



## ALASTAIR REEVES (1982-83 SALISBURY)

he Reeves Family is one of Southwell's celebrated multi-generational Families and are also locally celebrated fourth generation farmers at home on the Farm in Te Akau, which has been in the Family since 1932. Recently Alistair and Ann were recognised at the Waikato Balance Farm Environment Awards Dinner winning Supreme Waikato Winners for 2024 as well as collecting the following awards:

- Bayleys People in Primary Sector Award
- Beef + Lamb New Zealand Livestock Farm Award
- NZFET Biodiversity Award
- NZFET Climate Recognition Award

#### Farm Life

The Reeves Family farm 600 hectares in Te Akau which is on the West Coast, north of Raglan Harbour. Alongside a commercial sheep and bull beef business there is a Sheep Genetics Business, Waimai Romney and they sell Romney rams and CharaBlack rams (which is a terminal breed, it's a Hampshire and Charolais cross). Alistair says "Te Akau is a wonderful community and I have really enjoyed getting involved in BOT at the local School and we are really excited about the New Community Catchment Group that has just been established." (Al is co-Chairman and was the main driving force behind getting this off the ground).

#### **Family Life**

Sophie (2013-14 Salisbury) Sophie attended Waikato Diocesan after Southwell and went to Lincoln University on a Sports Scholarship (Netball) where she completed a Bachelor of Agribusiness and Food Marketing with a Supply Chain Major. She was a successful rower and still plays Netball, recently gaining selection to the Waikato BOP NNL Squad for 2024.

George (2015-16 Salisbury) went on to Hamilton Boys High School where the Former Captain of Rugby and Cricket MVP continued on, playing in the 1<sup>st</sup> XI and 1<sup>st</sup> XV. George is currently at Lincoln University studying Commerce, also on a Sports Scholarship for rugby. He is in the Crusaders Academy and definitely one to watch.

Angus (2017-18 Salisbury) also went on to Hamilton Boys and played rugby and cricket, playing in the 1st XI Eleven. He has followed the well-worn family path to Lincoln University where he is studying for a Bachelor of Commerce in Agriculture. He too, has continued with rugby at Lincoln.

#### After Southwell...

After Southwell I went to Christchurch to attend Secondary School at Christs College then on to Lincoln University where I completed a Bachelor of Commerce in Agriculture. This was followed by a stint overseas playing rugby in Scotland and traveling, then back home to the farm. The best day of my life was when I married Ann in 2001 and our 3 children arrived in the following 4 years.

#### Of Late...

More recently, I have been involved with Firstlight Wagyu, both producing Wagyu and as a Member of the Board. I helped set up both FE Gold and Worm Fe Gold Brands to help provide Farmers with the best genetics to provide tolerance to Facial Eczema and Worms.

Now we are testing our stud rams for their methane output and have reduced the methane in our sheep flock by 3.2% in 4 years while still improving all other desirable traits like growth and fertility.

Upon accepting The Supreme Award Alistair summed up his Family legacy... "We borrow the land from our children, we should give it back better than we got it."





### **HEADMASTER INTERVIEW** DAVID WHARTON (1991-93 CANTERBURY)

#### Name three of your strongest memories of Southwell?

- 1.) In my last year at Southwell, I remember getting into school before dawn for a few mornings to make bricks that were used in the new Learning Centre (opened in 1993). To be able to contribute to the building of future learning spaces is a great tradition that Southwell maintains.
- 2.) Performing as an Ishmaelite in the 1993 Opera, Joseph and the Amazing Technicolour Dreamcoat.
- 3.) Form 2 (Year 8) Camp at Turangi and doing the Tongariro Crossing

#### Of the six Southwell Values, which ones most resonate daily with you & describe how you use them? (Excellence -giving your best, Integrity, Creativity, Care, Resilience, Respect)

Resilience – if there is one thing I have learned in life is that sometimes it doesn't always go to plan. Incorporating resilience into your daily life doesn't mean that you won't face difficulties. Instead, it equips you with the mindset and skills necessary to navigate life's ups and downs with courage, strength, and determination.

Excellence – Consistently giving your utmost and pursuing excellence daily are paramount for achieving lasting success. While victories may not come every day, dedicating yourself to excellence each day lays the groundwork for long-term achievement. At the core of our daily endeavours at my company ActiveVision lies our company ethos: 'Attitude & Ambition', which serves as our guiding principle in all our pursuits.

