

1. This is a National action brought local by a community hero. As many of you may already know, ABQ long-lived activist Sally-Alice Thompson began a hunger strike to empathize with the hungry children who are suffering in Venezuela, Cuba, North Korea, Iran, Gaza and Yemen because of U.S. policies in those regions. Sally-Alice is 95 yrs old, her protest — Fasting Against Sanctions and Sieges, or FASS — began last Sunday. Per Sally-Alice's request, many people have pledged to fast a day or two, a meal or more, in solidarity with her and in opposition to sanctions and sieges. 2. We did it in NM, now let's make it country-wide!!! Senate Majority Leader Mitch McConnell is refusing to bring S.42, a.k.a, the Background Checks Expansion Act to the Senate floor for a vote. This Act would close loopholes that allow guns to be sold without requiring a background check, such as what happens at gun shows. 97% of Americans support universal background checks. Food for thought, and fodder

Polling expert Nate Silver's website FiveThirtyEight says that "the Senate will be competitive again" in 2020. Here's why:

- Senate Majority Leader Mitch McConnell is only three points ahead of a generic Democratic opponent. And more than 60% of the voters in McConnell's home state of Kentucky are saying that "it's time for someone new" to represent the state.
- Colorado Senator Cory Gardner is "arguably the most endangered Republican senator running for re-election in 2020". A poll shows him losing by eight points to a generic Democrat.
- And in Arizona, astronaut and Democratic challenger Mark Kelly and far-right-wing Republican senator Martha McSally are TIED 44-45!

But, also says the site, "...Republicans Are Favored". So, we need to flip 4 Senate seats in 2020, that's all. To read more, click here.

The U.S. Nuclear Regulatory Commission (NRC) collected public comments from March 30, 2018 through July 30, 2018, to determine the scope of the NRC's environmental review of an application from Holtec International for a consolidated interim storage facility to be located in Lea County, N.M. The NRC's scoping process included six public meetings to solicit public input regarding the scope of the environmental review. The NRC has prepared a scoping summary report which addresses comments received during the scoping period. To read it, click here.
