Refrain:


Yes, Jesus loves me! Yes, Jesus loves me! Yes, Jesus loves me! The Bible tells me so.

A History of Jesus Loves Me

This sweet, gentle hymn, reflecting the wonderfully loving and trusting nature of a child's love for The Lord, has a special place in my heart.

As a child, I would often repeatedly ask my father if we could sing this hymn during our services as I loved its clarity and assurance that now in later years I sometimes struggle with as an adult.

Written in 1859 by Susan and Anna Warner, the talented literary daughters of a New York lawyer. The Warner sisters wrote the best selling novel Say and Seal in the same year, yet it is to God's glory that the piece of writing the two sisters are remembered for is this wonderful hymn.



It began as a poem in the girls novel and centred around the physical afflictions of a sickly boy named Johnny Fax. In the story, Johnny's condition becomes critical and asks Mr Linden, the father of Johnny's friend John, who was the Sunday School teacher, to gather him in his arms and comfort him. Mr Linden gladly does so and paces up and down the room carrying the feverish lad hoping to console him. Johnny suddenly pleads for Mr Linden to sing, prompting Mr Linden to sing the now famous lines of the hymn Jesus Loves Me.

With these precious words, Mr Linden comforts the dying boy and within a few hours, little Johnny is home with Jesus, the one who so dearly loved him. The poem came to the attention of the composer William Bradbury who in 1861 set the poem to music and added the chorus.

Looking back all those years ago, when I too was often troubled with numerous illnesses as quite a sickly boy, I now see how gently the Lord was instilling a deep knowledge of his love for me ahead of future days when greater physical ailment would trouble me. To this day when I am brought low with illness and exhaustion, I remember these sweet, comforting words and remind myself that He does indeed love me so.

Challenging Questions of Faith

If God is good, how can He send people to Hell?

Firstly we must contend with the assumption made within the question, that God sends people to hell against their will. God does not send anyone to hell who has not chosen to be there. Those who are not saved have utilised the free will appointed to them by a loving, gracious God and chosen according to their will to not seek Him and therefore forfeit eternal life, leaving a place in hell the end point of their will.

Indeed God does not will that any should perish and desires each person to be saved (2 Peter 3:9) and Jesus lamented at how He longed to gather, "together as a hen gathers her chicks under her wings, but you were not willing" (Matthew 23:37).

Therefore, a pure, eternal love that is freely offered to all when shunned in defiance by a willingly disobedient created soul, must be justly punished. Punishment is necessary because the life of willing sinfulness is not merely a love unrequited towards the Lord, it is a love desecrated, violated and must be brought to justice. 





Body of Evidence – The History of Abraham

The ancient history of Israel is another area of common attack from Biblical sceptics as they argue the narratives of the patriarchs are nothing but mythology.

The most frequented assertion to the supposed mythological status of the narratives of Abraham, Issac and Jacob is the suggestion that these narratives were written as a history for the Jewish people in the reign of Josiah in the mid-7th century BC.

However, this flimsy accusation against the veracity of Biblical history has since been dispelled as detailed study of the legal, political, social and domestic culture reflected in the Genesis records, highlights an accuracy of correlation we see with secular knowledge of the first half of the second millennium BC. Let's look at some particular evidences that show the correlation between Biblical records of the patriarchs and archaeological discoveries.



Cylinder seal 1800-1650 BC

The Cylinder Seal pictured above, was discovered in the 1960's by Manfred Bietak. The seal from the Syriac region, dated between 1800-1650 BC, depicts domesticated camels being used by the people's of this region at this ancient time of history. The problem for the Biblical sceptic however, is that for years a popular attack against the Genesis record of Abraham was the writing of the usage of camels by the patriarchs. It was argued that during this period of history allotted with the patriarchs (first half of the second millennium BC) camels had not been domesticated and that as a result, the Genesis record must have been written at a later date when camels had been domesticated.

