BPCIA Meeting Highlights September 24, 2020

On September 24, 2020, the Board held its monthly meeting *via* Zoom which was open to the community. The September meeting is also the annual meeting where the Board approves the budget for the following fiscal year.

This year a majority of the Board voted to increase maintenance fees by 5%. Below is a summary of the budget. A copy of the full budget can be obtained on the BV website or can be requested from Graham Management.

Swim at Your Own Risk

Our neighborhood pool is "Swim at You Own Risk." This means that there are no lifeguards on staff at the pool. Making the decision to make our pool SAYOR means that we can enjoy this neighborhood amenity longer into the year, but please make sure that you and your family are following the pool rules. Propping the gate open or allowing others in who do not have an access card is prohibited. If you prop the gate open for another person and that person has not signed a waiver, you will be personally liable for damage caused by, or personal injury to, the person you have allowed in. Only residents and their guests, who have current access cards and signed waivers are allowed to use the pool. Access cards cost \$25 for each household and can be ordered from Graham Management.

Pool Hours : Tuesday -Sunday 7am - 8:30pm Closed Monday

Pool Rules

- 1. Per Harris County and state-wide guidelines, face coverings must be worn when not swimming. Please follow CDC guidelines regarding washing your hands and social distancing.
- 2. Parents/Guardians must watch children at all times. **NO LIFEGUARD IS ON DUTY**.
- 3. Absolutely no glass containers, running, horseplay, diving, pushing, pets, loud/offensive/abusive language or behavior or smoking of any kind is tolerated within the pool gates.
- 4. Swimming/bathing suits or special swim-type diapers must be worn at all times.
- 5. All patrons must clean up after themselves.
- 6. No swimming during rain, lightning or thunderstorms.
- 7. Non-proficient swimmers are to be supervised by competent swimmers.
- 8. Persons inside the pool area MAY NOT open the gate for another person. A key card must be used to enter the pool area.
- 9. The baby pool is reserved for children 42 inches and shorter and must be supervised at all times.
- 10. No standing, sitting or playing with rope dividers.

CDC recommendations for a safe Halloween



Many traditional Halloween activities can be high-risk for spreading viruses. There are several safer, alternative ways to participate in Halloween. If you may have COVID-19 or you may have been exposed to someone with COVID-19, you should not participate in in-person Halloween festivities and should not give out candy to trick-or-treaters.

Low Risk Activities:

These lower risk activities can be safe alternatives:

- Carving or decorating pumpkins outside, at a safe distance, with neighbors or friends
- Doing a Halloween scavenger hunt where children are given lists of Halloween-themed things to look for while they walk outdoors from house to house admiring Halloween decorations at a distance
- Having a scavenger hunt-style trick-or-treat search with your household members in or around your home rather than going house to house
- Having a Halloween movie night with people you live with

Moderate Risk Activities:

- Participating in one-way trick-or-treating where individually wrapped goodie bags are lined up for families to grab and go while continuing to social distance (such as at the end of a driveway or at the edge of a yard)
 - If you are preparing goodie bags, wash your hands with soap and water for at least 20 second before and after preparing the bags.
- Having a small group, outdoor, open-air costume parade where people are distanced more than 6 feet apart
- Attending a costume party held outdoors where protective masks are used and people can remain more than 6 feet apart
 - A costume mask (such as for Halloween) is not a substitute for a cloth mask. A costume mask should not be used unless it is made of two or more layers of breathable fabric that covers the mouth and nose and doesn't leave gaps around the face.
 - Do not wear a costume mask over a protective cloth mask because it can be dangerous if the costume mask makes it hard to breathe. Instead, consider using a Halloween-themed cloth mask.
- Going to an open-air, one-way, walk-through haunted forest where appropriate mask use is enforced, and people can remain more than 6 feet apart
 - If screaming will likely occur, greater distancing is advised. The greater the distance, the lower the risk of spreading a respiratory virus.
- Visiting pumpkin patches or orchards where people use hand sanitizer before touching pumpkins or
 picking apples, wearing masks is encouraged or enforced, and people are able to maintain social
 distancing
- Having an outdoor Halloween movie night with local family friends with people spaced at least 6 feet apart
 - If screaming will likely occur, greater distancing is advised. The greater the distance, the lower the risk of spreading a respiratory virus.

Cooks Corner: Cookout Recipes Pumpkin Chocolate Chip Cookies



INGREDIENTS

21/4 c. all-purpose flour

1 tsp. baking soda

1 tsp. pumpkin pie spice

1/2 tsp. kosher salt

1 c. (2 sticks) unsalted butter, softened

3/4 c. brown sugar

1/2 c. granulated sugar

3/4 c. pumpkin purée

1 large egg

2 tsp. pure vanilla extract

2 c. semi-sweet chocolate chips

DIRECTIONS

Preheat oven to 375° and line two large baking sheets with parchment paper.

In a small bowl, whisk together flour, baking soda, pumpkin spice, and salt.

In a large bowl using a hand mixer, cream together butter and sugars until light and fluffy. Beat in pumpkin, egg, and vanilla extract until combined, then add flour mixture. Beat on low until no raw flour appears, then fold in chocolate chips. Refrigerate dough for 30 minutes.

Scoop 1" balls onto prepared baking sheets, 2 inches apart, and bake until puffed up and golden around edges, about 12 minutes.

REMINDER: Yard Signs



This is a reminder that all political yard signs must be removed within **10 days** after the election. This includes both signs supporting a particular candidate or party as well

as signs supporting a political/religious cause (e.g. pro-life, pro-choice, BLM, Blue Lives Matter, etc.). Any signs which remain in the yard after this date will be in violation, and a violation notice will be sent. The Board will not be making any exceptions based on the content of any person's sign nor will any signs be "grandfathered" in because they have existed in the yard for any extended period of time.


