According to the Harris County Flood Control District, our HOA board can request to have a walking path mowed for the use of our residents. This area would require no additional maintenance or money from our residents. The area in question is approximately .9 miles, running on both sides of the ditch from piping rock to the Kickarillo community. This area is not only home to various creatures and plants that can be greatly appreciated, but a potential area that the BV community members can utilize for both enjoyment and health benefits.

During Covid, we have seen the numbers of people utilizing the sidewalks and other community areas greatly increase. With Covid 19 keeping a large amount of people out of their gyms and even offices, having a place for people to be active has become a necessity.

The benefits of applying for the additional mowing would include:

- No additional cost to the residents

- No path connecting Westheimer. This would only be the north section of the ditch.

BPCIA Meeting Highlights August 27, 2020

On August 27, 2020, the Board held its monthly meeting *via* Zoom which was open to the community.

It was reported by each of the Board members that all is running well with their respective committees and there was little to report in terms security concerns. The Board discussed possible events for September and October taking into considerations state and local regulations currently in place. Lastly, the Board received an update on communications with VF Waste regarding complaints the residents have made the last several months. It was reported that VF Waste was put on notice of its various breaches and the potential cancellation of its contract approximately a week before the meeting. Since then, VF Waste supervisors have been in contact with a Board representative regarding complaints, replaced a driver on our route, and are sending supervisors to follow the trash trucks at random intervals to ensure compliance and retraining. The Board is pleased with the response to date and will continue to evaluate the situation to ensure consistent performance.

In September, the Board will hold its annual 'budget meeting' to vote on the budget for next year. At this meeting the Board will vote on whether or not to raise HOA dues and whether or not to continue with contracts for vendors which are set to expire. This is an important meeting so if you want your voice to be heard, make sure to show up! At this time, it is most likely that the next meeting will be held via Zoom.

Swim at Your Own Risk

Our neighborhood pool is "Swim at You Own Risk." This means that there are no lifeguards on staff at the pool. Making the decision to make our pool SAYOR means that we can enjoy this neighborhood amenity longer into the year, but please make sure that you and your family are following the pool rules. Propping the gate open or allowing others in who do not have an access card is prohibited. If you prop the gate open for another person and that person has not signed a waiver, you will be personally liable for damage caused by, or personal injury to, the person you have allowed in. Only residents and their guests, who have current access cards and signed waivers are allowed to use the pool. Access cards cost \$25 for each household and can be ordered from Graham Management.

Pool Hours : Tuesday -Sunday 7am - 8:30pm Closed Monday

Pool Rules

- 1. Per the new Harris County guidelines, face coverings must be worn when not swimming. Please follow CDC guidelines regarding washing your hands and social distancing.
- 2. Parents/Guardians must watch children at all times. **NO LIFEGUARD IS ON DUTY.**
- 3. Absolutely no glass containers, running, horseplay, diving, pushing, pets, loud/offensive/abusive language or behavior or smoking of any kind is tolerated within the pool gates.
- 4. Swimming/bathing suits or special swim-type diapers must be worn at all times.
- 5. All patrons must clean up after themselves.
- 6. No swimming during rain, lightning or thunderstorms.
- 7. Non-proficient swimmers are to be supervised by competent swimmers.
- 8. Persons inside the pool area MAY NOT open the gate for another person. A key card must be used to enter the pool area.
- 9. The baby pool is reserved for children 42 inches and shorter and must be supervised at all times.
- 10. No standing, sitting or playing with rope dividers.

Briar Village is finishing off the summer selling months in strong fashion. This past month there were five sold properties at the average price of \$250,000. Home inventory is down to just eleven active listings and reflects the overall lower home inventory of the Greater Houston Market. The average lease price stayed consistent at \$1700 with three homes leasing.

The Greater Houston Real Estate Market broke records in July. It was the first time ever that Houston had over 10,000 single family homes sell. With the low interest rates and strong buyer demand, it has brought the inventory level to just 3.0 months of inventory. The average sales price increased to \$338,000, a new July record.

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The State Fair of Texas Is Opening a Drive-thru

In years past, the news that you could buy a Fletcher's Corny Dog without leaving your car would be just okay. Good, I guess, if you're extremely into convenience and fried food. But in a normal year, the thought of driving to Fair Park to get a corny dog and some deep-fried Oreos without ever even getting out of the car would not make most of us unexpectedly emotional.

This is not a normal year, though, and when the State Fair of Texas announced on Wednesday that it will be offering some of the deep-fried hits of the festival's food booths to visitors on a drive-thru basis, emotional it was. Like pretty much every other large-scale social event in America, the State Fair was canceled in response to the COVID-19 pandemic, making 2020 the first year since World War II in which North Texas's signature fall gathering would not occur. Alas, this year there would be no chainsaw carving, no slam-dunk exhibitions, no vegan sculptors crafting Mount Rushmore out of butter, and no Funnel Cake Bacon Queso Burgers. This year, Big Tex would not wave from on high at the revelers gathered there to celebrate being alive together under the Texas sun (and also deep-fried junk food).

