As I drove into the church parking lot this morning, the sun was shining brightly on the empty land across the street. Though the clearing has been going on for weeks now, the starkness took me aback. I saw nothing but sky. The trees are gone. The houses are gone. I had to look away, as my throat tightened and I fought back tears. It hits me hard—our congregation no longer owns the property across the street—and I realize I am grieving the loss of the land. I wonder if you are grieving it too.

### A Time of Change

While I am filled with sadness, I am genuinely excited about the future. I am eager, almost impatient, to see what God will do with the land, with our congregation, and with the neighborhood in this time of change. I try to imagine

- the beautiful variety of people who will make their homes in the new apartments,
- the community that can be formed there,
- the difference our church can make in our neighborhood as it changes,
- who our neighbors will be and how we can try to know them and be a
  positive presence in their lives,
- a parking lot to better support our ministries,
- how our congregation will grow and change....

#### **Making Space for New Beginnings**

Right now the expansiveness of the land is a big, beautiful, blank canvas, full of possibility and making space for people to have brand new beginnings.\* It reminds me that long before Des Moines, Windsor Heights, or our church were here, this land was home for plants, animals, and many indigenous people. Historically this area was home to the loway or Baxoje nation. Furthermore, we believe this and all land truly belong only to God. So we give thanks to God and those who came before.

God was so faithful in providing the resources of that land for the congregation. It gave them places to park, income in the form of rent money, a place to play and worship outside, and the community-forming-responsibility of caring for the houses and yards. I think of the people who struggled with the decision to buy the homes, who raised the money, who repaired and readied the homes, and who took care of the business of renting. I think of the people who made those houses their homes through the years.

#### A Legacy of Gratitude and Faithfulness


A few years ago, the congregation began to sense that owning the rentals was no longer serving them well. Around that time, the city and developers began to inquire about our willingness to sell the property. Then one after another, the 3 houses adjacent to the church became available for purchase. It seemed as if God was up to something. So, now we are getting ready for what's next. Even now, in the second century of being a congregation, God is doing new and exciting things. Join me in praying God's ongoing guidance and that we will continue in the legacy of gratitude, faithfulness, persistence, hope, joy, and loving service that brought us this far.



beginning Wednesday, January 10, 2024


