To the Flock . . .

Will You Follow? WPC Lent 2022

What an amazing church! When I saw the dates of the Israel/Palestine trip, I almost didn't sign up because Lent is a terrible time of year to be gone, especially the first two weeks, and even more so when your worship team decides to dig a little deeper than usual for Lent and Holy Week.

You showed up. I was able to watch a WOW and a worship service from my time away and I was blown away. Did you see the way the worship assistants and Natalie, Cindy and Jim so ably led the congregation in being in God's presence? And the **testimonies** the last four weeks have been holy and beautiful, precious and instructive. We have gotten to see each others hearts for God and for God's world.

I have loved these testimonies so much. They have not been easy for some of you to give, but you have shared your faith in such meaningful ways. The worship of God by the people of God—that is the way it is supposed to be. Thank you to everyone who has shared. The testimonies have added so much to our worship and our life together. I am convinced that testimony is an essential part of our community's life together.

This is good spiritual practice, not easy but transforming for

individuals and for us as a congregation. As we have learned about these spiritual disciplines, we have figured out that we will never master any of them, but if we are faithful, God will use these spiritual habits to change us more and more to reflect Christ's goodness and love into the world. At Windsor on Wednesdays, we have learned about these practices and tried out new ways of approaching prayer, service, generosity, and scripture.

In the next two weeks, we will learn about fasting and solitude, two of the less popular spiritual disciplines. If you are willing to share a testimony or have experience or thoughts about these, please let me know. The purpose of all these practices is to remind us of how much God loves us and to help us to put Jesus at the center and follow him in each moment of every day.

As we go into Holy Week, I hope that you will give yourself the gift of allowing yourself to fully experience the pain and difficulty of Jesus' last days, his crucifixion and his death. Follow him to the cross. If you only come on Palm Sunday and Easter Sunday, you miss the most important part of our scriptures and our faith. About a third of each gospel is devoted to the last 24 hours of Jesus' life. The worship team is putting together

beautiful services that will try to capture the drama of John's telling of Christ's passion.

Holy Week has always been the most important time in the church's life and I hope you will take the time to worship with us. **Palm Sunday** begins the week, remembering Jesus's triumphal entry and his sadness over what was coming. **Maundy Thursday** commemorates the *mandate* to love and serve as Jesus demonstrated by washing the disciples feet. Our Thursday evening worship will include communion and foot washing. **Good Friday** is

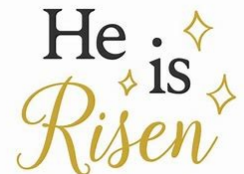
Presbyterian Women

Typically, only fathers are named in the "begats" (somebody begat somebody, who begat somebody, etc. etc. etc.). Sidestepping the customary formula, Joseph is listed as "the husband of Mary," and Mary is given the added phrase, "of whom Jesus was born." Our lessons about the "grandmothers" have been interesting and enlightening. Please join us.

Easter is a time of ultimate sacrifice that completely transcends our understanding, followed by the incomprehensible glory of the resurrection. Victor Hugo said, "The reappearance of the light is the same as the survival of the soul." Our Lord Jesus is the Light, and through Him, our souls survive.

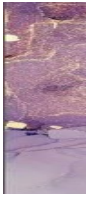

Mission & Stewardship - Rich Teig

Besides money donations for **DMARC Food Pantry**, 15 food items and 30 personal care items were donated and delivered in February. Government SNAP money is being reduced to the pre-pandemic levels in April. Depending on the family size and income level, this could mean a decrease by \$95 to \$230 per month. As a result, the Food Pantry is expecting that more people will be seeking food assistance. Your money donations will be appreciated even more.

In February, Windsor Presbyterian Church shared \$250 with **CROSS Outreach** and \$250 with the **Calvin Good Samaritan** fund. WPC continues to support local ministry agencies.

On March 3, WPC volunteers prepared 130 meals for **CFUM**. The weather was still cold on that day, so meals were left inside the Trinity United Methodist Church instead of being handed out on the sidewalk in front of the church.

During Lent we are collecting offerings for the PCUSA special offering called **One Great Hour of Sharing (OGHS)**. OGHS is the single largest way that Presbyterians come together every year for a better world. Around the world millions of people lack access to sustainable food sources, clean water, sanitation, education and opportunity. The three programs supported by OGHS – **Presbyterian Disaster Assistance**, the **Presbyterian Hunger Program**, and the **Self-Development of People** – all work in different ways to serve individuals and communities in need. From initial disaster response to ongoing community development, their work fits together to provide people with safety, sustenance and hope.

