City Hall Update

Jerry Westby was back in the fold this week to introduce the program speaker, none other than our distinguished member, City Councilmember Bob Engler.



Our own Kiwanian and Councilmember Bob Engler gave us an update on projects in Thousand Oaks.

Bob filled us in on the latest from City Hall.

He started with finances. The largest source of revenue for the City is sales tax, with about 34% of the total. Ventura County has the lowest possible sales tax rate (although individual cities can add to the tax rate within their jurisdictions; Thousand Oaks has not) at 7.25%. This low tax rate helps draw customers from other counties.

Property tax is a relatively small share – about 4%. When you pay your property taxes, most of the proceeds go to the County and the School District.

Police services is the largest single item in the City's General Fund budget – about 34% of our revenue is devoted to that service.

Bob also showed slides of various development projects in the construction or planning stage. These are primarily higher density residential projects, typically apartments, with a retail mixed use component on the ground level. The

City is excited that Amgen has recently renewed its long-term commitment to the City as its headquarters and has announced a \$600 million expansion plan. The company is happy that many new housing projects are under way, because lack of housing supply has been a deterrent to recruiting and retaining employees, let alone expanding the workforce.




