Windsor Presbyterian Church continues to offer new and exciting forms of worship music, from choir, to cello, piano and organ accompaniment, to occasional hand drums and percussion instruments.

Choir Returns to Regular Rehearsals

Our choir has resumed in person rehearsals this year, and have had a wonderful time reconnecting with each other, and singing for worship monthly and on special occasions. ### Parish Associate by Cindy Ray

As the year began, I was beginning to look toward the possibility of being ordained. There were a number of obstacles, but in May I came before the Presbytery and answered questions. It was a moment of real joy. They seemed to be so happy for me, too, and it was a long time in coming.

It was a little hard for us to come up with just the right date, but on October 8 the ordination took place. It was a spirit-filled event, a moment of real joy for me. I don't quite know how to describe it.

David Ewing, who used to serve at Dallas Center and who was a mentor for me for several years, came from Wisconsin to preach. The event was an outpouring of love that was healing for me. I sometimes have a sense that I may not be lovable, but the love poured out was wonderful and affirming.





Rev. Nathan Williams loaned me a stole that his father, Lynn, had loaned him at his ordination when the one ordered for him had not arrived. It was an honor to wear it, and it gave me a sense of connection, as Lynn was the chair of the Committee on Preparation for Ministry when I first began my journey. Later Lynn became a mentor for me. He was present at the text study that I led as my Bible exam.

During the year I did a number of pastoral phone calls, and I intend to increase that number in 2024. It is, I think, rewarding for both the person I call and for me. I will visit people when possible, but calls can cheer them, too.

My friend, David Hammel and I began playing and singing at nursing homes last January. He also sings with a barbershop quartet, and when one of its members became a "snowbird", we filled some engagements they had booked and decided to continue with some of our own. We performed 39 shows last year. I had played a fair amount for nursing homes in the past while living in Lawrence and some in Leon, and I just love doing it. This is the first time I have performed music regularly with someone else.

This year I will plan to make more pastoral calls. I really enjoy making them, and I will be more conscientious about them. I love helping with worship, and I look forward to serving in worship in any way I can. My writing must become more disciplined, so it can serve the congregation in some ways. I expect to write more of the worship liturgy and to improve upon it as well as my preaching.

I plan to preach from time to time, and I have booked two preaching engagements with Dallas Center. I think it is important to participate in activities that can promote peace and justice. To this end, I would like to find a way to do more in prison ministry. I really long to serve God in any way I can, and I will be intentional about listening for what God is calling me to do.

I want to thank Windsor for the opportunity to serve God as an ordained pastor. Windsor's belief in me is deeply appreciated, and I will try every day to do more and to serve God wherever I am called.





# Belonging and Christian Education by Angie King

Our Windsor family had many opportunities in 2023 to gather for learning, camaraderie, growing in faith, and just plain FUN! Your Discipleship Team gives a big shout-out to all the folks who participated, shared, discussed, supported, argued, encouraged and laughed together.

Presbyterian Women Growing in Faith and Service

Presbyterian Women rearranged the calendar and decided to meet March through November instead of September through May. We traded winter months for summer months since getting around in the winter causes problems for many of us. We still meet on the third Saturday of the month from 10:00-11:30 and have between 14-20 women who attend. Everyone is welcome!

Our study this year was called "Love Carved in Stone." It was an extraordinary exploration of the Ten Commandments, leading us to look at these sacred words in much deeper and more meaningful ways apart from the usual literal interpretation. For example, do not use the Lord's name in vain certainly doesn't just apply to cursing, which is what most of us would think. It also applies to using the Lord's name for personal or political reasons to pursue a particular agenda. The study's author called this "making mischief". Another example is the Commandment to not commit murder. This doesn't mean just the act of taking another person's life. It also refers to "murdering" someone's spirit, or self-esteem, or dignity. Each of the lessons opened our hearts and minds to a much deeper understanding of these Ten Words. All of the participants unanimously felt that this study was truly exceptional. Just ask them!

In March, we will begin our fourth year with a curriculum entitled "Sacred Encounters: The Power and Presence of Jesus Christ in Luke and Acts." Like all the PW lesson books, this one is written BY women, FOR women, which offers us a more personal look at our faith from a woman's perspective.

The generosity of our PW group was abundant last year as we collected \$88 for the Least Coin Offering and \$273 for the Thank Offering. These offerings are used for grants to fund projects nationally and internationally that seek to improve the social, economic, and educational opportunities for girls and women.


#### Adult Sunday School Explores Wired Word

A Digital Transformation

Our website, <u>www.windsorpc.org</u>, has gone through a noticeable transformation in the past year and a half. In collaboration with our communication shepherd, Natalie Steenson, I drafted a Design Style Guide and Windsor Playbook Checklist to add more definition and consistency to Windsor Presbyterian's "brand" —how we communicate and what people feel when they visit in-person or online.

