The formation of Madinat in the Islamic world is based on a set of ethical values that were later transformed into a blueprint for an ideal city in the Arab region. These urban spaces witness the devleopment of Muslim civilization throughout history until today. At the heart of Arab urban discourse, women endowed and pioneered many important and outstanding architecture that have a crucial impact on the Muslim cityscape.

Urban space has long been designed by men for men in many records of history. Yet looking into Arab and Muslim urban civilizations, women have played significant roles in the making of the cities.

Inspired by the architecture of Louvre Abu Dhabi – designed by Jean Nouvel with inspiration from the Arab world where the galleries are modeled as Medinas and the rain of light from the dome inspired by the intertwined palm fawns of Al Ain Oasis, we examine the rich history and traditons of Arab architecture and urban development, and unveil women's contributions to the formation of buildings and urban spaces.

Throughout Islamic history, women have immense impact on the establishment of religious and civic buildings. Such buildings include monuments, mosques, madrasa (schools), tombs, caravansaries, hamami (Bath), and darussifa (hospital). For instane, Princess Dayfa Khatun, regent of Aleppo, provided the city with one of its famous monuments, the Madrasa al-Firdaws. Seljuq princess Safwat al-Mulk ordered the construction of an impressive funerary cupola. Nafisa al-Bayda, the wife of Egyptian Mamluk leaders Ali Bey al-Kabir and Murad Bey ordered and sponsored the building of the Sabil-Kuttab, a monumental public water fountain in Cairo.

These buildings greatly enriched Islamic architecture, shaped the identity of Muslim cities, and contributed to the progress of Islamic societies, as they reflect women's needs and relationships with space, especially urban space. The functionality and characteristics of these buildings reflect women's various political and social roles and daily practices in societies, from performing Islamic rituals, to education and community services.

The remarkable contributions of women from Arab and Muslim region in the progress of Islamic architecture and urban development in history inspire women of today to participate and lead in urban management and governance. In order to truly archieve inclusive and sustainable cities, we

must put women at the core of urban planning – understanding women's needs and habits, ensuring women's safety and comfort, recognizing and celebrating women's crucial role in the development of urbanism in the Arab and Muslim region.

## Carolina Collazos -- Presenter and Moderator Museum Educator at Louvre Abu Dhabi, UAE

Carolina was born and raised in Colombia. She has lived, studied and worked in Colombia, the United States, France, Egypt and the United Arab Emirates. Carolina holds a Bachelor's degree in History of Art & Archeology and Masters in History of Art Museum Studies both from Sorbonne University.

Carolina joined Louvre Abu Dhabi in 2017 when the museum opened its doors to the public. She works for the Education Department of Louvre Abu Dhabi as a Museum Educator. Key aspects of her responsibilities include extensive research to develop contents related to Louvre Abu Dhabi's collection, as well as educational programs for schools, universities and the general public. Carolina tours the museum visitors through the galleries in meaningful and engaging ways and is passionate about Louvre Abu Dhabi's vision, mission & narrative.

# Dr. Alamira Reem Al Hashimi– Panelist Urban planner, researcher, author, UAE



Alamira Reem Al Hashimi (PhD; MPL; BA Arch) is an urbanist, architect and historian. She is the first Emirati woman to be awarded a PhD in urban planning and is considered one of the leading researchers on the urban development of the UAE. Dr. Alamira Reem is actively engaged in government initiatives related to strategy and master planning, documentation and preservation of the built environment, knowledge development and outreach, and has over 15 years of local and international experience in urban planning and design. With an extensive research background, she has authored several publications, including Planning Abu Dhabi: An Urban History, a book that explores and documents Abu Dhabi's urban development. She regularly shares her expertise on UAE architecture and urbanism, place identity and branding, and urban theory and design at industry forums, conferences and universities around the world. Dr. Alamira Reem has dedicated herself to advancing architectural and planning knowledge of the UAE locally and globally, and has been featured as one of 150 Inspiring Emirati Women (Zahrat Al Khaleej), 17 Emirati Women you need to know about (Emirates Literature Foundation), and Five female Emirati writers shaping the country's literary scene (The National). She serves on the Board of Directors for the Emirates Planning Association and the Technical Committee for UAE Modern Heritage.

## Dr. Ahlam Zainal -- Panelist

Dr. Ahlam joined GFH Properties in 2019 and currently holds the role of Chief Development Officer. Dr. Ahlam has over 14 years of experience in field of architecture, urbanism and real estate project management with several previous positions in Amlak Social Insurance Organization Development Company, Bahrain Real Estate Investment (Edamah), Bahrain Mumtalakat Holding Company, Ithmaar Development Company, and the Urban Planning & Development Authority in Bahrain. She was Design Director and co-author of bid files including the Doha 2020 Olympic Bid, the winning bid file for the Qatar 2011 Asian Football Cup and the winning bid file for the 2010 World Indoor Championships in Athletics.
