Updates from the BPCIA Board

As our state and country continue to work hard to overcome the COVID-19 pandemic which has impacted each of our lives greatly, the Board has also continued to work towards a plan for how to safely resume monthly meetings, open up the community facilities, and plan for social events. The Board had previously canceled the March and April monthly meeting as well as several April events in accordance with state and county Stay-at-Home Orders.

Governor Abbott has recently issued several Executive Orders which begin the process of opening back up the state. However, at this time, these openings are in a limited fashion and only to the extent social distancing and sanitizing requirements are met. The Board is in the process of evaluating these requirements so that it can determine how to best open our facilities.

The Board will hold its regularly scheduled monthly meeting for May on May 28, 2020. The meeting will be conducted primarily via Zoom and the information for how to join the meeting will be posted on the BV website and the bulletin board outside of the clubhouse prior to the meeting. This meeting will be an open meeting that all residents are invited to attend and we will provide residents an opportunity to speak towards the end of the meeting just as we would if we were meeting in the clubhouse. We are also looking into the possibility of allowing residents who would like to attend the meeting the ability to do so but seating will be limited to comply with the Governor's 25% occupancy maximum and social distancing guidelines.

The Board is committed to being as transparent as possible during this time. We will continue to provide updates via the BV website and do our best to respond to resident questions posted thereon. 'The call has been answered': Animal shelters across the U.S. are emptying amid coronavirus pandemic

As coronavirus spreads across the U.S., Americans in some of the country's hardest-hit regions have stepped up to foster and adopt animals, keeping them out of shelters. NBC News contacted shelters and animal advocacy organizations with facilities in California, Michigan, New Jersey, Connecticut, New York, Texas, Washington, Florida, Georgia, Illinois, and North Carolina. Every single organization said it was overwhelmed by the outpouring of community support that got animals out of shelters and into loving foster and adoptive homes.

Humane Society of the United States President and CEO Kitty Block said that the organization has worked with its 400 shelter partners to spread the word about the need to clear shelters by placing pets with foster and adoptive homes. "The call has been answered," Block said.

Matt Bershadker, president and CEO of the American Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals (ASPCA), said that the organization has seen a 70 percent increase in animals entering foster care in their New York City and Los Angeles programs compared to this time last year.

In Los Angeles, Bershadker said the organization is delivering kittens to foster and adoptive families using ride-sharing apps. A spokesperson for Los Angeles County Animal Services told NBC News in an email that the county placed 307 animals in foster care and found homes for 919 pets in March.

Victoria Gingrey, a spokesperson for The Humane Society for Tacoma and Pierce County in hard-hit Washington state, told NBC News that the shelter has placed 475 animals in adoptive homes since March 1. The shelter had only 25 animals available for adoption as of Wednesday, which Gingrey said is "pretty low" for this time of year.

The Liberty Humane Society shelter in Jersey City, New Jersey, across the Hudson River from the pandemic's epicenter in New York City, put out a plea to the public to foster pets, but Executive Director Irene Borngraeber said she did not know whether people would step up to care for the animals.



Borngraeber said the shelter was "overwhelmed" by the level of response they received from the public. "We were actually able to place every single one of our animals into foster care, the day before [New Jersey's] shelter-in-place order formally went into place," she said.

Baytown Texas Adoption Center was able to clear out its shelter by March 28. The shelter, just 30 minutes outside of Houston, had no foster program in place when the state announced its first coronavirus case on March 4. But April Moore, the animal services manager for the city, said that the shelter began building a foster program on March 16. Just eight days later, the shelter placed its first dog in a foster home. The shelter had just one dog left in its care when NBC News spoke to Moore on Wednesday.

In Georgia, shelters have also found success placing animals in adoptive and foster homes. "We've seen an incredible outpouring of support," Atlanta Humane Society Spokesperson Christina Hill, said. "It's been really heartwarming to see that."

Now for the bad news

The shelters are empty now, but experts worry about the future. Shelter directors told NBC News they worry that the economic impact of the pandemic, which hit the U.S. at the start of peak breeding season, may cause an influx of homeless pets in the coming months.

2020 Hurricane Season Will Be Here Soon

Hurricane season will be here soon and many of the major forecast centers are already predicting that the 2020 season could be significantly more active than normal. The latest seasonal forecast comes from Pennsylvania State University which is calling for 20 named storms (the average is 12) in the Atlantic. This would make 2020 the second most active season on record in terms of the number of storms.

Houstonians are very familiar with tropical storms and hurricanes. Past storms have given us the knowledge that nothing good will come from panic, but that we should be prepared. While I do not suggest stockpiling a year's supply of toilet paper, here are some things that you should have on hand should we need to weather a storm:

Cash - Banks and ATMs may not be open or available for extended periods.

Water - at least one gallon per person per day for three to seven days, plus water for pets.

Food - at least enough for three to seven days, including: Non-perishable packaged or canned food and juices, food for infants and the elderly, snack food, non-electric can opener, vitamins, paper plates, plastic utensils.

Radio - battery powered and NOAA weather radio with extra batteries.

Blankets, pillows etc.

Clothing - seasonal, rain gear/ sturdy shoes.

First Aid Kit - plus medicines, prescription drugs.

Special items - for babies and the elderly, ie. toys, books, games, diapers.

Toiletries - hygiene items, moist wipes, sanitizer.

Flashlight and batteries.

Pet care items, proper identification, immunization records, ample food and water, medicine, a carrier or cage, leash.

Cooks Corner: Disney Parks Churro Bites



Ingredients

1 cup water
8 tablespoons butter
1/4 teaspoon salt
1/4 teaspoon ground cinnamon, divided
1/4 cups all-purpose flour
3 eggs
1/2 cups vegetable or canola oil
1/2 cup sugar

Instructions

Combine water, butter, salt, and ¼ teaspoon cinnamon in a saucepan over medium heat. Bring pot to rolling boil. Reduce heat to low.

