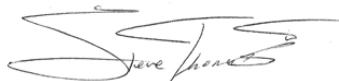
As you know we have had a busy January here in Oklahoma as we held our Mid-Winter that was a great time for us to get together and handle business. I hope you all found the time informative and were able to find time to enjoy camaraderie with our Brothers and Sisters. I also hope you found the new format beneficial. The last few days ANEC Mr. Taylor and I spent time touring Oklahoma City with the National Convention Commission personnel as well as the Chamber and Tourism folks hoping to sway them to award us the 2032 National Convention. It was an amazing time, and everything went perfectly with the small uncontrollable snafus caused by our recent snowstorm but we pushed through to show them all OKC has to offer. I also appreciate all the Oklahoma Delegation that was able to make the trip up for the events that were held.

Not to be repetitive or sound like a broken record but I want to send applause to all of our membership on an amazing run with getting our members involved and keeping them committed to the mission. As we have continued to hit or surpassed every monthly National goal so far. Let's continue that march to us hitting our first 100% membership year in over a decade. We just passed the 85% mark 3 weeks ahead of schedule and passed the 10,000 member mark the other day which I congratulate you all on the hard work getting out and talking to our members and Veterans. We have slipped back a bit in National ranking but not because of our lack of effort but because every other Department is also outperforming expectation. With that we still are within 1% of Top 10 and less than 2% from Top 3 so it would just take us doing a hard push between now and March to jump our way up the leader board. Remember the Big12 National Competition has us needing 93.12 by March 11th and if Kentucky doesn't make their 94%, we win that.

I want to send kudos also to our Family organizations as President McInnis and the Oklahoma Auxiliary is up in the Top 6 and only missed Top 5 Membership by 3 hundredths of a percent on the latest report. Our Legion Riders continue to grow in members and Chapters, and I had the honor to present a new Charter with Director Martin at Mid-Winter as well as we received another application. Commander Sherbourne and our Sons who finished #1 in all the Organization last year is ahead of last year's mark in percentage which is huge but we have started a rivalry now because even though we were ahead of last year's mark were down in standings as every other Detachment is out to knock us off the top but I know our Detachment

has the competitive spirit. I have all the confidence that we Oklahoma Legion Family can all finish in the Top 10 or better.

Public involvement goes a long way to our mission. Stay engaged with our community events or create your own. With 2026 being the year of our semi-quincentennial as a country I again encourage you to create events based around this celebration. Events themed around 1776 or 250 will greatly help us spread our mission while we celebrate.

A little bit of information about me. I have been married to Elmo for 48+ years, we have four children, 11 grandchildren, and at the present time 7 great grandchildren with two more on the way. I enjoy spending time with my family, cooking, crocheting, and working outside. I recently retired from the Clinton Veterans Center, where I was a nurse manager and the infection control nurse. I continue to visit the Veterans Center to converse with the Veterans who live there. Now that I have retired, I enjoy spending more time with family and doing some traveling.

I joined the Navy Reserves in 1988 and stayed there for one year. The Army Reserve offered me a direct commission, so I transferred in Dec 1989. I went to Officer Basic in the summer of 1990 before receiving orders to go to Saudi Arabia for Operation Desert Shield/Operation Desert Storm. We went to Ft. Sill in November 1990 prior to leaving for Saudi Arabia the 2nd of Jan 1991. My position was an emergency nurse or critical care nurse in the 44th EVAC Hospital. I returned home in May of 1991 but stayed on active duty due to an injury. While at Ft. Sill, I was assigned to help out-process other Reserve and National Guard Soldiers. By November 1991, I was back to my Reserve Unit making plans to attend Officer Advanced in San Antonio.

I felt that I wanted to expand my career in the military and do something different. I was given the chance to move to a Drill Sergeant training Battalion, so I became the Company Commander at the 3/378th, 95th Training Division. As the Commander, I saw individuals come into the military and witnessed their transformation to becoming Soldiers. I continued with my military education throughout this time frame. After moving up in the Battalion, I eventually transferred to the Division Headquarters where I worked with the Surgeon. In 1995, I was again placed on active duty to help prepare and ensure the Soldiers that were being sent overseas from the 95th Division were medically and mentally prepared to help support ongoing operations for Operation Enduring Freedom and Operation Iraqi Freedom. When our Soldiers returned, I then assisted the Soldiers with obtaining any medical or mental health support that they needed. I spent 9 years on Active Duty during this time frame. In December 2015, I retired from the Military.

