Community Talking Circles

Twelve talking community talking circles were provided to indigenous women, girls and 2Spirits in the North Carolina, Virginia, and South Carolina Communities, from powwows to healing circles.

Talking Circles

Talking circles, peacemaking circles, or healing circles, as they are variously called, are deeply rooted in the traditional practices of indigenous people.1 In North America, they are widely used among the First Nations people of Canada and among the many tribes of Native Americans in the US.



Self Defense & Education

The first goal of MMIW NC is to provide education against sexual violence to American Indian (AI) women and girls. The second goal is to teach self-defense to women and girls in the community. Although self-defense classes are increasingly popular, especially those focused on empowering survivors, they sometimes still meet skepticism and resistance for various reasons. This program happens every quarter.

Out of 106 Missing and Murdered Cases spanning back to the 1960s to 2021:

57% of women and girls are missing 43% of women and girls have been murdered

37% have been under the age of 20

4% - Under age 10 17% - ages 21 to 30 14% - ages 31-40 8% - 41-50 2% - 51-59 2% - 60+ 16% - unknown ages 37%
