## Lifetime Genetic Health Guarantee



### **Seller's Responsibility:**

1. Michelle and/or Allie Hall (DBA Bernese Mountain Railway), hereafter referred to as Breeder, does hereby certify that to the best of her knowledge, the dog sold is in good health and has current vaccinations. Breeder guarantees the puppy is in good health, has had, as a minimum, its first two rounds of immunizations and has been de-wormed. The Buyer has 72 hours from time of pickup to take the puppy to a licensed veterinarian for a physical examination. If the puppy is found to be in poor health, the Buyer has the option of returning the puppy to Breeder, at Buyer's cost, for a full refund. The Buyer will provide to Breeder a written statement from a licensed veterinarian clearly stating defect or illness. If the puppy is not taken to a licensed veterinarian within the 72 hours from time of pickup, this health warranty is void.

2. Breeder provides this lifetime warranty against the following debilitating genetic disease: Degenerative Myelopathy (DM, SOD1A & SOD1B) and Von Willebrand Disease Type I (Type I vWD, VWF). In the unlikely event this dog exhibits symptoms suspected to be caused by one of these debilitating genetic defects, the Buyer must supply any requested veterinary records to Breeder within 72 hours of informing Breeder of the defect. Breeder has the right to require a second opinion from a veterinarian of the Breeder's choice at the Breeder's expense. If the puppy is euthanized or in any way disposed of, without a second opinion from the Breeder's veterinarian of choice, the Buyer waives all rights to a replacement puppy. This genetic disease warranty entitles Buyer:

a) This dog will be replaced (if less than 30 months old) by a puppy of equal value or be refunded if another puppy is not available within 12 months (excluding any/all additional travel / shipping costs, vet supplies and veterinarian costs). Affected dog must be returned to Breeder at the time of replacement.

b) If the dog is 30 months or older, Breeder will reimburse Buyer for medical costs equal to amount up to the adoption fee paid for the dog. Affected dog must be returned to Breeder at the time that reimbursement is collected.

3. Breeder warrants that this dog will remain free from Severe hip/elbow Dysplasia. The dog must have an x-ray Buyer's licensed Veterinarian, to confirm the diagnosis and must be documented by the OFA foundation and the results be sent to Breeder's vet.

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## Health Guarantee



a) If this dog is documented by OFA to have severe dysplasia, this dog will be replaced (if less than 30 months old) by a puppy of equal value or be refunded if another puppy is not available within 12 months (excluding any/all additional travel / shipping costs, vet supplies and veterinarian costs). Affected dog must be returned to Breeder at the time of replacement.

b) If the dog is 30 months or older, Breeder will reimburse Buyer for medical costs equal to amount up to the adoption fee paid for the dog. Affected dog must be returned to Breeder at the time of reimbursement collection.

4a. This warranty does not include viral illnesses, infections, hypoglycemia, Clostridium, Coccidiosis or Giardia. These conditions will be ruled out during puppy's veterinarian visit to receive health certificate. If any of these conditions present themselves during puppy's health certificate Veterinarian examination, treatment protocol will be administered and documentation will be made.

4b. This warranty does not include hernias (such as umbilical cord hernia). This condition will be ruled out during puppy's veterinarian visit to receive health certificate. If this condition presents itself, during puppy's Health Certificate Veterinarian examination, treatment protocol will be administered and documentation will be made.

4c. This warranty does not include improper bites. If this condition presents itself during puppy's health certificate Veterinarian examination, documentation will be made and Buyer will have the option to continue with the purchase of puppy with this known condition excluded from this guarantee or have the puppy adoption deposit/reservation fee rolled to our next litter.

4d. Buyer agrees to submit the name & contact information of their Veterinarian to Breeder within 72 hours of submitting a puppy deposit/reservation fee. Failure to do so will void this warranty.

5. This Health Guarantee does not include any illness due to the ingestion of foreign objects, food, chemicals or physical injury after pickup.

6. In the unlikely event a licensed Veterinarian determines the dog suffers from a condition caused by a genetic disorder,

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the Buyer must supply any requested veterinary records to Breeder within 72 hours of informing Breeder of the defect. Breeder has the right to require a second opinion from a veterinarian of the Breeder's choice at the Breeder's expense. If the puppy is euthanized or in any way disposed of, without a second opinion from the Breeder's veterinarian of choice, the Buyer waives all rights to a replacement puppy. This genetic disease warranty entitles Buyer:

6a) and the dog is less than 30 months old, the Buyer has the option of a replacement puppy from the next available litter. Initial dog must be returned to Breeder. Shipping fees will not be refunded, & if it becomes necessary to ship a replacement puppy, those fees are to be paid by the Buyer.