My civilian career of nursing started in 1988. I worked primarily in the Emergency Department or Intensive Care Unit before going into Correctional Nursing. As a nurse, it was always important to listen to the patient and their family so that I could convey their concerns to the doctor. I thoroughly enjoyed being a nurse and continue to stay current on medical innovations.

I want to work with the Legion members in Oklahoma to bring our Department to the forefront in our communities and state. As Legion members we can do so much together. I have worked with members from all over our state trying to increase membership, helping to exchange ideas among the different Posts, and just being there to listen to you when needed. National Executive (NEC) Committeeman

WHAT IS THE NEC?

While running for office the past few years and from time to time when I visit Posts, the question comes up, "What is the NEC and what do they do?"

NEC stands for National Executive Committeeman and is the elected Department Representative to the National American Legion governing body, the National Executive Committee. The American Legion National Constitution authorizes this position as well as the ANEC, which stands for Alternate National Executive Committeeman, an individual elected who has no official function other than to fill the position of NEC at national meetings, if NEC is unable to attend.

The NEC must attend each National Executive Committee meeting that is held in Legion Headquarters in Indianapolis in the Spring and Fall and the two NEC meetings held during the National Convention and vote on issues presented. In addition, the NEC usually attends the Washington Conference in Washington, DC to meet with our State's national senators and national district representatives to encourage them to support legislation which helps veterans across our State and provide funding to the VA. The NEC, along with the Department National Legislative Committeeman are the head and point of contact for the Oklahoma delegation attending the Washington Conference.

Any Legion member in good standing can attend the Fall and Spring meetings as well as the National Convention and the Washington Conference at their own expense or if they represent a State Agency or other organization at their expense.

The Department of Oklahoma each year is authorized by National to have 25 National Committee appointments, such as Americanism, National Security, VA&R and others. These appointments are usually authorized for one year, but in some cases are for three-year appointments. The NEC makes recommendations of Department Legion members in good standing, usually those with Post, District or Department leadership experience or who have expressed an interest in a certain field, to National for National Committee appointments. These individuals are then presented to the National Committee on Committees at the Fall Meeting, where the applicants are reviewed by the Committee members, questions asked and answered and approved. These individuals are then presented to the NEC and voted on, yes or no, and sent to the National Commander who signs the appointment letters which are mailed to the National Committee appointees.

Department of Oklahoma is authorized 14 call-ins where a monetary stipend is given for attendance in person, for the National Convention, 6 call-ins for the Washington Conference and 2-each call-ins for the Fall and Spring meetings. Each meeting is restricted by different committees, determined by National who will be eligible to attend, The NEC selects the

individuals recommended for call-ins, and are approved or disapproved by the National Adjutant. The National Commander sometimes makes recommendations for call-in appointments from Departments also.

The NEC is a part of the Department Leadership Team, attends Department and District conventions and conferences and serves an advisory role to Department Officers and the leadership team. The NEC does not make State or District appointments but does offer counsel and recommendations based on experience and ability.

The NEC is the point of contact between Department and National regarding visiting National officials and National issues that may arise. The Department Commander and Adjutant are in frequent, sometimes daily, contact with National over issues such as membership, financial assistance, new and old Legion programs that are on-going, etc.

In the words of Past National Commander Gaither Keener from North Carolina, Chairman of the National Finance Committee and described by my predecessor as "smartest guy in the room", the biggest problem with NEC's has been lack of communication between with the NEC's and Blue Caps across each Department. That's why you will see me, visiting Posts across the State, attending District and Department meetings and putting something in the Department newsletter each month to improve communication with Post members.

I also see myself as a mentor to younger and new members who will be the future leaders of our Department.

If you have a question or concerns, feel free to contact me. I will get back to you even though I am still working full-time. Sometimes others in the room may not have the complete or correct information.

Let's work together to make things better for our veterans.

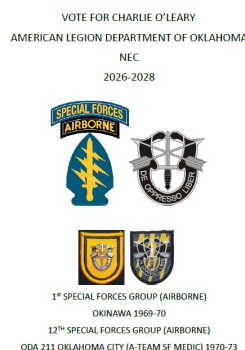
I have tried to get new and younger Legion leaders to step up and get involved, have had some success in that endeavor and would like to continue for another two years.

Past Department Commander's Corner

Living the Four Pillars, Where It Matters Most

The four pillars of The American Legion are not abstract ideas reserved for speeches or ceremonies. They are meant to be lived, every day, at the Post level. When they are, the Post becomes more than a meeting place. It becomes the center of its community.

