

HAISLA HEALTH CENTER



Kitimaat Village, BC | Haisla Nation
\$5.6 million | 767 m² (8 250 ft²) | Completed 2022

The Haisla Health Center is in Kitimaat Village 45 kilometres south of Terrace.

The building form with a gable roof matches the Haisla's traditional long houses and the buildings width and roof slope allow for a second-floor storage space.

The building is designed for visiting health professionals and includes a large community health room, physiotherapy room, community kitchen, bathing room, two treatment rooms, dental room, and administration offices. The building is arranged into three separated areas: public, treatment and administration.

There are 8 columns in front with the 8 Haisla clans painted on them and a center carving by Sammy Robinson.

SKEETCHESTN HEALTH CENTER



Savona, BC | Skeetchestn Indian Band
\$3.5 million | 505 m² (5 440 ft²) | Completed 2020

The Skeetchestn Health Center is located along Hwy #1 50 kilometres west of Kamloops, BC. It will be the first building in a new development along Highway 1 near the existing Big Sky Gas Station.

The buildings floor plan is in a U-shape. The health treatment is in one wing and the other wing is for health administration. In between the two wings at the front is the entrance with a community health room.

YAQAN NUKIY HEALTH + ADMINISTRATION



Creston, BC | Yaqaan Nukiy (Lower Kootenay Band)
\$5.9 million | 990 m² (10 600 ft²) | Completed 2021

The form of the Yaqaan Nukiy Health + Administration is intended to represent the Kootenai or sturgeon-nosed canoe. The Kootenai canoe and the method of its construction are important to the community.

At the center of the building is a oval shaped meeting room representing the sweat lodge with glulam columns that gradually slope inward supporting an eye shaped skylight.

KWIKWASUT'INUXW HAXWA'MIS HEALTH + ADMIN



Gilford Island | Kwikwasut'inuxw Haxwa'mis First Nation
\$2.3 million | 252.0 m² (2 710 ft²) | Completion 2023

Gwayasdums Village is a remote boat access only community on Gilford Island. The village has a rich history, and the new building will be placed next to the existing Big House on the waterfront. The form and structure of the Kwikwasut'inuxw Haxwa'mis Health + Administration was derived from the traditional Big Houses in Gwayasdums Village.

YUNESIT'IN BED + BREAKFAST



Stone, BC | Yunesit'in Government
\$600,000 | 253.2 m² (2 725 ft²) | Completed 2021

Yunesit'in is one of the six communities within the Tsilqot'in Nation. Yunesit'in is located approximately 105 km West of Williams Lake, 8 km South of Hanceville.

The Bed and Breakfast has 3 bedrooms and 3 bathrooms available for guests, and a full one-bedroom suite attached. It will accommodate primarily staff, consultants, work related contractors associated with Yunesit'in Government, but also begin targeting and attracting a tourism market.

The Yunesit'in Bed & Breakfast was completed in October 2021.

T̂SILHQOT'IN NATIONAL GOVERNMENT



Williams Lake, BC | Tsilhqot'in National Government
\$1.4 million | 177 m² (12 700 ft²) | Completed 2018

The Tsilhqot'in National Government comprises of the following six First Nations located around Williams Lake: Tl'etinqox (Anaham), Tsi Deldel (Redstone), Yunesit'in Government (Stone), Xeni Gwet'in First Nations Government (Nemiah), ?Esdilagh (Alexandria) and Tl'esqox (Toosey).

The TNG purchased the Kwaleen elementary school, closed in 2013, and a portion of it was renovated into offices for the Tsilhqot'in National Government Treaty Negotiations. The second phase will involve upgrading the remaining classrooms and gym for youth and educational programs.

URBAN SYSTEMS (FORT ST JOHN) RENOVATIONS



Fort St John, BC | Urban Systems
\$500,000 | 576.7 m² (6 200 ft²) | Completed 2018

The Urban Systems Fort St John's office expanded to occupy the entire building.

The existing office had lots of offices and was redesigned with open office spaces. To break up the wide-open office space feel planters, wood screens were addition to create zones. A folding red meeting table was placed in-between two open areas again breaking up the open floor plan.

