THE ANNUAL MEETING THAT WASN'T!

What we all thought was the routine Annual Meeting of Homeowners on February 6, 2025, was unfortunately anything but routine! There are several reasons why.

All homeowners in the Briar Park Community
Improvement Association (BV) received the notice of
the meeting late last fall or early December via the US
Postal Service. Also included was a Nomination Form and
a Proxy/Absentee Ballot in the event a homeowner was
unable to attend the meeting. The Nomination Form and
Ballot listed four (4) candidates running for the board with
instructions to vote for four new board members.

This caused confusion as there were only three (3), not four open board positions! When the board and Graham Management became aware of the error, steps were taken to get the word out as quickly as possible via an email blast to all those homeowners with registered email addresses. In the email, Graham apologized for the error and created a ballot which included the word "Corrected." The corrected ballot and explanation were posted on briarvillage.com.

On February 6, 2025, the Annual Meeting of Homeowners was called to order with fewer than 30/768 homeowners in physical attendance. The meeting proceeded and a "last call for ballots" was made before two Graham staff members and two homeowners from the audience moved to the clubhouse office to count, recount, and verify the ballots and proxies received so that new board members would be established. The homeowners' portion of the meeting was completed, and the meeting was recessed until the votes were tabulated and verified.

Problem Resolution

The Board asks residents not to contact service providers directly for problem resolution; please contact Teya Grayned-Viser at tviser@grahammanagementhouston.com.

Deed Restriction Violations (DRV)

Please review your Deed Restrictions, which are on the BV Website. If you receive a DRV Letter, please take it seriously, but please do not take it personally. The best course of action is to simply fix the problem and move on. If you are uncomfortable in any manner with a letter you received or need more time to remedy things, contact a board member or GMI - our management company - as soon as possible to discuss it.

Architectural Control Committee (ACC)

All improvements visible from the street must have ACC approval BEFORE work starts. Get the ACC Approval Form on the BV Website or from Graham Management.

BV Governing Docs & Forms

Under the "Resources" tab of the Briar Village <u>website</u>, there are links to important BV documents, including: deed restrictions, amendments and guidelines, and the CIA's formation documents. The Board also regularly posts the approved meeting minutes, past newsletters and important forms. under this tab.

Community Pool & Tennis Courts

Access Card required for admittance, and can be ordered for \$25 from Graham Management. Form is on the BV website. Please be mindful of the gate. The pool is closed for the season and will reopen in May.

Garbage and Recycling: Texas Pride Waste

- Pick-up Tuesday & Friday: Trash can only be put by the curb after 6:00 p.m. on Monday & Thursday or by 6:00 a.m. on Tuesday and Friday.
- Bagged Lawn Debris is not to be left curbside except at above times.
 Up to 8 bags or cans with weight limit 50 pounds each. Landscapers should be instructed to place bagged debris behind fences if their work does not coincide with the trash schedule.
- No construction debris, hazardous waste, tires.
- Bundle/tie limbs 4' long.
- Heavy Trash on Tuesday & Friday (dishwashers, water heaters, etc.)
 No more than 2 bulky items per trash day. Note you cannot put out
 bulky items and let them sit on the curb for 3 days while awaiting
 the next heavy trash pick up day. Deed restriction enforcement will
 occur.
- Recycle Day is Thursday use recycle bins only on Thursdays
- If Tues, Thurs or Fri are Holidays, pick-up is skipped
- Holidays are: New Year's Day, Memorial Day, Independence Day, Labor Day, Thanksgiving Day, and Christmas Day.

Discover the Joy of Backyard Birdwatching

Each winter, I look forward to the arrival of migrating birds through our neighborhood. Observing nature that unfolds right outside my door brings me a deep sense of peace and grounding.

During migration, a delightful variety of birds visit my yard. Yellow-rumped Warblers feast on the berries of my Wax Myrtle bushes, while Cedar Waxwings serenade the air with their sweet, high-pitched songs as they devour berries from my American Holly tree—often



leaving the branches nearly bare by the time they move on. American Goldfinches and other songbirds flock to my feeder, stocked with sunflower seeds, safflower, and peanuts. My three-tiered water fountain offers hydration and a place for bathing. Watching the birds take turns at their 'water hole' is always a joy, and the soothing sound of cascading water adds to the peaceful atmosphere. Ruby-throated Hummingbirds make brief appearances in March, returning in late August and staying through mid-October. They sip nectar from my Turk's cap, Mexican petunias (Ruellia), and other flowering plants, with my hummingbird feeders offering extra nourishment.

As winter gives way to spring, I'm treated to visits from House Wrens, Tufted Titmice, House Finches, Carolina Wrens, Carolina Chickadees, and occasional Robins. Year-round, there are visits from Red-bellied Woodpeckers, Mockingbirds, Blue Jays, and White-winged Doves. One of my greatest joys is watching a pair of resident Cardinals raise their young, their breathtaking songs filling the air. One year, a pair of Carolina Wrens built a nest in a hanging plant, raising their brood in its sheltered leaves.

If you're curious about the birds of Briar Village, I recommend Merlin Bird ID, a free app from Cornell University. It helps identify birds by photos and sounds and lets you create a 'Life List' of the species you've encountered. It's a fun and easy way to deepen your appreciation for the natural world!

Step outside, breathe in the fresh air, and take in the beauty of the world around you. Consider adding a feeder or water source to see what surprises you attract.

Nature has a way of soothing the spirit and awakening the senses.