- ◆ **Presbyterian Disaster Assistance** has been providing assistance for refugees, and in 2020 provided \$3.5 million for COVID-19 response. This program is already helping refugees from Ukraine.
- ◆ **Presbyterian Hunger Program** has also been addressing food insecurity and other emergency needs due to the pandemic.
- ◆ **Self-Development of People** has funded 10 national partners and 3 international partners just between January and May of 2021.

An offering envelope for OGHS has been mailed to members and friends who attend WPC but is also available at the church. Please donate if you are able.

called good in the sense of it being holy. Some call it Holy Friday and it is traditionally observed with fasting, solitude, and penance. Our worship will be a **tenebrae service**, or a service of darkness where the whole story of Jesus' arrest to his death will be read from John's gospel.

Holy Saturday: We will have a service on Zoom on Saturday, that strange time between Jesus' death and resurrection. It will be a time to reflect on the cross and God's great love for us and all of creation. It will be a time to cry out and lament. It will be a time for quiet hope because we know the end of the story.

Please make time to come to these services. Without walking through the valley of holy week, Easter just does not make sense. Slow down, make time for God, spend time in prayer and reading scripture. In giving that time to God for worship, you will receive grace upon grace.

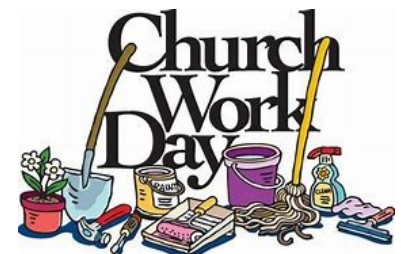

There has been some confusion lately so it is a good time for a reminder about how we handle non-church events in our building. Years ago, when I first came to Windsor PC, the session prioritized serving the neighborhood but was a little short on money and people. They did have a big, beautiful, underutilized building. **Recognizing that this is God's church and wanting to be good stewards of the resources God gave them, they decided to say yes to anyone who wanted to use the building at no charge.***

Anyone can use the building for free. If someone wants to make a donation, great. If they don't, that is great too. We only ask that they respect the building and clean up after themselves. If it is a group with no connection to the church, we will often try to have someone around to greet them, create relationship and make sure they know where things are and how to best clean up. So, if you know anyone who needs a place to meet, have an event, or get a group together, call the church office and schedule it! **Reservations must be made through the office, even for WPC events.**

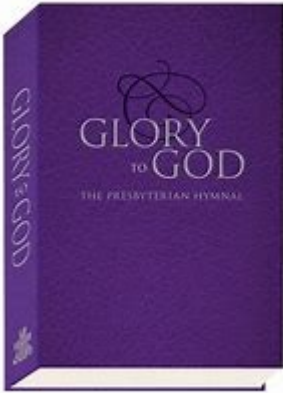

My Favorite Hymn - Krysta Tomes



This month Krysta Tomes shares one of her favorite hymns with us.

Morning Has Broken

My favorite hymn is *Morning Has Broken*, by turn-of-the-century children's literature author Eleanor Farjeon. It is also a favorite Windsor memory, from when we had a

children's choir. We'd wait in the back until it was our moment to process down the aisle, after a quick shake-down by our choir director, Bev, to make sure we were chewing gum free, and, if we were lucky, a follow-up by Rev. Ward with a hand-painted toy soldier.

The spring sunshine shone strongly through the stained-glass windows, and my siblings and I could pick out our mom sitting in a pew near the front. We thought it hilarious beyond measure the sun and stained glass gave her a punk hair dye job. And the song we sang as we came up the center was *Morning Has Broken*, which happened to be my mom's favorite.

Maybe she learned to love this beautiful spring hymn from Cat Steven's famous rendition. But I came to love it for it's simple lyrics, lovely traditional Scottish melody, and the spark of a warm memory.

Morning has broken, like the first morning.

What better harbinger of spring, of hope after a trying night, than this hymn?

Lyrics: Eleanor Farjeon, (born Feb. 13, 1881, London—died June 5, 1965, London), English writer for children whose magical but unsentimental tales, which often mock the behaviour of adults, earned her a revered place in many British nurseries.

The daughter of a British novelist and granddaughter of a U.S. actor, Eleanor Farjeon grew up in the bohemian literary and dramatic circles of London. Attending opera

and theatre at 4 and writing on her father's typewriter at 7, Farjeon came to public attention at 16 as the librettist of an opera, with music by her brother Harry, which was produced by the Royal Academy of Music. Her success with *Nursery Rhymes of London Town* (1916), simple tunes originally for adults but adapted and sung in junior schools throughout England, spurred her writing.
