

The last few weeks our corner of the world has transformed from pandemic precautions to vaccinated gatherings. It is incredible! People are able to meet for lunch, the Arts Festival is happening and we are getting ready to gather for worship. I cannot wait to worship God together!

The last couple of weeks, we have tried some different



things in the sanctuary to see what works with Zoom.

The first week was pretty rough and the second week was even worse! The good news is that we're learning quite a bit about what doesn't work and what we need to do to make worship available online. This is a fantastic opportunity to stretch as a congregation and expand our worship offerings.

Here is what we know:

- 1) we want to be in the room together, and
- 2) we want to include those who can't be in the room.

We may do this using Zoom, a live video feed, or a recording posted online. We know for sure that we need better internet in the sanctuary and that we will need to be flexible as we experiment and try different things.

We will also need patience, honest feedback, and grace for ourselves and each other. And we will need prayer, lots of prayer. Like many churches, we are in a time of great transition. Not only are we returning to in-person activities, but we are also trying to discern and follow God's will as we make big decisions about our land and the future mission and ministries of this congregation.

Please, please pray for our congregation in this transition. Pray that we would be open

to God's leading and that those who see us would glimpse God's kingdom—a



community defined by our love of God and our neighbors. In the midst of all the

division around us (and we are more divided than ever), Jesus calls us to be known by our love—not by our political affiliation, or our opinions, or our right-ness, but by our love and grace, our humility and service to others.



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
Christian Formation - Angie King

We are currently negotiating with them as to the terms of the extension. The City of Windsor Heights and the lowa DOT are concerned about the proper installation of turning lanes in and out of the property on both University Avenue and 63rd St, respectively. As soon as we have more information, we will provide it to you.

We may be at the Arts Festival on June 27 for the Habitat for Humanity build. Then on July 11 we are planning an outdoor worship at Jester Park in a shelter house. Dwight and

Jayne will be serving lunch and beverages. Please RSVP to them if you plan to stay for lunch. Other summer plans will be announced at a later time.

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The Mission Team met on May 19 to discuss possible new mission ideas. One idea was to assist neighborhood elementary students who will need warm clothes or school supplies this fall. A counselor at Cowles was contacted. She said the school has another source for clothes, but they may need some help with other fundraisers. She added that a real need at this time was someone to weed and water the student gardens. There are 17 raised bed gardens, plus a butterfly garden and a prairie. Each class had one of the 17 gardens to plant veg-



etables. The vegetables will be donated to homeless shelters or food pantries. Jody Cox and I have been assisting with this for the past couple of weeks and will continue until the students return at the end of August.



As of the end of May only \$70 was received for the **Pentecost Offering**. We are hoping that some more will be donated in June. Remember that 40% of the offering stays at WPC. Food Pantry donations have also been below budget, but I am confident these donations will pick up.

WPC volunteers continue to prepare 100 meal sacks each month for **CFUM**. Some regular volunteers were not available on June 3, but others stepped in to prepare and distribute the food in front of Trinity Methodist Church, 8th and College. When school resumes, there will likely be a need for more meals. Thank you for the food and money donations, as well as the volunteer time.



Another new mission idea that was discussed at our team meeting was to have a book sale and ice cream social in late August or September. At this time, we expect to be wearing masks in the church building. So, in order to eat ice cream sundaes, we would have to be outside. If we are able to have this activity, we will want to encourage others in our neighborhood to join us.

General contributions in May were above budget by \$2,372.67, and total income was above budget by \$1,316.00. Expenses in May were \$757.08 above budget, leaving \$558.92 in net income for the month.

Although total income for the year is off by \$5040.34 after a difficult January and February, lower than expected expenses and the generosity of the congregation has resulted in a net income loss for the year to date of only \$946.14. Thank you!

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Building & Grounds - Don Beeson



We have had limited use of our building, as you all know, and with the successful spring cleaning, repairs, and replacement normal to usage, our committee's efforts have been looking forward to considering what WPC activities might be after we have returned to inperson worship. After some 15 months where we have met remotely using ZOOM, most members are anxious to return in person. However, we know that ZOOM enabled several non-members, as well as our own, to participate, and those folks may wish to continue to do so. This is a good opportunity for us to reach out to others in our community.