Add flour and stir vigorously until mix forms a ball. Remove from heat and let rest for 5-7 min. Add eggs, one at a time, and stir until combined. Set aside.

Heat oil in medium skillet or saucepan over medium-high heat or until temp reaches 350°.

Spoon dough into piping bag fitted with large star tip. Pipe 1-inch strip of dough over saucepan, cut with knife, and drop into hot oil. Repeat until churro bites fill saucepan with room to fry.

Fry churro bites until golden brown. Remove with slotted spoon or mesh spider strainer.

Mix sugar and ½ teaspoon cinnamon in medium bowl. Toss in churro bites until coated. Enjoy!

There are many resources available to help you, and luckily, in Houston, we can garden practically year-round. We have warm-season crops, hot-season crops and cool-season crops. To know what vegetables to plant in what month, "google" Harris County AgriLife Extension Service. At this website, click on "Horticulture", then click on "Vegetables & Herbs". This leads to a Planting Calendar specifically for Harris County which you can printout as a PDF file. Planting the right vegetable in the right month is critical to your success. Nurseries sell lots of vegetable transplants, but with your Planting Calendar you can avoid planting mistakes like buying small tomato plants in May. (You CAN grow tomatoes again in the fall, however. Start seeds indoors around July 4th or purchasing transplants in August. Varieties with shorter maturity dates do best here in the fall.)

The same website offers a printout of specific varieties of vegetables that do well in our area, in addition to Easy Gardening Fact Sheets about each vegetable. Explore this website for other tips -- such as how to build a raised garden bed and -- a more budget-friendly approach -- how to raise vegetables in containers.

Building a vegetable bed (or a flower bed) does involve some start-up costs, but raised beds are highly recommended for our area to facilitate good drainage when we get "feast or famine" rains. Costs can be mitigated by using some recycled materials – often such items are offered for free on "NextDoor.com." If the budget can handle it, buy 2 eight-foot lengths of untreated 2 x 8 lumber at a box store and some 2" deck screws. Have them cut both pieces in half. This gives you one 4' x 4' garden box. Three lengths of lumber will make you a 4' x 8' garden box. Don't start any larger than this – the initial infill of soil will be your costliest investment.

Next, pick a level spot in your yard that receives 7 – 8 hours of sunlight and can be reached by a garden hose. If your garden box is 8" deep, you can place it on top of grass by laying a layer of unwaxed cardboard between the grass and the garden box. If your garden box is 6" deep, you'd be advised to remove the grass where you place your box. Fill the box with 2 parts top soil – or rose soil, and 1 part quality compost. (The compost/mulch industry is not regulated, so purchasing your compost from independent nurseries or the following sources might assure better quality produce.) Healthy, nutritious vegetables require the best compost you can afford. Later, you can learn to make your own. Compost adds organic matter, nutrients and aeration. Our yard soil is too compacted with clay to use alone. Calculators are available to determine the volume of soil/compost to buy. Check out gardeners.com/how-to/soil calculator.

When first building a garden bed, adding Azomite, Greensand or Lava Sand provides extra trace minerals. (Follow directions on packaging for correct amount to use. These products can be found at feed stores, Southwest Fertilizer in Bellaire, some hardware stores and independent nurseries.) Adding peat moss or expanded shale will provide water holding capacity and can be purchased at the same sources. Add a slow release fertilizer under each plant as you place them in the ground. Sharing these amendments among neighboring gardeners can cut costs, as only a little is needed.

More cost savings can be achieved by gardening in containers! There are caveats...Most any container can be used as long as it has enough drainage holes in the bottom and it sits up off the ground with bricks or spacers. Containers dry out quickly and require more frequent watering. Because frequent watering leaches out minerals and can cause compaction of the soil, special soil media are used. Soil-LESS media are usually recommended. This is all explained in another AgriLife Fact Sheet. "Google" extension + Vegetable Gardening in Containers. Hand watering with a cup is advised for all young plants and seed sprouts. Happy Gardening!

Swim at Your Own Risk

The Houston heat will be here soon! We would like to remind all residents that our neighborhood pool is "Swim at You Own Risk." This means that



there are no lifeguards on staff at the pool. BV made the decision mid season last summer after increasing difficulty finding reliable lifeguards. Making the decision to make our pool SAYOR means that we can enjoy this neighborhood amenity longer into the year, but please make sure that you and your family are following the posted pool rules. Propping the gate open or allowing other residents in who do not have an access card is prohibited. Only residents and their guests, who have current access cards are allowed to use the BV Pool. Additionally, only residents of homes current on BV Maintenance Fees are eligible for access cards. Access cards cost \$25 for each household and can be ordered from Graham Management. You can find the order form on briarvillage.com.

Pool Rules

- 1. Parents/Guardians must watch children at all times. NO LIFEGUARD IS ON DUTY.
- 2. Absolutely no glass containers, running, horseplay, diving, pushing, pets, loud/offensive/abusive language or behavior or smoking of any kind is tolerated within the pool gates.
- 3. Approved swimming/bathing suits or special swim-type diapers must be worn at all times.
- 4. All patrons must clean up after themselves.
- 5. No swimming during rain, lightning or thunderstorms.
- 6. Non-proficient swimmers are to be supervised by competent swimmers.
- 7. Gates shall be closed at all times. Persons inside the pool area MAY NOT open the gate for another person. A key card must be used to enter the pool area.
- 8. The baby pool is reserved for children 42 inches and shorter and must be supervised at all times.
- 9. No standing, sitting or playing with rope dividers.
