

**Overview of the Organization:**

CrossOver Health Care Ministry provides high quality healthcare, promotes wellness, and connects community talents and resources with people in need. They welcome employees, volunteers and patients from all faith traditions. CrossOver was founded over 40 years ago and serves over 7,000 low-income patients every year, offering a range of integrated health services, including primary and specialty care, dental, vision, maternal and child health, behavioral health, and a community pharmacy.

**Overview of the Project:**

Crossover is the only safety net clinic in the region offering full-spectrum obstetric (OB) care to uninsured women, including refugees and asylum-seekers. During pregnancy, uninsured women are more than twice as likely to receive late or no prenatal care – significantly increasing the risk of low birth weight and infant mortality.

This project addresses the urgent need for pediatric care by supporting the expansion of CrossOver's Maternal and Child Health program. This is transformational, expanding Crossover's services to a dangerously underserved population - infants and toddlers ages 0-3. For the first time, CrossOver will offer pediatric care for children under age three, while also offering care to their mothers, addressing a long-standing gap in our community. Construction is already underway for an updated clinic suite, designed specifically for maternal and child care. Impact 100's funding will provide one-time and perpetual support, furnishing the critical and specialized medical equipment and technology needs for this unique population in addition to family-friendly waiting room furniture and design elements. The overall project will bring women's health, pediatrics, and dental care together under one roof, improving access, continuity of care, and health outcomes for young families.

**3. Expected Impact on the Community:**

The clinic will serve 650 pregnant women and 1,200 children under age 19 in its first year of operation in 2026. It will aim to improve perinatal care quality and maternal health outcomes for these pregnant women, screening 90% of OB patients for depression and ensuring 100% of those with a positive screen receive follow-up. 80% of children will be fully vaccinated by age 5 (up from 64% without the project) and will receive dental care and education by age 3.
