

Budget & Financial Stewardship Richard Ankeney

The Operating Account had \$16,574.23 in total income for June, bolstered by general contributions in the amount of \$14,504.23. Operating account expenses were \$14,703.55, resulting in a net income of \$1,870.68. Capital account expenses were high, due to a one-time tree removal expenses of \$2,327.60 on the rental property located at 1134 63rd St., resulting in a loss for the month for all accounts of \$456.92.

The first meeting of the newly-formed Budget and Financial Stewardship Committee will take place when members are available.

Building & Grounds

The major accomplishment in July was that of meeting some sixteen discrepancies noted by the Windsor Heights Fire Department inspectors in their inspection of our facility in May. This was done almost single-handedly by Richard Ankeney, who truly has to hold a title to "God's multi-talented workman," in my opinion.

Among the items cited to be done included replacement and additional new EXIT signs, emergency lighting replacement, signage indicating electrical main switchboxes, replacing some fire extinguishers, and securing certification of safety for kitchen stove fire suppression and exhaust systems.

Numerous other requirements included removal of electrical extension cords, removal of anything in all stairwells which might hinder exiting from the building, and removal of materials in furnace rooms which might be of a flammable potential. All of these items have been completed or in the process of completion at this time.

What is disappointing to report regarding our previously scheduled workdays is that we had 5 members of the congregation available in June and 9 workers in July.

In prior *Churchmouse* issues, we have listed many projects that need attention and that all of us can do with no special training required! Our August workday is sched-



uled for August 13 from 9 a.m. to 12 p.m. Please come and enjoy working with other members of the congregation. Your efforts will be adding to the those who, in the past 100 years, have labored to bring us where we are today in

this multi-use facility that began in a basement built into a hillside in 1923.

Lastly, as you review the financial section of this newsletter, you will find that our church maintenance expenses have exceeded monthly projections. Building & Grounds expenses are necessitated by the very nature of our property ownership and equipment repairs. There is nothing that is new, but only required replacement or some items, such as a tree removal to protect property we currently own or equipment repaired.

Property Update


My last report to you was a verbal one at a church service some time in May. At the time, we were waiting to receive the final sales agreement. We did receive it, and since there were no appreciable changes in it from the Buyers' Letter of Intent, other than the addition of sufficient legal language to satisfy attorneys for both parties (buyer and seller), I proceeded to have three officers sign it for us and the President signed for the buyer. As of May 27, 2022, we have entered the due diligence period, whereby the buyer(s) has three months to satisfy themselves as to whether or not to proceed with the purchase. At the end of the three-month period, the buyer(s) may extend the due diligence time for an additional three months if they deem it necessary. When the due dili-

gence is ended, closing will take place within an additional two months. Therefore, the time before closing could be from five months (October 27, 2022) to eight months (January 27, 2023). As time goes along, we will try to prevent it from extending to the maximum length. As I have indicated, pertinent facts in the sales agreement are, essentially, unchanged from the Buyers' Letter of Intent. The most important one is that the original sales price that we (buyer and seller) agreed upon remains the same. That price is in excess of the latest appraised value of \$1,600,000. As additional information as to progress is reported to us, I will make that known to the Session and the Congregation.

My Favorite Hymn Cindy Ray





This month Cindy Ray shares one of her favorite hymns with us.

Now the Green Blade Rises

I truly love hymns, but this one comes to mind as soon as someone offers me the opportunity to write about it.

The tune is a 15th century

tune and is more popularly used in "Sing We Noel." It is considered a rare Easter carol. According to the hymnal, the allegory is that there is a parallel between Christ's death and resurrection and the rising of new grain after being long in the cold earth. It is likely based on John 12:24: "Very truly I tell you, unless a kernel of wheat falls to the ground and dies, it remains only a single seed, but if it dies, it produces many seeds.

The words were written in 1928 by the English author John M. C. Crum. The hymn is relatively simple to sing and filled with hope and love. I would recommend reading the words and contemplating on their beauty and the resurrection of our Lord.

Lyrics: Crum, John Macleod Campbell Born: October 12, 1872, Cheshire, England. Died: December 19, 1958, Farnham, Surrey, England. A graduate of New College, Oxford (BA 1895, MA 1901), Crum was ordained as a deacon in 1897, and priest in 1900. His works include: Road Mending on the Sacred Way, 1924; What Mean Ye by These Stones? 1926; The Original Jerusalem Gospel 1927; Notes on the Old Glass of the Cathedral of Christ Church, Canterbury, 1930; St. Mark's Gospel, Two Stages of Its Making, 1936.
