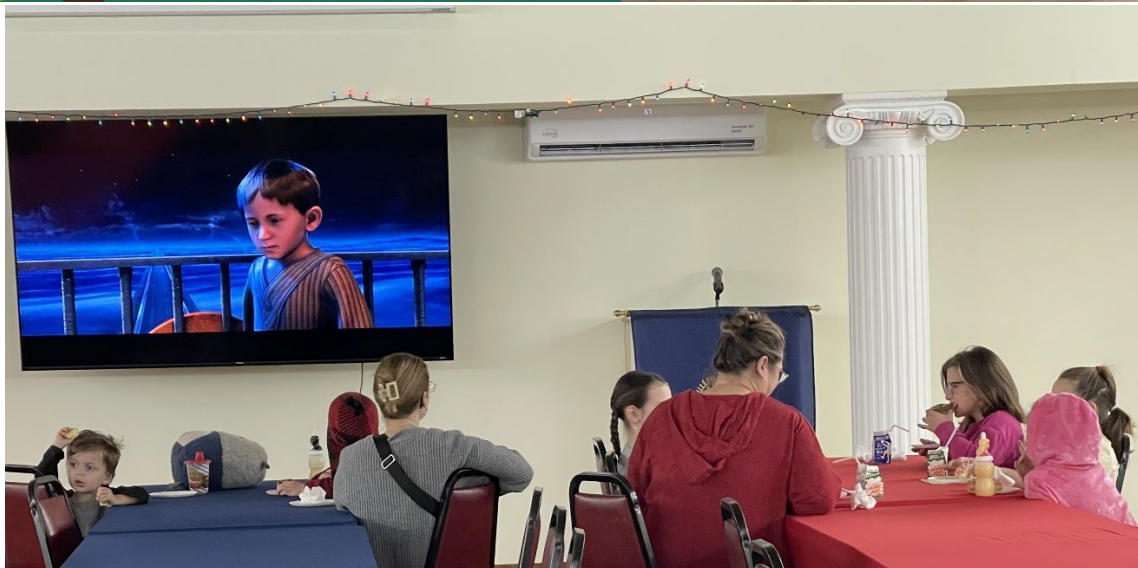
Dobbs-Adams Post 55 in Duncan, OK has been busy keeping up with parades and Post Renovations.

