Of course, this is not to say that buying and receiving gifts is an intrinsic evil but rather something we must do with some prudence and temperance. Our Holy Father, Pope Francis speaks often about the role of consumerism in our lives. He said this in an interview,


"It is not wrong to want to live better; what is wrong is a style of life which is presumed to be better when it is directed towards 'having' rather than 'being', and which wants to have more, not in order to be more but in order to spend life in enjoyment as an end in itself. It is therefore necessary to create life-styles in which the quest for truth, beauty, goodness and communion with others for the sake of common growth are the factors which determine consumer choices, savings and investments."

Here are some tips for being a more sustainable consumer this year.

- 1. When you receive a gift of clothing or purchase a toy for your children, donate an old item from your closet or toy chest to a Goodwill or St. Vincent de Paul. This prevents us from accumulating or hoarding and helps simplify our life.
- 2. Attempt to purchase products from companies that use resources sustainably, donate proceeds to charity, or are attune to humanitarian concerns. Certain product symbols can help you rest assured the product meets certain environmental or humanitarian criteria.







- 4. Try giving someone a non-material gift like going somewhere together: hiking, fishing, an evening out, or just time relaxing.
- 5. Give the gift of a charitable donation in that person's name. We all have people that are hard to shop for so why not donate to a charity that cares about the same things that person does.

Living Laudato Si' Highlights

Saint Thomas More High School

Saint Thomas More High School resides near the shores of Lake Michigan on Milwaukee's south side. STM's partnership with *Laudato Si' Project* began this past summer, with meetings with administrators who saw a need to engage students in stewardship projects and develop a school culture that is more in tune with environmental concerns.

Our partnership has continued into this school year and has yielded the beginning of a "Green Club", an afterschool group of students and faculty that dedicate themselves to education and stewardship work both at the school and in the neighboring community. *Laudato Si' Project* has received permission for students to use and work on the Archdiocese land commonly known as "seminary woods." This 60+ acre parcel is a beautiful remnant of lake Michigan mesic woodland and we will bring student groups there to explore and help with stewardship projects.



Wyoming Catholic College


