Bob Engler reported that the re-scheduled Key Club Fall Rally is set for January 24th at Magic Mountain. Chaperones welcome.

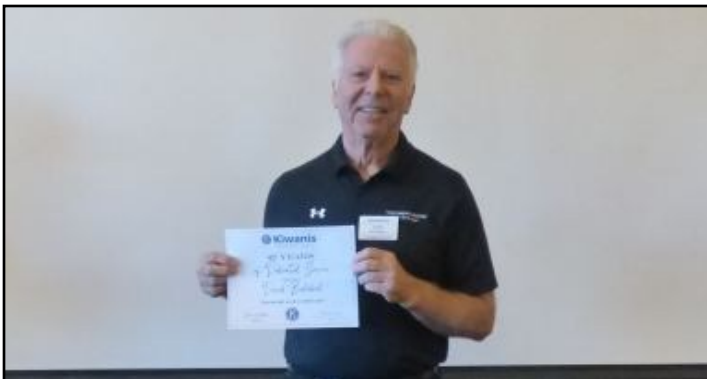

Bee Careful

Vice President Kathy Smiley introduced our program speakers, Danny and Mary White, who educated us on the topic of beekeeping. It was a fascinating presentation. The Whites live in Conejo Okas on a large lot with numerous fruit trees in decline due to neglect by a previous owner. The Whites got the trees back to good health and noticed a plethora of bees pollinating the trees. The bees lived in a hive next door and when that was removed by their neighbor, the Whites noticed that the fruit harvest from their own trees declined substantially.

This got them interested in bees and the role they play in local ecology. They decided to start their own hive and joined the Los Angeles County Beekeep-

ers Association to help learn how to do it. Danny showed pictures of the hives they built, the tools they use to maintain the hive, and how honey is extracted. Mary donned a beekeeper's outfit and showed us the tools up close as she walked around the room.

They also discussed "life in the hive" and the organization of the colony. It's top down from the queen, who can lay up to 2,000 eggs a day. She is attended by select worker bees. Other worker bees – all females – tend and guard the hive and the eggs before they hatch. Male bees are drones who are fat and lazy.

Wear white if you approach a hive. If you wear dark clothing, the bees will interpret you as a bear and launch an all-out assault.

At the end of the presentation the Whites donated two bottles of their hon-

ey for auction. Jeff Ellis and Lori Olbrich each paid \$25 for a bottle.

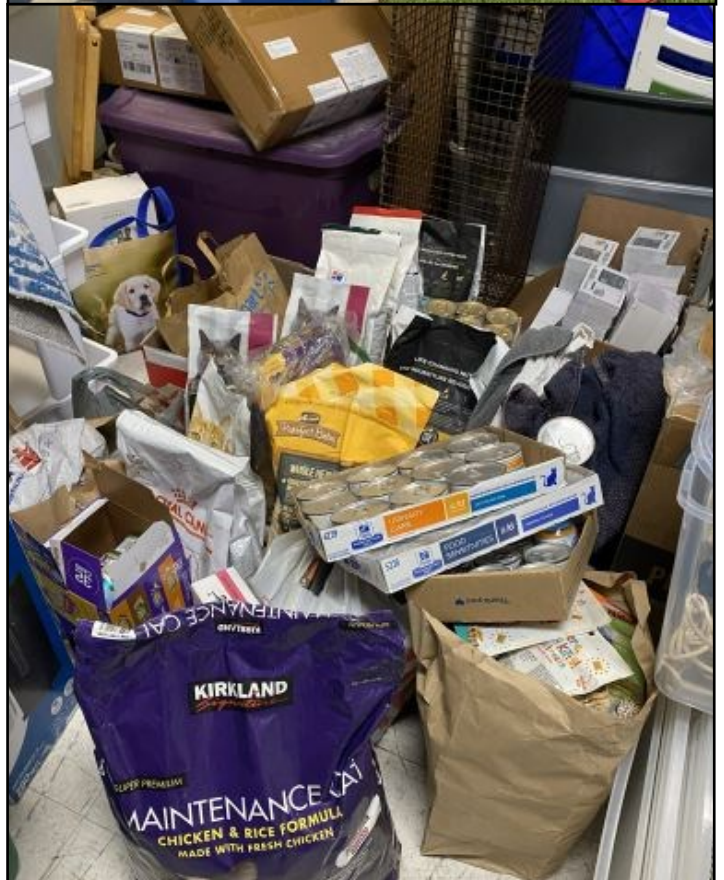

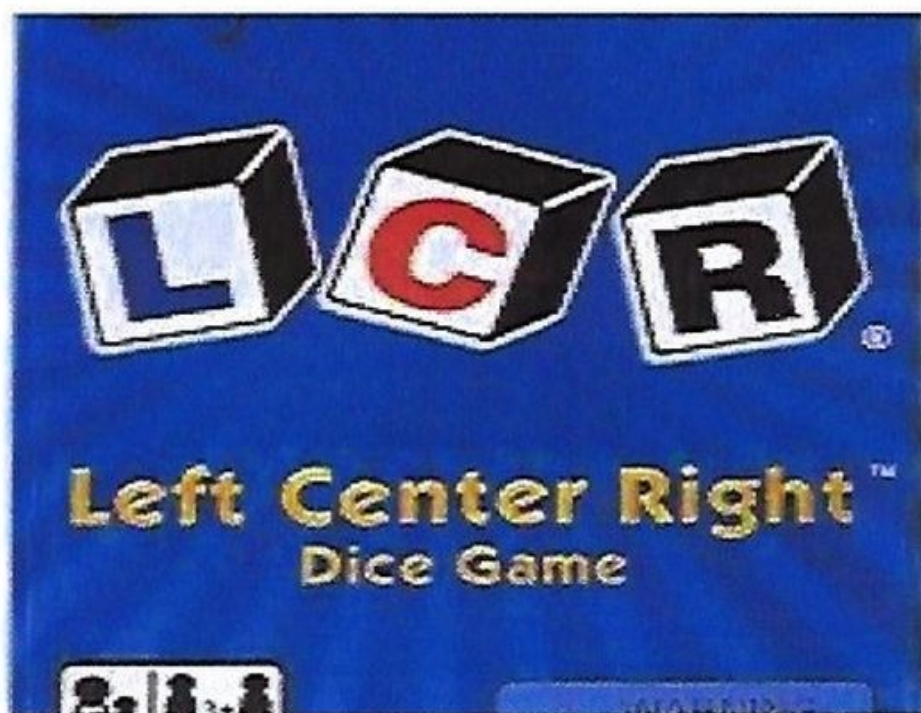