6b) if the dog is 30 months old or older, Breeder will reimburse Buyer for medical costs equal to the adoption fee originally paid for the dog. Affected dog must be returned to Breeder at the time of reimbursement collection.

7. If the dog should die from a suspected congenital defect, an autopsy must be performed at the Buyer's expense by a licensed veterinarian acceptable to the Breeder's own veterinarian. If the autopsy shows a congenital defect as the reason of the death, the Breeder will provide another puppy to the Buyer. A written statement from the Buyer's Veterinarian must be provided. If it becomes necessary to ship a replacement puppy, those fees are to be paid by the Buyer. This warranty is void in the event of an undetermined or inconclusive diagnosis.

8. Buyer is required to maintain lifetime health insurance coverage on this dog, with a maximum \$1,000 deductible, or this warranty is void.

9. Breeder agrees to submit, on behalf of Buyer and with one of Buyer's two name choices, AKC Registration for puppy with the first 26 Characters being, "Bernese Mountain Railway's..." This is for Full AKC Registered Puppies sold, ONLY.

10. No warranties or guarantees, expressed or implied, are made under this contract except as stated.

11. This warranty is non-transferable.

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### Buyer's Responsibility:

1. The Buyer bears all costs relating to the sale of the above animal, including transportation. The risk of loss or injury to the above animal is on the Buyer at all times after the dog leaves the seller.
2. Buyer agrees that Breeder is not responsible for any harm the puppy may do to property or individuals, including but not limited to, biting, scratching, spreading of any sickness or disease (including humans).
3. Because of the variety and quality of dog foods available (and not all canine illnesses are covered by vaccination), Breeder requires puppy/dog be kept on puppy food provided by Breeder at time of pickup/transfer until replacement dog food is recommended by Buyer's Veterinarian. Buyer agrees to keep puppy/dog on dog food recommended (and documented) by Buyer's licensed Veterinarian. Deviating from this policy will void this health guarantee.
4. The Buyer agrees to keep their Bernese at a healthy weight, documented annually by a licensed veterinarian. Veterinarian weight documentation to be kept for the lifetime of the dog. Deviating from this policy will void this health guarantee.
5. The Buyer agrees to make and keep annual veterinary appointments for their Bernese, keep all immunizations current according to the guidelines of the American Veterinary Medical Association, and properly administer heart-worm preventative medication.
6. The Buyer agrees to postpone strenuous, repetitive exercise until after their Bernese is over one year of age by following the Puppy Culture Exercise Guide posted on the last page of this document.
7. Before puppy's first birthday, Buyer agrees to complete with their puppy the AKC S.T.A.R Puppy Testing and/or AKC Canine Good Citizen Certification (or equivalent, as agreed upon between Buyer and seller) and provide documentation of this completed training. Failure to complete this training will void this warranty.
8. The Buyer agrees to never tie-out (tie up or chain) puppy/dog or to place the puppy/dog in a shelter, pound, similar facility, or research laboratory.



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9. Buyer and Seller agree that the Dog is being sold "as-is" with no warranties made by the Seller unless otherwise stated in this Agreement.

10. Buyer agrees to submit balance of puppy's adoption fee prior to puppy being released from Breeder to Buyer and must be paid in full before puppy reaches 9 weeks of age. Buyer further agrees to claim puppy from Breeder between 8 weeks and 9 weeks of age. Delayed pickup/delivery/shipment will result in an additional \$25 per day boarding fee, payable in advance. Additional Boarding arrangements, beyond 8 weeks of age, must be made before puppy turns 8 weeks old. Breeder must agree to an additional boarding term, prior to puppy turning 8 weeks old. All additional Boarding Fees are payable in advance of the puppy reaching 9 weeks of age.

Puppy Adoption Fee includes Free Delivery for distances not greater than 750 miles (one way) from Breeder, in Clark, WY. No delivery or pickup before 10 am.

### Buyer/Seller's Adoption Agreement:

Full Registration is \$500 Refundable Holding Fee (less \$125 Administrative Fee) plus an additional \$3,500 due prior to the puppy leaving with Buyer or before Breeder delivers/ships puppy. Full Registration is Reserved for Male Puppies, ONLY.

Limited Registration is \$500 holding fee (less \$125 Administrative Fee) plus an additional \$3,000.00 prior to the puppy leaving with Buyer or before Breeder delivers/ships puppy. Failure of Buyer to have puppy neutered/spayed between 18 months and 24 months voids all guarantees and warranties.

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Because training is vital for all pets, large breeds especially, before the puppy leaves the home of the Breeder, Buyer must submit to Breeder an emailed copy of the Certificate of Completion for Jane Messineo Lindquist's (Puppy Culture Director) newly released, 2nd additional, puppy video series, "With Open Arms and a Level Head" or an Equivalent that is approved by Breeder. Failure to document the completion of this training series will void this warranty.