Natalie took these building blocks and ran with them to make Windsor's voice and digital presence come to life. Reorganization of site topics, relevant key words, beautiful imagery with vivid descriptions behind the scenes to make our content easier to find and understand, along with consistent colors and use of our logo are just a few ways our digital platforms work to give voice to the warm presence of being the church together.

Do you Hear What I Hear?

Sometimes the answer to that is no. Our dated sound system has caused speakers to short out, mics to misfire and Zoom worship to be inconsistent right when we are trying to come together to worship, remember and celebrate. We have a dedicated team of volunteers that work every Sunday to make our worship experience interactive and accessible, however it involves many manual steps and takes several people to run.

That's when new members **Tracy Miksell-Branch** and **Craig Branch** stepped in and introduced us to Brain Dobson, a sound engineer with a fantastic range of audio experience across the metro and with many well know venues. He agreed to consult with Windsor on the audio presentation needs unique to our space and vision, as well as help us with the installation. What a blessing!

A few of us met with Brian earlier this year to walk through our Sanctuary and current set up. Afterwards we pulled a Technology Committee together to discuss initial scope and his recommended equipment list.

- "Phase 1" sound system needs will include expanded options for wireless mics, in ear monitoring systems and Pan, Tilt and Zoom (PTZ) cameras. It would also replace our antiquated analog sound system with easier to use, control and learn digital interface and software.
- The committee presented a budget ask for Phase 1 technology enhancements for the sanctuary. We proposed funding this upgrade using the Memorial Funds earmarked for such a purpose, and Session gave us the go ahead.

We met again with Brian at Windsor after the new year to do one more walk through of the space before preparing our final priced equipment list, then I'll help coordinate the order and installation plan.


We have seen exponential usage of our website in the last quarter of 2023. We average around 500 visits to our website a month, but in December we had nearly 1400 visits! Congratulations!







- Windsor Weekly is issued every Tuesday with current weekly church events, and featured events/mission outreach with graphics and details. Dwight's photographs from weekly events/worship are be posted as well.
  - Printed Weekly Church Events: each week we print the detailed church events from the Windsor Weekly and post them inside all of our building entrances and the hallway bulletin board for members and building visitors.
- Mini Churchmouse Monthly Newsletter is issued each month with a look back and a look forward at all that's happening at WPC. It features a "to the flock" letter from Shamaine, financial information presented in graphs, monthly calendar, and any Committee or Session report that needs to be highlighted.
- Quarterly Sacred Moments Newsletter is issued quarterly and has a
  growing following and interest in contemplative writings, poetry,
  scripture, music, photography and art. You can find our Sacred Moments
  Online Library on our website at the bottom of our Worship page. These
  are beautiful writings to spend time reading and sharing with others.

## Outreach: Mission and Generosity by Beth Schmitz



The accomplishments of Mission and Stewardship in 2023 are due to a committed team who leads and the support of the congregation as well as many volunteers. Thanks to everyone for your contributions and for being a part of a small group doing mighty and wonderful things in the local community and the larger world.

Providing Monthly Meals Through CFUM

In 2023, Children and Family Urban Movement (CFUM) continued to be a strong mission project for us under the guidance of Linda and Jim Newsom. We provided 150 meals (100 adult and 50 children) each month on the first Thursday of the month. For a few special months, we were able to do this in person and I know each of the volunteers particularly cherished that opportunity and look forward to a time when we can deliver this mission and these meals in person again. In December, a \$10 gift was included with the meals. Linda and Jim Newsom are supported by many volunteers and donations. It is a program we will continue to support through the coming year. Thank you to Jim and Linda for all your time and talents in leading this mission and to all the members who have contributed in some way to the success of this program.

**Amazing DMARC Food Pantry Contributions** 

We continued our participation with the DMARC Food Pantry, making a total contribution of over \$11,000.00. This was up significantly from previous years and from our goal of \$5,000.00. We raised a phenomenal amount during some special food pantry offerings, such as Souper Bowl Sunday and in honor of mothers and fathers. The DMARC contributions continue to reflect the generosity of our members and our commitment to addressing the issue of food insecurity in the local community. We have set the goal for DMARC contributions at \$5,000.00 again this year and there is no doubt that we will reach and exceed it again.

Our Community's Food Insecurity Needs

We also continued assisting our community in Windsor Heights with our small food pantry and another one just west and across the street from the church. Members are donating non-perishable food items at a level that allows us to support the little food pantries and replenish the food in them. Replenishing them is required almost every day which means that we are really meeting a need in our community. Several members of the congregation participated in the Second Annual Short Hike for Hunger through our neighborhood in October. We also received a Harvest Grant \$1,000.00 from the Presbyterian Church to use in our efforts to address food insecurity in this area.

**Presbyterian Special Offerings** 

Special offerings were taken for **One Great Hour of Sharing**, **Pentecost**, **Peace and Global Witness**, and **Christmas Joy**. We gave generously and now have some seed money to consider projects related to children and peace in our local community.

