## Highlights from Glacier Study Leave

The views—what an incredibly beautiful place! Everywhere you look there are snow-capped mountains, crystal blue lakes, and unbelievable geological formations. Each day we witnessed an unending rainbow of wild flowers and were able to see wonderful wildlife—birds, black bears, grizzlies,

marmots, mountain goats, big horn sheep, and lots of other critters. The late spring, com-



bined with all the snow and rain that came down while we

were there, created rushing streams, swollen rivers, uncountable waterfalls, so many rainbows and stunning displays of shadow and light.

Early in the trip we had the privilege of having a conversation with Greg, a member of the Blackfeet Nation, who shared with us some history of his people and the area. It was fascinating, heartbreaking and hopeful. Then our guide, Pastor Miriam, introduced us to her friend. Rev. Calvin Hill, a Navajo who is serving a congregation in Browning, MT. He is a holy man. As we talked and he shared his story with us, we become friends. Under his leadership, his congregation is working to instill hope and direction in the people. Through ranching, the arts, and feeding the community, they are teaching people to be able to connect with the land, support themselves and

the community, and have hope for a future. Both of these conversations were holy ground.

Many things on the trip were not as we expected. The facilitator, Ryan, learned when he disembarked from the plane that his house in Atlanta had been struck by lightning and caught on fire. He needed to go home. This changed many dynamics of the trip. In his absence, I led the slower group of hikers on the what turned

out to be the only long hike we were able to take. It was a gift to help them do more than they thought they could do.

The true gift of the trip was the time for group reflection. One of the best reminders of the trip was that when you are slogging through the mud, rain or snow; laboring up switchbacks; or carefully making your way down the trail, one of the most important things you can do is stop and look up. It is easy to get caught up in all the muck and all that needs to be done, the tasks at hand and the difficulties in your path. But the true beauty happens when you stop and look at all the gifts God is giving us. ## Evangelism: Don't make resolutions, create habits

Written by diverse authors in the PC(USA), the eight habits of evangelism were identified by the Rev. Drs. Ray Jones and Kathryn Threadgill, respectively the director and associate director of the Presbyterian Mission Agency's Office of Theology, Formation & Evangelism.

They began praying about this new resource in November 2019. Within a few months, the COVID-19 pandemic that swept the world began exposing the many inequalities of race and economy within the U.S. As Jones and Threadgill listened to God, they began identifying the habits of evangelism:

- Worship
- Generosity
- Justice
- Radical welcome
- Sacraments
- Teaching
- Prayer
- Fellowship

For Jones, the number one question for the church is: "How are we forming people who act, think and speak like Jesus?" He believes these habits provide a way for congregations to go deeper into their relationships with God, with their faith community and with people outside their faith community.

"It's not a program that is going to take us into our future. It's about how we show up in our neighborhoods with love and justice and hope," Jones said. "It's truly going to be in meeting the needs of people around us that we will find ourselves living into what it means to be the body of Christ."





The Giveaway grew out of the awareness that the children of low and no income households are most affected by the poverty their families' experience. The BEST way to get kids out of the poverty cycle is through education.

For every \$15 you donate, a child living in poverty can receive a backpack filled with grade-appropriate school supplies. Supplies and backpacks will be given to 1,200 children through our newest partnership with DMARC and their 14 partner food pantries throughout the Greater Des Moines area.

### **Helping the Wrongfully Convicted**

A legal division at Drake University is taking steps to help some of the most underrepresented clients in the state — wrongfully convicted people. Drake's wrongful convictions clinic is in the process of joining the *Innocence Network* - a prominent non-profit organization that helps exonerate people using DNA evidence.

lowa has only had 16 exonerations since 1989 — a number Erica Nichols Cook, director of the clinic, believes should be higher, especially with the availability of DNA evidence technology.


In 2021, the Midwest Innocence Project was examining 389 potential wrongful conviction cases in Iowa. Iowa is one of 13 states that has never overturned a case using DNA evidence, despite the technology's drastic improvement in recent years.

Ruth Hardin says, "I am is so proud of Elaina and what she is doing. For several years she helped me/ Crossroads of Iowa. First, as classes would allow, Elaina provided classes inside the Polk County Jail. Then, she provided support groups to women inside Fresh Start Women's Center. Now as time allows, she provides computer support and is on the Crossroads Board of Directors."

## My Favorite Hymn

This month Coralee Meusburger shares one of her favorite hymns with us.

### Open My Eyes, That I May See

"Open My Eyes, That I May See" has been one of my favorite hymns since I was a young girl. I am not sure why back then it meant so much

to me, but it has continued to be a favorite as I have grownup. It brings back memories of sitting in church with my aunt and uncle. My parents never went to church, but they made sure we went to Sunday School. As I got older, I would stay for church and sit with my aunt and uncle. I had pins that I received for 11 years of perfect attendance beginning when I was in first grade. Unfortunately, I am not sure what happened to them. I know I had them for a long time, but I don't have them now.

This hymn was written by Clara H. Scott in 1895. The first woman to publish a collection of her own anthems, this author/composer has created in this hymn a sung prayer for illumination. It not only asks God to help us understand scripture but also prays for the strength and courage to make God's love known to others.

#### Coralee

Lyrics and Tune: Clara Harriett Fiske Jones Scott, 1841-1897. Born at Elk Grove, IL, daughter of a farmer, the family moved to Chicago in 1856. Clara enrolled in the first Chicago Musical Institute, after it opened it in 1858. After graduation, she found employment at the new Lyons Girl's Seminary in Lyons, IA. While working there, she met Henry Clay Scott. The two married in 1861 in McGregor, IA. They had two daughters, Medora and Mary. The family moved to Austin, IL, near Chicago in the 1870s. She become a composer, hymnwriter, and publisher. She was the first woman to publish a volume

of anthems, 'The Royal anthem book' in 1882. In 1897 she was returning to her friend's house after attending a funeral in DuBuque, IA. She was driving a horse-drawn buggy with two friends. The buggy's hold-back strap snapped, spooking the hose, who raced forward, colliding with a coping stone, causing the buggy to roll. Clara and Martha were thrown out and both died instantly. Clara's funeral was well-attended by music writers, teachers, professors, publishers, and friends.