That is, he wouldn't be doing that until the State Fair of Texas announced that it would be welcoming visitors for a drive-thru version of the festival on weekends from September 25 to October 18. Visitors will purchase their tickets in advance beginning September 2, reserving a two-hour slot during which they can drive through the fair grounds, taking a photo with Big Tex (who'll be wearing a giant mask, naturally) and receiving an abundance of artery-clogging delights: Fletcher's Corny Dogs, Stiffler's Fried Oreos, french fries, cotton candy, and kettle corn, plus soft drinks. Tickets cost \$65 for a two-person package, and \$99 for enough food to feed four. (Prices are per vehicle, each of which can hold up to eight people, per State Fair of Texas rules -the tickets simply reflect how much food you'll receive.)

The wilder, more adventurous creations for which culinary fabulists are rightly celebrated each year, unfortunately, won't be on display. "While we wish we could offer all your favorite Fair foods, the health



and safety of all involved remains the top priority," the event's website explains. This is more of a greatest-hits collection, with turkey legs and sausage sticks available a la carte for an additional fee. But that feels right in 2020, a year in which we've lost access to so many of the rituals we've developed to remind ourselves of what life can look like when it's good. These brief flashes that conjure the feeling of normal life are about familiarity, not novelty, and we would prefer to find ourselves unexpectedly weeping while eating a corn dog on a stick than while trying to figure out whatever the heck "Cherish Erbert Champagne" is. Call us traditionalists, if you must.

The professionally taken photos, included in the food packages, of families posing with a masked Big Tex waving down from on high will be an unusual souvenir for most who make attending the Texas State Fair part of an annual ritual. But this is an unusual year, and the attempt to capture some of the spirit of the event in a way that keeps visitors and the wider community safe and healthy feels right-maybe even inspiring. Big Tex, after all, rose like the phoenix of myth from his own funeral pyre just a few years ago, and when he looms over fairgoers now, he is a totem to rebirth. That resilience is on display throughout the State Fair this year, such as it is, and that is why the thought of safely enjoying fried Oreos in the midst of a pandemic is surprisingly emotional. This is Texas, and we will find a way to persevere, adapt, overcome, and drive through.

Cooks Corner: Cookout Recipes CINNAMON APPLE PUFFED PANCAKE




1 Honeycrisp apple, thinly sliced 1 tbsp brown sugar 6 tbsp unsalted butter, melted 4 eggs 2/3 c whole milk 2/3 c all-purpose flour 2 tsp vanilla extract 3/4 tsp cinnamon 1/2 tsp kosher salt whipped cream, for serving 1/2 c real maple syrup 2 tbsp unsalted butter 1/2 tsp cinnamon 1/2 tsp vanilla extract

- 1. Preheat the oven to 450 degrees F.
- 2. Arrange 3/4 of the apple slices in the bottom a 10-12 inch cast iron skillet and drizzle 4 tablespoons butter over the apples. Sprinkle the brown sugar over top of everything. Place the skillet in the center of the oven for 10 minutes.
- 3. Meanwhile, in a blender, combine the eggs, milk, flour, vanilla, cinnamon, salt and the remaining 2 tablespoons melted butter. Blend on high for 30 seconds to one minute or until the batter is smooth. Make sure no large clumps of flour remain. Remove the hot skillet from the oven and pour the batter into the skillet. Place the skillet in the center of the oven and bake for 18-20 minutes or until the pancake is fully puffed and browned on top. Do not open the oven during the first 15 minutes of cooking or you might deflate your pancake.
- 4. Remove the Dutch baby from the oven and serve topped with the remaining apple slices, whipped cream, and cinnamon syrup.

CINNAMON BUTTER MAPLE SYRUP

In a small saucepan, combine the maple, butter, and cinnamon and bring to a boil over high heat. Reduce the heat to medium and simmer for 3-5 minutes. Remove from the heat and stir in vanilla.

Surveys were on paper and survey monkey was also used. If a person did not follow instructions on the paper surveys, they were discarded but their comments have NOT been discarded.

In addition to the five issues that Briar Village residence ranked importance level, many residence also wrote in other issues not included on the form that they felt should be addressed. In the list to the right, the comments have been write in consolidated to show the number of times particular issue mentioned in the write-in survey results. This data has been listed in order of frequency and the number of times the issue was mentioned is following each catagory.

Home maintenance/upkeep - 11

Landscaping and lawn maintenance - 6

Homeless people nearby - 5

Traffic safety (speeding, stop signs, non-resident traffic) - 4

Trash at entrances to neighborhood and littering - 3

Vehicles parked in the street - 3

Flooding and Drainage concerns - 2

Neighborhood association fees - 2
