The club visited the nearby Ronald Reagan Presidential Library to view the Dead Sea Scrolls exhibit. The rooms were kept dark to protect the scrolls.
























The club held an administrative fundraiser called "Burgers and Bingo" featuring Elvis that raised \$500 and was a lot of fun for all.

Casa Pacifica

Vice President Jerry Westby was out today, so incoming Vice President Kathy Smiley stepped up to introduce today's speaker, Jess Page, the Development and Community Engagement Coordinator for Casa Pacifica, a local non-profit provider of mental health services to children. She shared general information about Casa Pacifica and current activities.

Casa Pacifica's mission is to nurture

mental health and well-being of children, young adults and families to help them realize their full potential. Jess pointed out that the country is in a youth mental health crisis, with one in five teenagers seriously considering suicide.

Casa Pacifica helps young people with a variety of programs including residential treatment, foster youth support, and school-based mental health services. Their approach is relationship based, with counselors providing the stability and guidance children need. They even have three therapy dogs and a horse at their residential facility near Cal State Channel Islands.

Casa Pacifica serves a geographic area stretching from San Diego to San Luis Obispo County. They support nearly 2,000 youth and families every year and most of their clients are teenagers or preteens.

Individuals served by Casa Pacific go on to achieve independence and personal stability in society. Our guest today, Nicolas Villarreal, is an example. He

lived in the Casa Pacifica residential facility for six years. Counselors there helped him to nourish his talent and interest in art. He has recently graduated from Moorpark College with an AA degree in Studio Art and will be attending Cal State Los Angeles to further develop his skills and prepare for a fulfilling career and productive and stable life.