Growing with Kids

Gardening is one of the few hobbies that offer hands-on activity involving science, math, language, health and nutrition. But don't tell the kids! Children involved in gardening activities gain so much more than we might imagine....

Environmental stewardship - once engaged in gardening children learn to see the earth as something full of life everywhere they look. Once they are able to appreciate how they are connected to this process they are more likely to take care and responsibility for our precious environment.

Practice in personal growth and social skills - children love to show us what they can do. What an awesome experience for a child to see that they can actually grow a pepper or even a lemon that they may only have seen in the grocery store. How about picking flowers for Mom or a neighbor and being able to say ..."I grew these myself!"

Learning about health and nutrition - growing their own food, even a few tomatoes, really gives kids insight into where their food comes from and what goes into their bodies. In addition, gardening is an awesome form of exercise for young and old.

Active learning - no science class can compare to seeing nature in action. When we are in our gardens we learn keen observation skills, whether looking for seeds to break through the earth or finding the butterfly caterpillars that have devoured the milkweed.



Joy - learning that simple pleasures are often the best and longest lasting. Joy in a sense of accomplishment, joy in the miracles of nature, joy from sharing with others, the joy of sheer beauty and more are all right in your own back yard. Encourage your kids to do a little gardening this Summer! Sometimes we have to be subtle in our approach or they will just think of it as work.

Here are a few ideas:

- Plant a fruit tree with the kids and have them help care for it.
- Plant a veggie or herb garden.
- Plant a butterfly garden or just add some butterfly plants to your landscape.
- Plant a few hummingbird attractive plants to the garden.
- Give the kids a "plot" of their own, to plant as they choose.
- Plant a tree and measure its growth each year.
- Grow a few things from seeds. Sunflowers, cosmos and zinnias are good choices for this time of year.
- Lay in a hammock or on the grass and just look around.

The sky, the bugs, the grass the flowers and the trees. Almost anywhere you look at the miracles of nature are there for your enjoyment.

This Summer we hope you and your family will "stop and smell the roses!"

A friendly DRV Reminder

Please familiarize yourself with the deed restrictions and if you have any questions about them contact Teya Grayned-Viser at (713) 334-8000 or tviser@grahammanagementhouston.com. If you need a copy of the deed restrictions, you can download them from the Document section of the Briarvillage.com website.

If you do receive a deed restriction violation ("DRV") letter from Graham Management, do not ignore it. We wish to encourage compliance, not to punish violators or generate revenue, so simply remedy the situation or contact Graham with questions. If you need more time to address the violation, contact Graham. However, taking no action at all will likley result in fines.

Thank you for understanding how adhering to the restrictions protects our home values and makes our neighborhood a more beautiful and pleasant place for us all to live.

THE ANNUAL MEETING THAT WASN'T! (continued from page one)

During that "time out", the board was notified that there was not a quorum of homeowners. A quorum is the minimum number of voting members physically present and those who completed/sent in their Corrected Ballots or Proxy. In a regular board meeting, there must be a quorum of directors present for the Board to conduct Association business. In an Annual Meeting, a quorum of homeowners is required. In our case, our bylaws state that a quorum is equal to 10 percent of homeowners or very simply 77 out of 768 homeowners. We did not meet that quorum due to low voter turnout at the meeting and the number of proxies/corrected ballots! The board was unaware of this until the vote counts were completed.

Because of the reason noted above, the board was advised that a Declining Quorum (sometimes called a Reduced Quorum) could be utilized. A Declining or Reduced Quorum occurs when the required quorum is reduced such that a meeting can be held. The meeting was recessed and reconvened several minutes later with Graham Management providing the explanation and information regarding the lack of quorum and Declining Quorum. In our case the required quorum was reduced by fifty percent, meaning that we needed only half of 77 homeowner votes to meet the requirements for the meeting and election.

The meeting continued after a couple of audience questions regarding the quorum were addressed by Graham. The election results were announced and shortly thereafter the meeting was adjourned.

A few days later, the board president, secretary, and Graham Management received an email from two concerned homeowners regarding the validity of the meeting because of utilizing a Declining Quorum and thus the election results. With the help of our legal counsel, the meeting was indeed declared invalid and another Annual Meeting was necessary.

Suffice to say lesson learned...a hard lesson!

Soooo, what does this mean for every homeowner? You should have received notice of the new Annual Meeting of Homeowners (May 08, 2025), accompanied by a nomination form and a Proxy/Absentee Ballot. If you have not, please go to briarvillage.com or contact Graham Management (tviser@grahammanagementhouston.com, 713-334-5055) to obtain a ballot. (Nomination Forms were due by Monday, April 7, but nominations will be taken from the floor as well at the meeting.)

What is also noticeably clear is that your participation in the annual election is essential! We all get busy with life-family obligations, work obligations, travel, illness, church activities, cooking, cleaning, home repair projects, volunteer activities and so much more, but PLEASE take a minute to mail or email your ballot or better yet, attend the meeting!

Living next to Cluckingham Palace?

How would you feel about your neighbors getting up to 6 chickens or rabbits and keeping them in their backyard? What about a vegetable garden in the middle of their front yard? There is a new house bill, HB294 under consideration by the Texas Legislature, that would allow all of this, with no ability of an HOA or Deed restrictions to stop it.

The bill seems to take away the HOA and Deed Restriction control that has governed neighborhoods for decades. The Agriculture Committee is currently considering whether or not to move this bill to the floor for a vote. These proposed rules may work in rural counties but not the tight living quarters in Houston subdivisions.