#### Tell us about your career journey...

After graduating from Waikato University in 2003 with a Bachelor of Social Science and Post Grad Dip Supply Chain Management, I joined Farmers Department store in the Head office as a Merchandise Planner. Here I was planning the product ranges for the Homewares area of the business. After 3 years at Farmers, I then travelled overseas to Canada and the UK where I worked for Unilever in the Home & Personal Supply Chain. Ensuring that the UK was flush (excuse the pun) with toilet bleach was one of my key responsibilities. It was a fascinating time to be working in London as it was during the Global Financial crisis of 2008 and there were many critical projects to be a part of to ensure that the company navigated its way through tough economic times. These experiences have helped me to manage businesses through Covid and the subsequent economic conditions that are present now. Back to New Zealand in 2010, I rejoined Farmers as the Planning Manager for the Beauty Merchandise Division. A completely new area for me, I thoroughly enjoyed working with global brands and beginning what became a 10-year period in which my focus became sales & marketing. Then in 2015, I joined L'Oreal, initially as a Sales Manager for the Luxury Division

before becoming Country Manager for the L'Oreal Luxe brands. This was a very demanding and challenging role that pushed me to achieve my best. It also brought me fantastic opportunity with business travel throughout Asia and Europe and further study at the French Business School CEDEP. After over 10 years of working in the Beauty industry, I decided that I needed a change. And so, in 2022 I bought an Audio Visual Technology company called ActiveVision. Based in Auckland we specialise in delivering the latest AV technology solutions to the Education sector, Corporates, Government and retail. I act as Managing Director and I am thoroughly enjoying the challenge of growing the business and diversifying into new areas.

#### Where are you living now & what do you enjoy about this area?

I live in Greenlane, Auckland. I have lived in Auckland for the past 15 years. Auckland has its downsides (traffic) for sure, but we love being able to access all of the great events (concerts, rugby, cricket etc) that Auckland has to offer. 
#### What is your self care routine?

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












## FROM CHAPLAIN'S PEN BRICKS AND MORTAR

## TOBIAS TE UA (2019-23 LINCOLN)

In April this year, I spent a week in Belgium with my parents as part of the Hamilton City and Ypres (leper) sister city relationship. My dad, Lt Col Olly Te Ua, was invited to be Mayor Paula Southgate's military escort on her recent trip. He is also a trustee of the Hamilton leper Garden Trust, so this was the perfect opportunity for him to build upon the trust's relationship with the Last Post Association.

During our visit, our whanau was lucky to spend time with two local WW1 historians who took us around various battlefields and Commonwealth Graves cemeteries. One such cemetery was Beethleem Farm West in Messines. It was here, on this



bitterly cold day, that we were able to pay our respects and lay a poppy on the grave of Chaplain Neale Troon's great uncle, who died on 19 August 1917. There are 167 Commonwealth War Grave cemeteries on the leper Salient where those who perished on Flanders Fields are laid to rest. Those whose bodies were never recovered have their names engraved on the Menin Gate and various memorials across this area.

On Anzac Day, we attended many official activities with the local and New Zealand Embassy staff, starting with the dawn service at Polygon Wood, a service of thanksgiving at the Pou Maumahara at the Passchendaele Museum, the civic service at Tyne Cot cemetery, the largest of all the war graves cemeteries, the Menin Gate Anzac Day service, a service to the New Zealand soldiers at Messines Ridge Memorial and then the daily evening act of remembrance at the Menin Gate.

While at Messines, I was among the small group of New Zealand children who laid the wreath on behalf of the tamariki of Aotearoa. This was a great way for us all to reflect on the sacrifice our soldiers gave during the years of war. To round off a busy few days, the Mayor and the Mayor of leper, officially opened Hamilton Park - a large green space in the centre of town frequented by many locals and tourists alike.

Ka maumahara tonu taatou ki a raatou. We will remember them.

## HAMILTON GARDENS

Pellow Peter Sergel (1958-63) has penned an impressive book spanning the redevelopment of the Hamilton Gardens, of which he is considered the mastermind. We think the official intro says it all and would encourage you to purchase a copy and join us in congratulating Peter on an amazing accomplishment for our city.