During training at Mid-Winter, I posed a simple but important question: If your Post locked its doors tomorrow, would your community even notice?

If the honest answer is no, that should give us pause. Not as criticism—but as a call to reflect and recommit.

Today, our responsibility is broader than ever. We must be aware of all veterans, not just the select few who already feel comfortable walking through our doors. Every veteran raised their hand and swore an oath. Every veteran served with honor. And every veteran deserves to know there is a place for them in The American Legion—whether that's in an existing Post or, when necessary, by helping start a new one.

No veteran should be left aside or excluded. Inclusion is not optional—it is foundational to who we are.

That leads directly to the second point: help and support, and the role of a Past Department Commander (PDC).

A Past Department Commander's role is simple in definition, but powerful in practice: to help wherever they can, however they can.

Imagine trying to move a group forward in 2026 without computer skills—no email, no online forms, no digital tools, yet still wanting to serve, organize, and belong. There are veterans facing exactly that reality. When a Past Department Commander steps in, not for authority, not for recognition, but simply to give time, knowledge, and experience so fellow veterans can succeed, that is selfless service in its purest form.

Many of us don't think twice about technology anymore. But for some veterans, it is a barrier, not a convenience. Leadership means meeting people where they are, not expecting them to catch up on their own.

No veteran should be left behind because they don't understand a computer, a form, or a process.

That's what service looks like.

That's what leadership looks like.

When we truly live the four pillars at the Post level, our communities notice. Veterans feel welcomed. And The American Legion continues to fulfill its purpose, not just in words, but in action.

VA Burial Benefit Fact Sheet

**PLANNING AND SCHEDULING A BURIAL
AT A VA NATIONAL CEMETERY**

The Department of Veterans Affairs (VA) National Cemetery Administration (NCA) ensures those who served this nation are never forgotten. VA operates more than 155 national cemeteries and maintains more than 4 million graves to honor their service and sacrifice. Burial services at VA national cemeteries are provided at no cost to eligible Veterans, their spouses, and qualifying family members.

If you've lost a loved one and need to plan a burial at a VA national cemetery, we are here to guide you through the process. In many cases, we can schedule the burial with a single phone call.

- 1. Gather Information and Documents:** Collect personal information identifying the deceased* and military documents showing the Veteran's qualifying service. If the Veteran's discharge documents are not readily available, do not delay calling the Scheduling Office; VA will get copies of them.
- 2. Decide on Burial Details:** Determine the cemetery location, type of burial, and whether you will be requesting military funeral honors. If you are using a funeral home, your funeral director will assist.
- 3. Contact the National Cemetery Administration:** Contact the National Cemetery Scheduling Office to schedule a burial. If you have a pre-need decision letter, VA will already have much of the required information.

*A death certificate is not usually required but may be in some cases. A representative will explain if needed.

Progress, Transparency, and What's Ahead for Oklahoma Veterans
January 16 Oklahoma Veterans Commission Meeting

The January 16 meeting of the Oklahoma Veterans Commission was a strong and productive one, marked by thoughtful discussion, transparency, and a shared commitment to serving Oklahoma's veterans better every day.

The Commission worked through a full and substantive agenda, including Commission business, future meeting dates, Foundation bylaws, and key reports from Oklahoma Department of Veterans Affairs (ODVA) leadership. The dialogue throughout the meeting was open, professional, and focused squarely on accountability, progress, and long-term impact.

We were also honored to welcome Senator Brenda Stanley and Taylor Poindexter as guests. Their time, interest, and engagement reflect the importance of collaboration and shared responsibility when it comes to supporting Oklahoma's veteran community.

One of the most encouraging highlights of the January 16 meeting was the financial update. ODVA is in the black for the first time in a very, very long time. This milestone reflects disciplined stewardship, hard work by the ODVA team, and a renewed focus on fiscal responsibility—progress that directly strengthens our ability to serve veterans and their families across the state.

In addition to Commission business, we continue to build momentum around the Veterans Forum, which has proven to be a valuable space for veterans to ask questions, raise concerns, and receive clear, straightforward information. Looking ahead, the next Veterans Forum will include representatives from the VA, who will be available to answer questions directly and help veterans better navigate benefits, services, and resources.

Legion Family,

I hope everyone stayed warm and safe during the recent winter storm.

