
Experts are predicting 2018 to continue to be a positive year for real estate in Houston with an expected 2.4% increase in the number of jobs for Texans, continued increase of energy prices, increase in population and a post Hurricane Harvey rebound. Houston is currently in a seller's market at 3.2 months of inventory, but the inventory levels should rise as flooded homes begin to hit the market in the coming months as many remodeling projects finish.

Homeless Outreach Team (HOT) Houston Police Department

The Homeless Outreach Team (HOT) started as a pilot



program in January 2011. It was made a permanent program in the department after a very successful six-month pilot. Sgt. Stephen Wick, the team's current supervisor, and Senior Police Officer Jaime Giraldo developed and implemented the program.

Everyone on the Team sees these emails. so this is the quickest way to get a response.

HOT is comprised of one sergeant, four police officers, and three mental health professionals from The Harris Center for Mental Health and IDD. The team helps the homeless with the following: housing, Soc. Sec. Cards, passports, birth certificates, shelter referrals, medical equipment, employment, bus fare, medical care, mental health treatment.

The team works with several organizations, such as: SEARCH Homeless Services, Salvation Army, Healthcare for the Homeless, US Vets, Lord of the Streets, DeGeorge Veterans Housing, Palmer Way Station, Main Street Ministries, Star of Hope, Goodwill, Bread of Life.

The Goal of HOT is to obtain housing for the chronic homeless. www.houstoncit.org

Raggedy old signs hanging on posts all over our neighborhood look trashy.


BUT Lost Pet signs made by heart sick pet owners are disappearing the SAME DAY they are put up!

Ever hear a disappointed Texan say "I got the black bean"?

Here's the background story, it is uniquely Texan!

During the days of the Republic of Texas, one of the last raiding expeditions from Texas into Mexico was on December 23, 1842. 261 Texans crossed the Rio Grande river, attacking Mexican forces at the town of Mier. The Texans were outnumbered almost ten to one. Mexican losses were 600 killed and 200 wounded, against thirty Texans killed and



wounded; but after such a fight the Texans were hungry and thirsty due to low supplies, their gun powder was almost exhausted, and their discipline had begun to crack. A Mexican Officer suggested sending a white flag to the Texans and demanding their surrender; the ruse was

successful. All the Texans surrendered.

The able-bodied Texan prisoners were marched through river towns to Matamoros, where they were held until ordered to Mexico City. En route to the capital they planned their escape frequently. Finally, at Salado, on February 11, 1843, a successful break was carried out. The Texans fled north through the mountains, but became separated and lost and suffered for lack of water, and finally 176 of the men were recaptured within about a week.

Santa Anna (whom we whipped at the battle of San Jacinto in 1836) decreed that all who participated in the break out were to be executed, but his more sensible underlings got the order modified to an order to kill every tenth man.

The 17 victims were chosen by each blindfolded Texan drawing a bean from an earthen jar containing 176 beans, seventeen black beans being the tokens signifying death.



Commissioned officers were ordered to draw first; then the enlisted men were called as their names appeared on the muster rolls. William A. A. (Bigfoot) Wallace, standing close to the scene of the drawing, decided that the black beans were the larger and fingered the tokens successfully to draw a white bean. Observers of the drawing later described the dignity, the firmness, the light temper, and general courage of the men who drew the black beans of death. They were again blindfolded and then shot.



Captain William Kinchen Davis, came to Texas at age 8 in February 1830 and was one of the founding settlers/leading citizens of the town of Richmond in Ft. Bend County, Texas. He was also one of the Texans who escaped from Salado he drew a white bean. He was only 22 when he escaped from Salado in 1843, and wasn't released by Santa Anna until September of 1844, when he was given one dollar and told to find his own way home over 1000+ miles from Mexico City to Texas. He died in 1891 and is buried at Richmond, Texas, with other early Texas notables. (*Morton Cemetery, 401 N. 2nd Street, 16.5 miles from Briar Village.*)

Winter - the perfect time for TLC for roses and hibiscus

Roses and hibiscus do very well in our area and are landscape jewels. Here are a few caring basics.

Roses require sunlight in order to bloom adequately. Choose



a location that receives at least 6 hours of direct sunlight each day and ample space to allow plenty of air to circulate. Any sun loving plants make great companions for roses. They can complement the blossom color and shape as well as extend the bloom season. Roses thrive in well-drained soil that is high in organic matter; you'll

need to add organic matter to our soil for best results.

You'll need to dig your hole 12" deep and twice as wide as the root ball. The plant's crown (where the roots meet the woody cane or trunk) should be at ground level for our mild climate. Fill the hole with water, amended soil, and water thoroughly again. Cover the area around the rose with mulch to help with water retention and weed control.


Most roses require about one inch of rain weekly during their growing season. When it's necessary to water your roses, it is best to do so in the morning to give the sun a chance to dry out any moisture on the foliage. Water at the base of the plant and not overhead; that will help prevent disease.

Winter is the traditional time for pruning roses. Cut canes back 12" to 16", and cut about ½" above a leaf node (where a leaf is growing). Remove all dead canes for a healthier plant. Fertilize around Valentine's Day; spread the appropriate fertilizer around the perimeter of the plant.

Hibiscuses should be planted following the instructions in past articles: full sun requirements, watering adequately, and mulching. Hibiscuses also require fertilization; products

labeled for hibiscus are readily available and should be applied according to the label.

Hibiscuses do not need to be pruned; however, they bloom on new growth. Pruning causes new branches, and



Hibiscuses get yellow leaves as a part of their life cycle. They are not a concern.
