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#### COLORING LOCKS

#### Is there ever a right way?

My eldest son recently announced that he wanted his lock tips colored red. It reminded me of when I started his locks about 1 0 years ago. After graduating from high school, he announced: That's my last haircut. Who knew the child was hatin' on a fade? He never said a mumbling word. He only took a decision and make it very clear that he wanted no opposition. So, being a natural salon owner, I trusted no one else to the task. Well, fast forward 10 years and this is what they look like. One woman

in West Africa saw his hair and was shocked! My response was: He works at an architecture firm and is artistic in nature. In others, not my business. He's grown. He even decided to break away from me as his stylist a couple of years back. But after the stylist had his edges breaking



off and tons of build-up in his locks after one service, he returned to *Schatzi's*. It takes me almost an hour to shampoo his locks. I do it because it's necessary. But many stylists don't want to take that much time. Such is life.

So, when he announced that he wanted me to color them, I woke up in the middle of the night to research. I didn't want the ends of his hair looking like, as he rightly deduced, "a paintbrush." Also, because his hair

seems to grow in a natural V-shape, wanted to match his natural style. His intention is to cut the tips off when he gets tired of the color, so this is his way of having a bit of before fun trimming his locks (for the first time).

I found tons of online resources with tips on



coloring locks, but I was most interested in photos of style patterns. They were few and far between. So, I basically had to wing it. The biggest challenge came from the fact that I had to work so low to the bottom of my chair to apply the color to the tips WHILE MAKING CERTAIN NOT TO GET IT ON THE REMAINDER OF THE LOCKS OR THE SALON! The bowl would simply not work at all for this type of look. Overall, he was pleased, but I wasn't. I did achieve my goal of not creating the look of a paint brush, with a vertical color line across all locks. But, I wanted a more consistent V-shape. I think I missed the mark at the lowest point of the V. I needed to be a bit more generous covering the tips in this section. Honestly, I started in this section and didn't want to run short of color, so I know that why it's like that. I've considered a touch-up to finish the look; but, I think he frankly could

care less. He has some pizazz; so, these types of details go unnoticed by him. But that's why we're stylists. The flavor is in the details every time.

If I can provide tips for coloring locks, my biggest suggestions are: map out the entire process ahead of time; consider the client's hair and desired look carefully to ensure that you devise an application method that achieves the outcome desired and is done in a way that doesn't make a mess (you don't want to be looking at some funky color on your countertops for months to come); ensure that you have all of the resources on hand that you need (foil sheets were a must for this style!); and take your time. He was in my chair for 5 hours, including color, shampoo, re-twist and style. But, I was compensated well, so it's all in a day's work. Happy Styling!