T̂SIDELDEL HEALTH CENTER



Redstone, BC | T̂sidedel (Alexis Creek) First Nation
\$3.7 million | 465 m² (5 000 ft²) | Completed 2021

The T̂sidedel Health Center is in the Cariboo Chilcotin near Redstone 2 hours west of Williams Lake.

The T̂sidedel Health Center is designed for visiting health professionals and includes a large community health room, community kitchen, two exam rooms, treatment room, two-chair dental clinic, bathing room, pharmacy, counselling office and administration offices.

The building is arranged into three separated areas: public, health treatment and administration. The front public end of the building with community health rooms, kitchen, washrooms will have the ability to be open after hours for community health programs.

CHILCOTIN RIVER TRADING



Alexis Creek, BC | Tl'etinqox (Anaham) Government
\$2.92 million | 316.4 m² (3 400 ft²) | Completed 2021

The Chilcotin River Trading is located in the Cariboo Chilcotin near Alexis Creek | hour west of Williams Lake.

The building consists of a grocery store, café and gas station, commercial card lock and a small RV campground. The grocery store will include fresh produce, baked goods, meats, refrigerated and frozen goods. The café will sell traditional First Nation soups, sandwiches, and bannock developed by Chef Paul Natrall from Mr Bannock and also serving Spirit Bear coffee.

The roof extends at the front of the building creating a covered canopy on the south side of the building which has many purposes: it provides a covered entrance, provides solar shading and creates a covered space for a farmer's market for local farmers.

AHAMINAQUUS WATERFRONT DEVELOPMENT



Gold River, BC | Mowachaht Muchalaht First Nation
\$2.4 million | 312 m² (3 360 ft²)

The Ahaminaquus Waterfront Development is located in Northern Vancouver Island along Bute Inlet, at the end of Gold River Highway 28, 100 kms west of Campbell River.

The old Ahaminaquus village site will be developed into a RV campground with a clubhouse located near the Mowachaht Muchalaht First Nation dock. The clubhouse will be a small store with all café gift shop and a cultural room displaying the rich history of the Mowachaht Muchalaht First Nation.

Construction of the Ahaminaquus Waterfront Development is to start in 2023.

TS'UUBAA-ASATX CAFE



Lake Cowichan, BC | Lake Cowichan First Nation
\$3.2 million | 418 m² (4 500 ft²)

The Ts'uubaa-asatx Café was envisioned to be a water front café/restaurant on the shores of Lake Cowichan. The design mimics the traditional cedar plank long house building and will have large cedar planks varying in height from 2'-5'. As the guests enter the building there will be a 2' wide by 7' long traditional cedar feast dish in the seating area. The seating area will be fully glazed to allow the visitors to enjoy the view of Lake Cowichan. There will also be a 20' carving on the exterior in line with the entrance on the exterior lower level

TS'UUBAA-ASATX HOUSE OF CULTURE



Lake Cowichan, BC | Lake Cowichan First Nation
\$3.6 million | 586.7 m² (6 315 ft²)

The Ts'uubaa-asatx House of Culture will be a community cultural center for the Lake Cowichan First Nation. The Lake Cowichan First Nation is at the edge of the town of Lake Cowichan 30 minutes west of Duncan on Vancouver Island.

The Ts'uubaa-asatx House of Culture will consist of a band office, health center, 2/3 gymnasium with mezzanine and a cultural display at the main entrance.

SEYEM' COMMERCIAL DEVELOPMENT



Maple Ridge, BC | Kwantlen First Nation
\$2.0 million | 371.6 m² (4 000 ft²)

The Seyem Commercial Development is the first phase of a large commercial development located along Lougheed Highway in Maple Ridge. The building will be a gas station, convenient store, fast food restaurant and a liquor store.

The design is based on the Kwantlen First Nation's traditional Plank House dwelling structure. The covered gas station island pump structure is wood and will include Kwantlen First Nation Carvings.

TS'UUAA-ASATX MIXED-USE DEVELOPMENT



Lake Cowichan, BC | Lake Cowichan First Nation
Budget to be determined | Size to be determined

The Ts'uuuaa-asatx Mixed-use Development will be a mixture of market residential, independent living and commercial retail units. The amenity spaces include a gym, adult swimming pool, children swimming pool, hot tub, lounge and bbq area.

This development will be located near a health center and a waterfront restaurant, marina, canoe rental.