Yet as this cylindrical seal shows, this assertion is completely baseless as archaeology has shown that domesticated camels in the Near East during the patriarchal era were indeed commonplace. The names listed in Genesis 14: 1-4, often labelled mythology again by secular historians and Bible critics, have also been shown by archaeological discoveries to have been known names from this region at this point in ancient history. Similarly, the location of the Tower of Babel being in the plain of Shinar, is not historical error on the Bible's part. Shinar was merely an early name for Babylon. Hence the scriptural relevance of the prophecies in the Book of Revelation of *Mystery Babylon* being the false religion of the Antichrist who brings to the fore the ancient mystery religions of Ancient Babylon (now contained in the dogmas/practices of the Roman Catholic religion), where they were first practised by those who sought to build the Tower of Babel and attempt to rise up to and usurp the throne of God. The history of the Genesis account is the foundation of the future prophecies of the end times and the rise of Antichrist. It is no wonder therefore that Satan seeks to undermine this narrative so as to remove awareness amongst God's children as to the identity of the coming culmination of Satan's plot against God in the form of the already mentioned Antichrist.

Another accusation levelled against the historicity of the patriarchal narrative is the suggestion that people of that era were not literate to a common degree so the likelihood of records of the history of the patriarchs being accurately passed down through the generations to Moses would be remote.

However during the 1920's, Sir Leonard Woolley excavating at Ur of the Chaldeans (birthplace of Abraham), found that one fifth of every home contained writing materials 500 years before the time of Abraham. It was also discovered that this people group were very skilled in algebra, geometry and quadratic equations.

Clearly the people's of the patriarchal era were an advanced people with skills and abilities that match the historical narrative revealed in the Genesis record.


Let's finish with the Lord's thought on the historicity of Abraham. In **John 8:56**, we see an exchange between Jesus and the Pharisees where Jesus highlights His eternal nature as the Son of God by observing He knew and knows Abraham personally. Jesus himself attests to the historical veracity of the Genesis record.

Wonders of the Human Body – The Brain (Part Two)

As we saw last month, the human brain is a masterpiece of creation unmatched by the feats of human engineering and computing. Let's continue with our basic yet incredible look at some of these staggering facts that the Lord has placed within our own bodies.

The medulla, placed at the base of the brain as shown in the diagram below, along with the




Spinal column, controls a plethora of involuntary motor functions such as the digestive process and our heart rates. These essential functions for the continuation of life are wonderfully designed by Our Lord to automatically function without the need for conscious effort on the owners part. It's a wonderful representation of how we are indeed gifted life by the Creator and given individuality by His gracious hands yet we are constantly sustained by a process that although takes place in our unique bodies, are at the mercy of His overriding care and direction. The pons (located slightly upwards of the medulla as shown in the diagram above) contains neurones (a neuron is the basic working unit of the brain, a specific type of cell designed to transmit information to other nerve cells, muscles, or gland cells across the body) that are responsible for controlling voluntary acts such as respiration, sleep, eye movement, facial expressions and swallowing.

The hypothalamus (located north east of the pons) is tasked with a combination of involuntary and partially voluntary body functions such as eating and drinking and hormone release.

The likelihood of such intricate and cooperative regions of the brain evolving by random chance

Is zero. The exactitude required to ensure that each area such as the medulla is able to function at a level to sustain life is beyond irreducible complexity. In other words, the qualities needed for the unit to work at the level required for it to be a useful, viable component cannot be reduced to a level of simplicity proposed by evolutionists. If it were to be so, it would cease to fulfil its purpose and offer no beneficial impact to the incumbent. Clearly the Creator has imbued such complexity in His creation to thwart the rambling attempts of man to explain away the need for a Creator. An average human brain contains approximately 100 billion nerve cells (called neurones as discussed earlier) which communicate together through synapses (connections of neurones in the brain – see image below for an example).



