Before an "h" the vowel is lengthened, so "ihm" is pronounced eem.

Before a single consonant, the vowel is lengthened as in Tot, dem, Mut, Flut.

Before a double consonant, the vowel is shorter as in Gott, Bett, iß.

Careful with den (dane) vs. denn (den), wen (vane) vs. wenn (ven).

## Consonants

The same as in English with the following exceptions:

The voiced consonants b, d and g are unvoiced at the end of the word, so are pronounced p, t and k respectively.

- ch Like "k" at the beginning of words such as Christus, Chor
  Soft like the "h" in Hugh after these vowels: ä (mächtig), e (echt), ei (weich), eu (euch), ie (riechen),
  ō (mōchte), ū (Bücher). Also after all consonants, e.g. Kindchen, Kirche, Grübchen
  Gutteral "ch" after these vowels: a (Nacht), au (auch), o (Tochter), u (suchen)
- g Pronounced like the soft "ch" when it follows an i: König, Gerechtigkeit, otherwise hard like "gold"
- j As the English "y"
- I Always made with the tip of the tongue on the back of the teeth
- ng Like the English word singer, never with a hard "g"
- qu Is pronounced "kv" as in quicken (kvicken)
- ß Called an esszett, it is always pronounced "ss"
- s At the beginning and in the middle of a word is pronounced like the English "z", at the end always like "ss".
- sch As the English "sh": Schule (shooluh), Englisch
- sp Almost always "shp"
- st At the beginning and in the middle of a word, like "sht." stehen (shtayen), verstummen (fairshtummen)
  At the end of a word like the English "st": Geister (guy-ster),
- v As the English "f"
- w As the English "v"
- z Like "ts", as in Pretzel, Pizza