Neighborhood School Support

In addition to these financial offerings, we gathered supplies and clothing to support back to school and winter clothing needs for children in our neighborhood schools of **Windsor Elementary** and **Cowles Elementary**. We also provided 350 bottles of water to Windsor Elementary in support of their Field Day in May. Gardening and weeding was done in the gardens at Cowles school again this past summer. Thanks to Rich Teig for heading this project and to Jody Cox for her participation. In December, we provided gifts for a family at Windsor Elementary. Thanks to Rich Teig, Linda Newsom, and others for their active role in helping to get materials to the school.





Salvation Army Bell Ringing Tradition

Several members joined together to ring bells for Salvation Army on December 9, 2023. And we contributed a total of \$4,500.00 to 18 worthy organizations to help in their service to our community. We also sent \$7500.00 to the PCUSA Mission. I am amazed and humbled by the good work this small church with a big heart does in the community. God is truly working through us to enrich the lives of others.

More Giving and Blessings for 2024

Our plan for 2024 is to continue the work we have committed to in the past and add new projects and organizations that allow us to expand the Outreach of God's Blessings to our local community and the larger world.

### **Building and Grounds** by Don Beeson

We have had quite a year to look back on and praise God for all that has been accomplished at our facility.

As a reminder to the congregation, our building has a 100 year old history dating to 1924, 1948, 1951 and 1958. There are 9 furnaces, 3 air conditioners, 6 electric control boxes and a very large roofing cover to be maintained.

Furnace Care and Fire/Smoke Detectors Updated

In January we had a furnace condensation line failure which resulted in a large amount of water into the basement kitchen; a short in one of the electric panels left us with two days without heating on the first floor.

Later in the year the company which monitors our fire/smoke detectors told us that the present units needed to be replaced as the reporting system needed an overhaul. This was a \$9,224.00 expense surprise but not the only one of the year.

Sewer Repairs and AC Concerns Addressed

A sewer line in the basement which was original cast iron had crack from "old age" and required replacement of some 20 foot of line.

Just as the tenant on 2nd floor, Girls Rock of Des Moines, was to begin their summer camps in June and July, the air conditioning of their classrooms failed due to electrical and cooling problems which required several days of uncomfortable temperatures.

Roof Replacement Project and New Fellowship Hall Door

On a very positive side of 2023, the Session approved \$26,250.00 replacement of roofing over East Hall which makes all of our roofing having been replaced since 2016. In addition, new exterior double doors replaced in Fellowship Hall, an expense of \$10,738.00.

Additionally the B & G Committee scraped and repainted the exterior of East Hall and repainted all the exterior doors in addition to care of lawns, trimming bushes, and the mundane housekeeping chores.

## **Budget and Financial Stewardship** by Richard Ankeney

2023 was a year of extremes for Windsor Presbyterian Church finances. We began the year with a request to fund a capital campaign drive to replace aging and damaged roofs and new outer doors for Ward Hall. We seldom ask for money, but circumstances required coming forward to ask for your help. Our congregation has a history of generosity, and after prayerful consideration you made the repairs and improvements possible.

#### Financial Faithfulness

Here are some examples of the congregation's faithfulness in 2023:

- \$153,090.67 General Contributions
- \$22,013.21 Mission Offerings
- \$49,550.00 Raised during the Capital Campaign Drive

**Operating Expenses Increasing** 

Another financial extreme in 2023 was the expenses. Despite the response during the campaign drive and generosity throughout the year, we needed to transfer \$14,968.20 from The Capital Account to the Operating Account to make up for the income shortfall. Paying the bills doesn't warm the heart in the same way as filling up the little food pantry or seeing the faces of the children when handing out meals at CFUM. However, our operating costs are increasing, and we need everyone's help so we can continue to thrive now and into the future.

Land Sale Brings New Opportunities

This brings us to the final and perhaps most important extreme of 2023, opportunity. Many years ago, several forward-looking members of the church saw an opportunity to provide for the church's future needs and purchased the properties south of University Avenue. Those properties provided income for the church for many years, and now with the sale of the property completed, a new chapter in the story of Windsor Presbyterian Church begins. After paying off the loans to purchase the three houses north of the church, we have approximately \$1,200,000 remaining. This money represents an opportunity for ministry and serving the community unlike any in the history of Windsor Presbyterian Church.

#### **Financial Priorities**

Last Spring the session examined an article about the traits of churches focused on Christ entitled, *Eight Priorities of a Healthy Church* by Karl Vaters (karlvaters.com). The article describes why emphasizing certain areas and behaviors results in a positive or negative outcome. The money God has entrusted to us represents not only an opportunity, but also a potential stumbling block. Please remember, the congregation is responsible for paying the bills. Construction costs, like most things, have increased since the decision to sell the property was made in 2016. To replace the income lost from the rental properties, several hundred thousand dollars will need to be invested.

A Legacy of Generosity and Stewardship Continues

We have inherited a 100-year legacy of generosity and stewardship. During construction our monthly bills will continue, and probably a surprise or two. Stewardship is more than being prudent with finances, it means directing our resources in ways that contribute to the church Jesus is building. Let's use this opportunity well.