As an individual neuron can have thousands of differing connections, it means that the average human brain can contain hundreds of trillions of neural connections or synapses. The synapse operates like a microprocessor within a computer, holding information processing and memory storage capabilities. As you can see, God had Charles Babbage (credited with inventing the modern computer system) beaten in the race to the design the optimum information processing and computing system by a narrow 6000 years. A neuron actively generates electrical signals that are transmitted to other neurones. As a said signal or pulse reaches a synapse, a neurotransmitter chemical is released so that the signal or pulse is transmitted onto to the next neuron. Neural activities such as thinking and learning require the involvement of literally millions of electrical pulses travelling between networks of interconnected neuron cells all simultaneously. What is even more staggering is each time an individual develops a

Memory or learns something new, new neural connections are created within the brain. As you read this article, either the new information you are learning or the familiarity of its content and it's recalling memories of past science lessons, are actively creating new neural pathways in your brain. Consider then the next time you read your Bible and the Lord illuminates His word to you afresh, leaving you equipped with new knowledge of your gracious Lord, that new, tangible neural pathways, crafted in pursuit of the Lord have been formed in your brain.



Such is the incredible complexity of the human brain, that researchers at Stanford University, USA, have discovered that one human brain has more neural switches than all the computers in the world combined.

This is the reason why any life matters, because you are an incredibly, intricately crafted being, shaped in the image and likeness of God, displaying His awe-inspiring handiwork each time you think, feel, move, breath etc. You are fearfully and wonderfully made, gifted life by the Almighty Creator and offered salvation so that this wonderfully designed yet sin corrupted body may be restored to it's intended glory, and utilise it's staggering abilities to glorify Our Lord God forevermore in peace and glory.



What Would Jesus Do?

This question (often abbreviated to W.W.J.D), has become one of the iconic catchphrases of modern Christianity and indeed with those in secular society who wish to somehow utilise the teaching of the 'gifted Rabbi'. The phrase adorns armbands, t-shirts, necklaces, phone cases and posters and there has even been a board game and film entitled 'W.W.J.D'.

It is put forward as the starting point of thought, especially for the Christian youth, as a means to navigate the social and ethical mine field of today. Even in the very recent past with the events of the George Floyd case in the United States, local pastors were asking this very question as an attempt to stir thought and temper the riotous behaviour.

"Wonderful" comes the United cry of Ecumenism; we should all unite in the thought of 'What would Jesus do?" in every given situation that is troubling us before acting. Well what's so wrong with that I hear you say. Shouldn't this be applauded as Christ focused, New Testament centres, Gospel grounded means of getting our misguided youth into the shoes of Our Lord?

In a word, no. The question we should be asking is 'What DID Jesus do?' This is the question that will have us searching the scriptures for our answers which is the only place we should be going in our moral dilemma. And if we can't remember or don't have a Bible to hand in that particular moment then a secondary question that my mother would pose is also useful: If Jesus appeared in front of you right now, would you still go ahead with what you are about to do? Our God given conscience is well equipped to bring us to a screeching halt in many instances.

Asking the question of "what did Jesus do?" gives the asker no wriggle room where creative thought can be employed. None of the things Jesus did or said relating to issues we encounter day by day Leave any room to doubt His meaning or to stretch it to allow the exception "just this time".

The question "what would Jesus do?" doesn't lead us to the scripture for an answer at all. It assumes we can put an answer into Our Lord's mouth and speak for Him. It leaves the door of humanistic, self serving interpretative thought flung wide open, so that anything that "sounds righteous" and morally rooted on the high ground as we perceive it can be said to answer the question. But it leaves enough flexibility to still get what we want, affectively excusing it in the name of Jesus. It allows us to fashion to an extent our own version of Jesus to meet our own needs. We tread on a dangerously thin line of beginning to create a god in our own image, and that is idolatry.

So how does the Jesus of "what would He do?" look like when compared to the Jesus of "what did He do?" For that we simply compare the modern, liberal, higher criticism interpretation of Jesus verses the Biblical record of Jesus.

This is a rotten Devil inspired motto that is not encouraging our young Christians to be more like Christ at all. If we go with this motto and not to scripture to look directly at the life and teaching of Christ, we will in our sinful human, fallen nature inevitably answer the question with the secular all loving, all tolerating Jesus of mankind's own imagining, formed from our own sinful thought. We will not become more like our Saviour but more like our own image of our own personal god that fits our lives and doesn't get in the way of our desires or gratification, and this is false worship and idolatry.

There is only one safe answer to the question "What would Jesus do?" He would point you to the Bible and tell you to search it's pages for that is where you will find all the answers you will ever need to convict your soul of any action you might make.