I want to take a few moments to clear up some rumors and questions surrounding the Department of Oklahoma's 10-Gun Drawing and to explain what your Department Fundraising Committee has been working on behind the scenes.

The Fundraising Committee was formed and approved by the Department DEC not only to raise funds, but to streamline and strengthen all Department fundraising efforts. Our goal is simple: maximize profits for the Department while ensuring accountability and transparency. We set achievable goals, focus on one or two projects at a time, and do not move forward until those goals are met—so nothing gets forgotten or pushed aside.

Because the 10-Gun Drawing is the Department's top fundraiser, it received a great deal of attention from the committee. During our review of previous years, we discovered some serious issues. First, there was no longer a reliable system to track how many tickets were distributed or which Posts had them. We also found multiple concerns (though no direct proof) that some Posts may have been selling tickets and not turning in stubs or the \$5 per ticket owed to the Department. This not only takes money out of your pocket as members, but it also potentially defrauds the public by selling tickets that were never entered into the drawing. We found this completely unacceptable.

We also discovered that four firearms from a drawing three years ago were never picked up. This again showed a lack of accountability and raised serious concerns. We attempted to contact the original winners and were able to reach one gentleman, who graciously donated the firearm back to the Department to be used in the current drawing.

That meant we already had 4 of the 10 guns needed. Several Posts stepped up and donated toward the remaining six, and we were able to get an excellent deal. In past years, the Department typically spent over \$10,000 on the firearms. This year, including the four recovered guns, we spent only \$4,800 — a savings of \$5,200.

Next, we looked at ticket costs. In the past, the Department paid around \$2,500 for 5,000 tickets. We found a new printer who could deliver within three days and printed the same 5,000 tickets for \$750 — a savings of \$1,750.

Altogether, before a single ticket is sold, your Fundraising Committee has already saved the Department \$6,950. Another way to look at it is that the potential profit from this year's drawing has already increased by \$6,950. That is a big win for the Department of Oklahoma.

Now that we have the guns and tickets, the next step is distribution to the Posts. Based on past issues and the repeated calls from members and DEC leadership for more accountability, we implemented a new system.

Every Post is now required to sign a 10-Gun Drawing Agreement Form for the tickets they receive. This ensures we know exactly which Post has which tickets and how many. The agreement states that any tickets—sold or unsold—that are not turned in will require the Post to pay the Department \$5 per ticket. If all tickets are returned (sold or unsold) by the first day of Department Convention in July 2026, there is nothing to worry about.

We also saved additional money by not printing posters this year. Instead, a flyer was designed at no cost for the Department and has been emailed out by the Department Adjutant to all Posts with email addresses on file.

The Department Fundraising Committee works for you, the members of the Department of Oklahoma, and we take that responsibility seriously. This is your money, your fundraiser, and your Department.

Department Blood Program Chair

FROM THE DEPARTMENT BLOOD DONOR PROGRAM CHAIR

As Blood Donor Committee Chair, I submitted a report at the Winter Convention and need your help to accomplish strong Department participation for 2025-2026. It was short but emphasized the ease each post could develop a strong Blood Donor Program even if few legionnaires were personally able to donate.

The American Legion has maintained a formal Blood Donor Program since 1942, as an element of the National Security Pillar and includes active encouragement for the donation of blood, platelets, and plasma to support national security and community health. The program works in partnership with organizations like the American Red Cross and Our Blood Institute to address chronic shortages, particularly during crises.

Key Aspects of the American Legion Blood/Platelet/Plasma Program:

- Resolution and Advocacy: The Legion encourages its posts to host drives and members to donate, often recognizing departments with the highest participation at their national convention.
- Significance of Platelets: The program highlights that platelets are essential for cancer patients and those with weakened immune systems, and they can be donated as frequently as every seven days (up to 24 times a year).
- Plasma Donation: Members are encouraged to donate plasma, particularly for initiatives like convalescent plasma (e.g., during the COVID-19 pandemic).
- Impact: In 2022-2023, American Legion posts held drives with over 59,800 donors contributing 100,784 pints of blood.

Only 66 of our 164 Oklahoma Posts submitted a 2025 Consolidated Post Report, used for Department histories and National reporting to Congress. And only 26 of our Posts claimed blood collections on their CPR. Nationally, 3422 Posts claimed blood collections for a total of 62,711 units, an average of 18.325 units. Wisconsin collected over 10,000. Minnesota collected over 11,000. Oklahoma collected 1,141 units. We can do better. I'll be glad to work with you to establish a Blood Collection Program that will require very little effort using Bloodmobile or a suitable collection site.

