
The March for Life in Washington D.C. was this January 23 and 24. Parishes, schools and organizations from all over the country converge on our nation's capital to stand for a united cause; the dignity of all human life. The environmental community is gravely misunderstood when thinking that how we treat our fellow human beings has no impact on how we treat the rest of the natural world. In fact, we see that the evils that disintegrate the family and discard life are the same as the ones that degrade the environment.

Seeing 30,000 people, many under the age of 18, participate in the *Mass for Life* was very moving. Being amidst hundreds of thousands and hearing speeches from pro-life groups, the president and abortion survivors make this March for Life a truly memorable one. We pray for the end to abortion and a greater love and respect for all people, especially the most vulnerable.

We were able to continue our partnership with two parishes this winter; Waukesha Catholic and St. Leonard. We also began a new partnership with St. Sebastian in Milwaukee.

Over 100 Waukesha Catholic Confirmation students gathered to hear our message of integrating our faith with an ethic to steward creation. This included Catholic Social Teaching, lives of the Saints and the encyclical *Laudato Si'*. At St. Leonard in Muskego, we ran an evening session for families in the parish focusing on "Saint and Stewards." At St. Sebastian, we took a "Deep Dive into *Laudato Si'*."

We greatly appreciated these opportunities to connect with so many people of all ages from parishes throughout the Archdiocese of Milwaukee. This call to greater holiness, growth in our faith and greater stewardship of our common home is both a tremendous challenge and a rewarding ministry.



Food, Faith and Farming Network





Catholic Ecology Center News



Our fundraising efforts have continued to bear much fruit. We have reached \$300,000 for land acquisition. The total need for our 25 acres is \$385,000 with an anticipated closing date of June 15 of this year. Our 25 acres would be part of a 130 acre preserve complex near Wales that will enable us to dramatically increase our mission. Please consider helping us ensure that this vision becomes a reality. Thank you!

In December, several volunteers came to help with buckthorn removal on the future Catholic Ecology Center land. Our main objective was to clear buckthorn away from a giant 4.5 foot diameter bur oak tree, likely over 250 years old. We also removed buckthorn from the border of 500 feet of crystal clear creek and one of the moraines on the property. Over 40 volunteer hours made this a reality!
