

We had such a blast running our *Care for Creation* prairie program for St. Anthony Preschool in Milwaukee. Nothing is more enjoyable than hearing “wow” and seeing the excitement in 2-5 year-olds as you show them some of the cool creatures that have lived or live in Wisconsin.

Although these young kids come from the “concrete jungle” they were eager to get hands-on with all things prairie. Whether it was monarch caterpillars, bison skulls, elk antlers or prairie roots, they were excited to learn what makes a prairie special. Caring for creation is more than just seeing what lives there and how it functions, it’s finding ways in your everyday life to be better stewards. We talked about the importance of planting native wildflowers in your yard/school and created monarch butterflies to remind us. St. Anthony School is now interested in creating a butterfly garden!

We love our butterflies and pollinators and no better way to get these to come around than planting native wildflowers. It is amazing to see the before and after pictures of establishing a prairie. Even more amazing is the positive impact fire has on the growth and diversity of native wildflowers (it also eliminates invasive species).

In 2020, we are planting nearly an acre of new prairie on three properties. We continue maintenance on the seven acre Schoofs Preserve planting and a one acre prairie at Woodside Elementary in Sussex.

Retreats and Speaking



The insects all around us are easily overlooked, sometimes even despised. Given a bug net, the reaction by children is very different and quickly they will have something in their hand you didn't know existed. It is hard not to be amazed by the creative diversity of insects and where creation abounds the Creator can be found. The silence, the subtle beauty of flowers and sunshine can make prairies a great place to walk, relax, pray and reflect. That's why we call them a “Prayer-e”. We installed the Schoofs Legacy Butterfly Garden for that very reason. Visitors to the Schoofs Preserve can not only find a quiet space amidst prairie wildflowers but also be immersed in all pollinators that call it home; 32 species of butterfly to be specific!

We know insects are abundant but did you know:

- 1 out of every 10 animals is a fly.
- There are 10,000 moth species in North America.
- 1 out of every 5 living things is a beetle.
- If you put all the humans and all the worlds' ants on a teeter-totter, our feet would be dangling.

God has blessed us with mind boggling diversity of living things and tremendous ecological complexity. This web of life, as it is often called, not only supports us but we are called to steward it. Pope Francis recently said *the pandemic has highlighted how vulnerable and interconnected we all are. If we do not take care of each other, starting with the least, with those most affected, including creation, we cannot heal the world.*