The American Red Cross (ARC) estimates that more than 44,000 blood donations are needed every day in the United States to meet the demand for blood. That equates to, roughly, one donation every two seconds.

Our Blood Institute (formerly Oklahoma Blood Institute) operates 10 dedicated donor centers across Oklahoma. Key locations include Ada, Ardmore, Broken Arrow, Central Oklahoma City, Edmond, Enid, Lawton, Norman, Northwest Oklahoma City, and Tulsa. These locations serve more than 95% of the state's hospitals and medical facilities. In addition to the 10 permanent centers, numerous mobile blood drives are held weekly at schools, businesses, and community locations, in all 77 counties of our state. These centers support over 160 hospitals and medical facilities in Oklahoma.

Both OBI and ARC provide collection service throughout state using their Bloodmobiles and can process 4 donors per collection hour. The Legion has no preference regarding what collection agency is used, only that we sponsor the collection via our support.

Legionnaires participate by giving blood and reporting it to their posts, which mark the donation on their annual Consolidated Post Reports (CPRs). Posts participate by hosting blood drives and listing the number of donors in attendance on their CPRs. Good ideas deserve sharing, stealing at times. The following is a link to Florida's 2025-2026 program and may provide inspiration for you. I intend to use it for my post to increase our success.

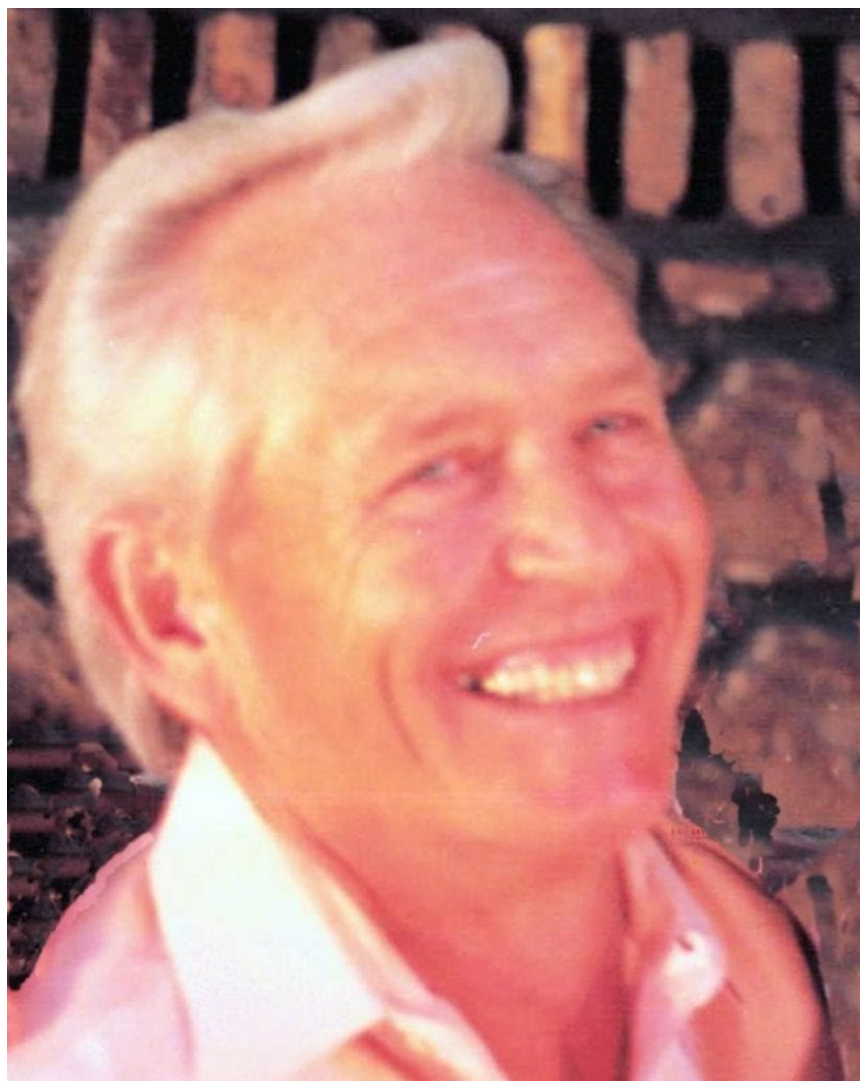