The City of Windsor Heights plan for University Avenue street improvement program has reached our properties. It will create some additional traffic flow changes on a temporary basis to the access of our large parking lot across the street, but also to a lesser extent to the close in church parking. It reminds us that many things change, which may be at the moment chaotic, but all for the best in short order. Folks across the street have been given permission to park at Nations Green while their driveways have been dug up.

Several of our committees are in the process of meeting our own needs, such as Dwight working with outside specialists to improve Internet access to all areas of the building. Dwight, Ron and Angie have been exploring how we might improve and expand our sanctuary sound system. Angie has been in conversation with organizations specializing in exterior signage. All of their efforts work toward how we might better serve our community.

We invite members of WPC who have ideas on how we may add to our efforts to meet the needs of others in our community to please share them with us now and as we begin to return to regular in-person worship and celebration to gather.

Centennial Year Celebration Opportunities

We have a truly remarkable opportunity ahead in 2022. Historically, our congregation was formed by fam-



ilies gathering informally for Sunday School in January of 1921. As attendance grew by December 14, 1922, formal Articles of Incorporation were drafted to form Windsor Community Church with 26 Charter Members. Within a short time, May 11,

1924, an affiliation with the Presbyterian Church of U.S.A. was completed.

Beginning in January 2022, we will be looking ahead to a 2nd century of providing worship, fellowship and service within and throughout the Windsor Heights area. Considering what we have been through these past 18 months, as well as what our church 100 years old has seen, shared and done, IT'S TIME TO CELEBRATE TOGETHER!

Currently, a written history has been in process and will be available shortly before the end of this year. Members and friends are now asked to consider how we might celebrate the first 100 years, i.e. possibly an open house with displays illustrating the multiple art talents of members of our congregation. Certainly there will be fellowship with cookies, cake and coffee, which is definitely a Presbyterian tradition. Previously for the 25th, 50th and 75th anniversaries, there were sit-down dinners. However, there are other ideas that we hope will make us all very proud to continue into the next 100 years.

Prepare ye for *Godspell*, a modern-day retelling of the New Testament parables this summer in a tent outside the Des Moines Playhouse. With a Tony-nominated score of songs ranging in style from pop to vaudeville, including the hit song "Day by Day," composer Stephen Schwartz (*Wicked*) brings to vibrant life the timeless messages of kindness, tolerance, and love.

Godspell is one of those musicals that makes you think, "Huh, that's not your average Sunday School lesson." A group of actors, who you would mistake for audience members, hear an actor singing "Prepare ye" and the story takes off from there. The music and dance is electrifying and ranges from Broadway to pop to hip hop.

But the heart of *Godspell* is parables from the Bible that talk about love, kindness, and acceptance. The idea of "doing unto others" especially hits home after a year with a pandemic and so much division and hate.

Godspell is based on the Gospel of Matthew. From the opening to stories of "All Good Gifts" and being the "Light of the World," it is a message that still speaks to us today. As the show ends, the cast, having created a community, carries Jesus' teachings out into the world.

The show starts at 7:30 p.m. on Thursdays through Sundays on July 9-11, July 22-25, and August 5-8. Group tickets are available.



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My Favorite Hymn - Nancy Baker

You can write it yourself or talk to Ann McGowan in the office and she will write it. This month Nancy Baker shares two of her favorite hymns with us.

Follow the Gleam

Did you have a favorite song from your church youth group days? Mine was "Follow the Gleam" and remains a favorite to this day, both the tune and the words. In 1920, Sallie Douglas, a teacher, attended a YWCA conference at the Silver Bay Association at Lake George in New York's Adirondacks. There was to be a song contest. Douglas, who had written a few songs, composed the tune and met Helen Hill, a Bryn Mawr College student, also at the conference, who wrote the lyrics. And they won the contest.

The title comes from the last line of a Tennyson Arthurian poem. I like how it ties in with the Light (Jesus), bringing the dawn and the challenge we still face today, 100 years after the song was written. It became a favorite to sing at many conferences and camps, especially for youth.

Hymn of Promise

On June 6 of this year, the hospice where Keith spent his last earthly days held a butterfly release. As we picked up the containers of two, we were handed a copy of the "Hymn of Promise," written by Natalie Sleeth.

Natalie Wakeley (1930-1992) was an American composer. She was born in Evanston, IL. In 1934, she began to study the piano at the early age of 4. In 1952, she earned a BA in music theory at Wellesley College in MA. She married the Rev. Dr. Ronald E. Sleeth.