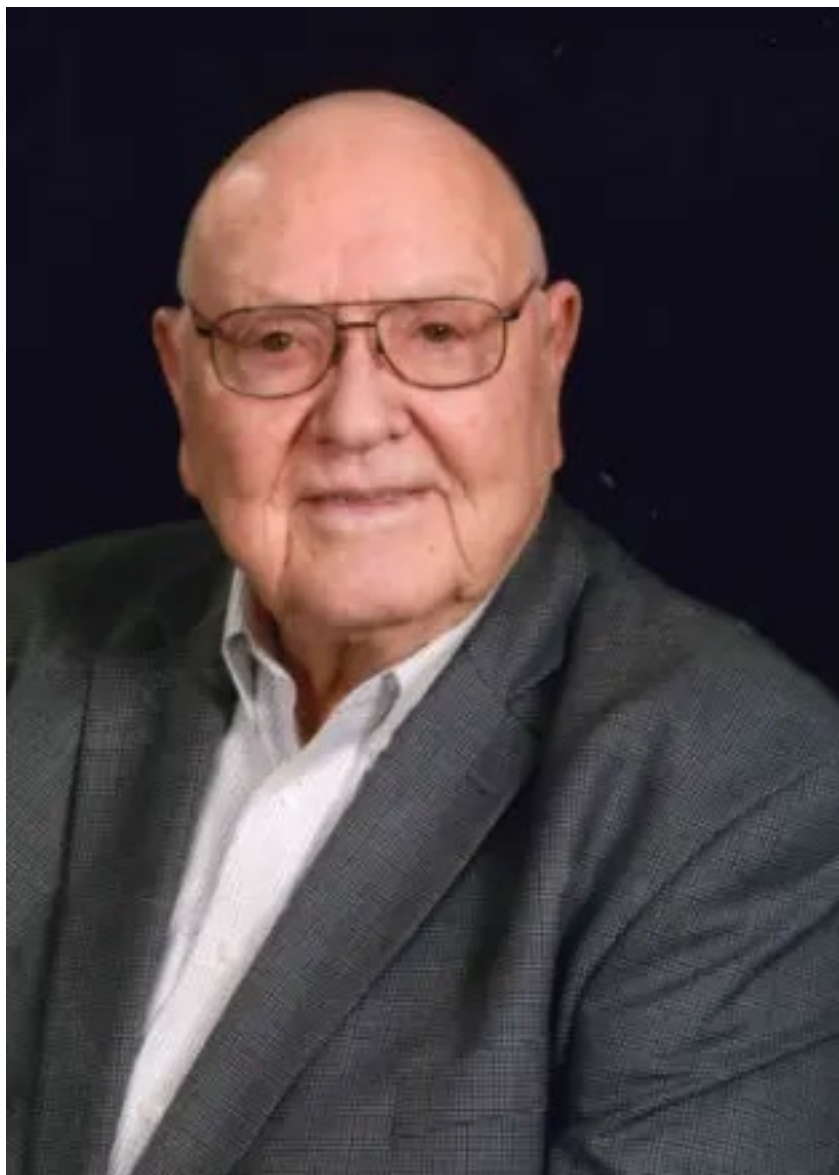

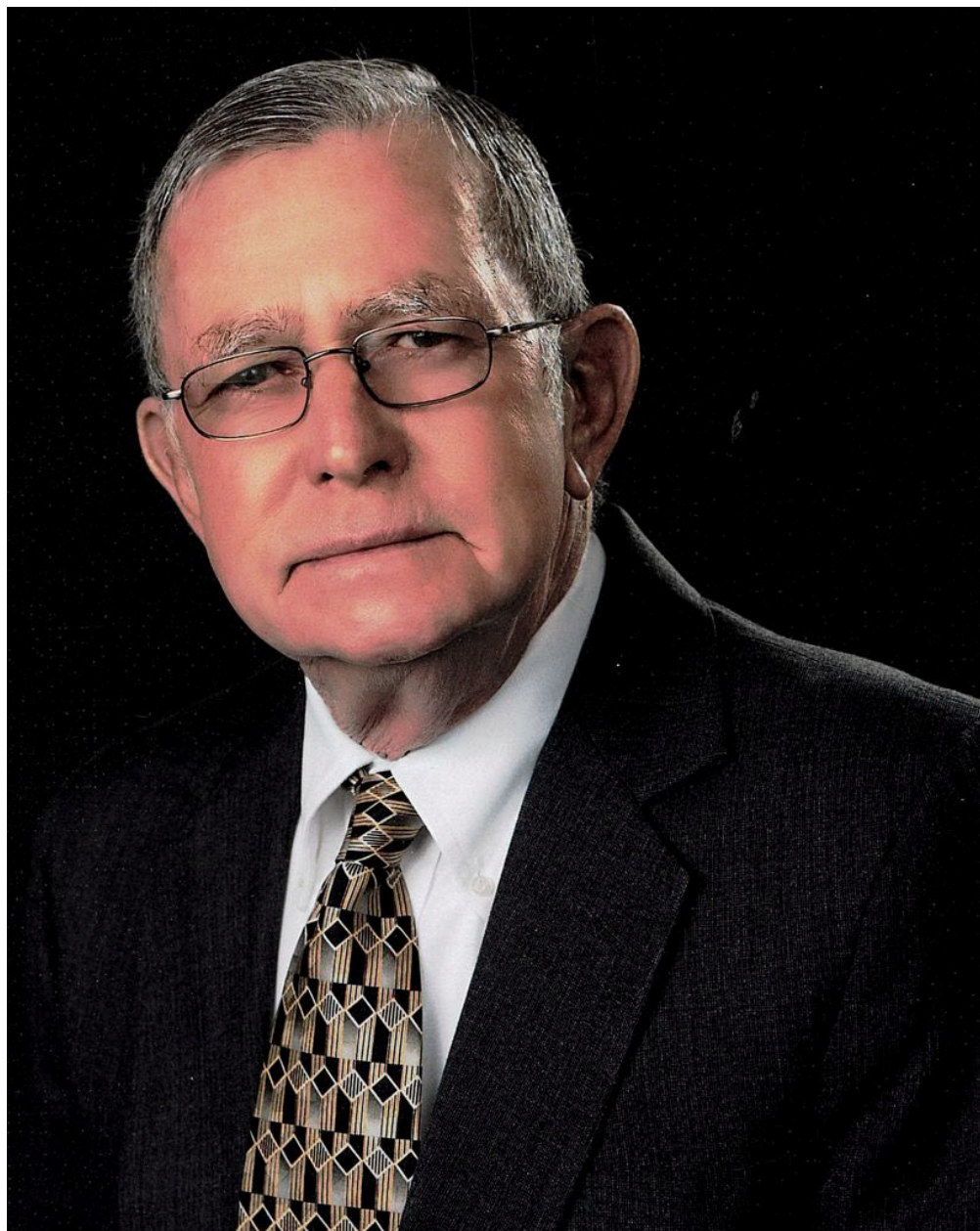

He also leaves behind his sister Florence and numerous cousins who held him close to their hearts.

He was preceded in death by his parents Shelby and Margaret Fly; his beloved son Lenny Fly; Daniel; Stephanie; and many aunts and uncles whose memories remained dear to him throughout his life.

Leonard's presence was a constant source of joy at school functions, sports games, band concerts, and graduations—always cheering from the sidelines with pride. His grandchildren will forever treasure memories of his playful spirit and legendary “Dad Jokes.” Known for his uncanny ability to nap anywhere at any time—a trait fondly remembered by those closest to him—Len embodied warmth and lightheartedness wherever he went.