THE TIME TRAVELLER'S GUIDE TO HAMILTON GARDENS
Peter Sergel was first asked to produce a plan for Hamilton
Gardens in 1978. There was just one small problem; no
budget had been set aside to implement it, so it was
destined, like many other plans, to gather dust on a shelf
somewhere until someone decided it was time to tidy up.
However, Peter and others set up a series of committees
and trusts to raise funds for development. His subsequent
professional career directly involved in the Gardens spanned

a period of 43 years. Initially just involved in designing new gardens, seeking community support and fundraising, between 1995 and 2020 he was the first director of Hamilton Gardens, responsible for its day-to-day operation as well as its promotion, design, and development.

His expertise in the field of garden design and the history of gardens has been recognised with a Royal Arch academic scholarship, overseas speaking engagements and an honorary doctorate from the University of Waikato.

## RICO D'ANVERS (2006-2014 YORK)

Rico started at Southwell as a cheerful 5 year old new entrant, enjoying the easy slide into student life that happens at Southwell, friend making, games, and new experiences. Once the blazer was hung up every afternoon Rico was learning another new skill: BMX.

Rico recently returned to Southwell and spent an afternoon with some of the Year 8 Boys Healthy Choices class talking about training, goal setting and the good choices he has made in his life. Rico is currently studying Civil Engineering at Waikato University and is a regular public speaker.

We decided it was a great opportunity to share parts of his journey with the wider community as he embarks on his Elite Sporting adventures and what we have learned from Rico is that a common sense approach and maintaining a steady balance between lofty goals and managing expectations is vital.

#### Small beginnings...

"I ventured into BMX at age 5, and now 17 years later I am becoming quite seasoned to the sport. My first big result was winning a C1 event in Rotorua in 2019. In about 2016 I started to podium in my age group at almost all big NZ races, this was the point that gave me the confidence and motivation to push harder and race in the elite category from 2018 onwards."

#### A typical week...

"I like to keep my training to the early morning and

evening where possible to leave a whole working day to study. Typically, I will train Monday-Saturday, either once or twice per day"

#### Best performance to date...

"The 2023 World Championships in Glasgow. I made the semi-finals in the Elite U23 men age class, which is decent. But the event as a whole was really enjoyable because my family were there and I really enjoyed the track."

#### Setbacks and bad experiences...

"Crashes in BMX often trigger setbacks. There can be mental blocks from a crash that make it hard - which I have had a few of. Learning to overcome the fears you face can give processes and strategies to help in similar situations moving forward. I think setbacks in general improve you as a human and subsequently improve you as a rider."

#### Into the future..

I just want to become the best that I can while enjoying the journey. I try not to get attached to specific events, but rather just racing at my best as often as possible.

#### Memories from the days of the stripes...

"Miss Harper (Mrs Savage) was my favourite teacher! The best parts of school for me were just the (offline) activities we did as kids - '2 square' game, playgrounds, athletics day etc. Now that I am past my school days and have grown up slightly, those are the things that I miss."





## TRUST BOARD UPDATE

t's great to see our boarders enjoying the outstanding new Oliver Boarding House facilities during the first half of the year. They have been joined by a number of our day students participating in the short-term boarding experience. Good progress is being made with the new Rita and Ken Davies Pool and we expect to be using this amazing new addition to Southwell from the start of term four.

During the first term we had a team from the Ministry of Education here to perform an inspection of the school and update the ERO review. I was able to participate in both the introductory and closing meetings with the team. The report has now been uploaded to the school's web site and as you can see the format is pretty bland. What I can say, is that the language used in the close out meeting was very complementary. It's a pity the report format doesn't allow for anything other than compliance (or non compliance) but I can tell you that the MOE reps were very impressed

with what they saw. The team completed their site visit one day earlier than expected and were very complementary. Their feedback is a credit to Jason and the SLT and reflects both the excellence brought by staff every day and the considerable effort made in preparing for the review.

One of the elements receiving especially positive feedback was our curriculum and curriculum delivery. The Southwell curriculum has been developed over time by the school within the parameters established by the Ministry. While this has served us well, as evidence by the ministry feedback, Jason and the senior team are keen to keep improving. With that objective, the senior team are currently investigating the potential application of the primary years programme of the International Baccalaureate to guide curriculum structure with international rigour and bench marking qualities . I expect that this work will be completed during term three. We will keep you apprised of progress.

he Healthy Choices Learning Space was officially opened on May 13 in front of the whole school. Made possible with funds raised at the 2022 Southwell Gala Dinner this small celebration recognised the A Team who worked hard to create this amazing space. ### **GRANT CLEGG** FOUNDATION UPDATE



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
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
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
