"IT'S GOD'S WILL THAT YOU BE SAVED"

God's will? Yes! This is true; and we can say this to anyone: "It's God's will that you be saved." But when we say this, we should understand what we are saying, and what we are not saying: [1] It was God's will that Christ was lifted up on the cross that any and all might look unto him and be saved (|sabh 45:22; John 3:14-17); [2] it is God's will that the gospel be preached to all men everywhere that they might hear and be saved (|Math 28:19,20; Mark 16:15); and [3] it is God's will that every man repent of his sins and believe the gospel and be saved (|Ezek 33:11; Mark 1:15; Acts 2:38; 16:31; 17:30; 2 Cot 5:20; 1 Tim 2:4; 1 John 3:23). This is truly God's will; and this is what we are saying. While all of these points, #1, #2 & #3 are involved in this statement, #3 is basically where it's coming from. Now let's talk about God's will, and discover just what it is that we are not saying.

There are two aspects of God's will we must clearly distinguish: [1] God's will of purpose (decretive will), and [2] God's will of command (preceptive will). These are not to be confused. God's will of purpose is always done; it can never be thwarted: "He worketh all things after the counsel of his own will" (Eph 1:11). On the other hand, his will of command is often ignored and left undone. Men are in rebellion against him.

God's will of purpose: [1] It's eternal. God is not forming any new purposes; his counsels are of old [lasish 25:1; Eph 3:11]. What is to be, will be. All of "God's works" are known "from the beginning" [Acts 15:18]. [2] It's effectual. God's will of purpose is always accomplished. He never engages in wishful thinking; what he desires he performs [Job 23:13; Issish 14:24-27]. See him purposing the death of Christ from eternity and controlling and directing the free actions of sinful men to bring this to pass precisely as prophesied centuries before! [Acts 2:23; 4:27,28]. [3] It's immutable. "Surely as I have thought, so shall it come to pass; as I have purposed, so shall it stand" [Issish 14:24]. God's will of purpose never changes. He's all-wise in planning, and all-powerful in performing. [4] It's the cause of our conversion. We "received Christ," John says, because we "were born, not...of the will of the flesh, nor of the will of man, but of God" [John 1:12,13]. Saving faith is the work and gift of God! [Eph 2:8]. "Of his own will begat he us with the word of truth" [James 1:18].

<u>God's will of command</u>: This has to do with how we are to think and act; God has *sovereign authority* over us. God's will of **command** is what we are responsible to perform, *not* his will of **purpose**. It was his will of *purpose* for Christ to be crucified (1 Peter 1:18-20; Rev 13:8), but not his will of *command*. Wicked men fulfilled the purpose of God that day, but they were *not* obeying a command of God. What he *purposes* is the determining factor; what he *commands* is our duty.

It's unbelievable that people see this distinction in everything except spiritual matters! They hear of the doctrine of election, and say, "Well, if I believed that, I wouldn't do anything! If I'm one of God's elect, I'll be saved, no matter what!" And so election and salvation, and God's will of purpose in them, is ridiculed! But isn't this year's harvest equally determined by God's will of purpose? Absolutely! It will be exactly what God has determined it to be! No more and no less! Yet we don't hear these same people making such ridiculous statements: "Well, if that's true, there's no use to plow! no use to plant! If God's already determined this year's crop, it's gonna be what it's gonna be, no matter what! We don't have to do anything!" Isn't it comical, that in spiritual matters alone they say these things! They acknowledge both aspects of God's will in everything—except salvation!

Now let's get back to our opening statement: "It's God's will that you be saved." What are we not saying? We are not saying, "God wants you to be saved." Not at all; the Bible doesn't speak like that about God, neither should we. That gives the impression that God wants things. God doesn't want you to repent; he commands you to! (Acts 17:30). God doesn't want you to believe; he commands you to! (I John 3:23). There's a big difference. God is a glorious Sovereign who commands with authority! He's not to be viewed as someone who'll be disappointed if he doesn't get what he wants. It's repent or perish! It's not, "God wants to have his way in your life." So when we say, "It's God's will that you be saved," what do we have in view? God's will of command! Those who obey God's command to repent and believe—will be saved!

What else are we not saying? We are not saying, "God has purposed you to be saved." God's will of purpose has nothing to do with this. God has not revealed whom he's purposed to save. "The secret things belong unto the Lord our God: but those things which are revealed belong unto us" (Dout 29:29). Whom God has purposed to save is his secret counsel, and that can never fail: "The Lord hath purposed, and who shall disannul it?...Yea, I have spoken it, I will also bring it to pass; I have purposed it, I will also do it" (Issiah 14:27; 46:11). But God's revealed will is no secret! Repent and believe and you will be saved! This is absolutely certain! You obey God's will of command and you'll find yourself right in the middle of God's will of purpose to save you from all eternity! Hear it: "All that the Father giveth me [his purpose!] shall come to me [his command!]; and him that cometh to me..." (John 6:37). \(\simegal)
