To the Flock . . .

We are headed into summer and the season of Pentecost where we remember and celebrate the coming of the Spirit to empower, guide and be a constant presence for Jesus's followers and for us. It is also the season of summer, which sometimes means gearing down, but in the summer of 2021 it means gearing up, getting ready for what comes next.

Stephen has been using the tagline, "The comeback is always stronger than the setback," to get ready for the Des Moines Art Festival this year (June 25-27, Western Gateway Park—and yes, you should go!). He has it written on a card, which sits front and center on his desk, where I often work and lead worship on Sunday mornings. Though it is their slogan, the words have been an inspiration to me as we get ready to come back to church. We have had so many setbacks this year, but God is with us and I am excited to see how the Spirit will guide us and grow us during this season. Things will not be the same. We won't return to *normal*; things will never go back to the way they were, but we will enter into new ways of being God's community of love and grace into the future. Here are some of the things we are doing to get ready for the comeback:

Pentecost Festival: The worship team had a wonderful afternoon of worship, crafts, snacks and games planned. We started the day with a few folks having lunch together. Then we celebrated worship with Ankeny PC and First Arabic Presbyterian to accept the confirmation class into membership (see p. 8). It was so good, and a little strange, to be together. Afterwards, we had crafts, snacks

and games, but most of the crowd headed for the air-conditioning. So it didn't last too long, but it was great fun to be together! A huge thanks to the worship team (Jody, Heather and Donna) for getting the supplies and organizing all the fun.

Opening the Church: Speaking of worship, we are really eager to get back into the building! Lots of folks are working to get ready for the transition back into the sanctuary. We are targeting mid-July, but want to make sure that we have the technology in place to offer online worship options to include everyone who wants to worship with us (see pg. 4)! To protect the most vulnerable among us, we will start out with more precautions and hopefully loosen up as the guidance evolves. Smaller groups are welcome to meet in the buildinghand washing, masks and distancing are encouraged for all indoor gatherings (CDC guidance). If you would like to help us with the plans to reopen, please let me know. We need a few more folks helping with audiovisuals and technology, and getting everything ready.

Sale of Property: From the beginning, we knew the contract to purchase our land had a six-month window (with a three-month extension option) for the buyer to find out whether the site would actually be suitable, infrastructure could be put in place, and permits would be obtainable for their project. We are nearing the end of that extension and should know if the contract is going forward by the end of June (see page 6).

Summer Rest: Summer is a time for rest, relaxation and recharging. At WPC, we will be backing off some of our programming this summer (see p. 2). We are open to keeping

Choir Tone Up will not be held weekly during the summer. Instead, it will be held on June 2, June 30, and August 4.


No WOW or EvenSong this Summer

It was great to see several WPC members in person at the Pentecost Festival in Colby Park. We received 9 food items and a check for the Food Pantry.

So far this year we have exceeded our **One Great Hour of Sharing** goal of \$1,500 by \$205. The **Pentecost Offering** total will be reported next month. Our congregation has generously supported special offerings and the **DMARC Food Pantry**. Our Food Pantry offerings are currently almost \$400 under budget, but I am confident we will catch up.

This year the DMARC Food Pantry marks the 45th year since being started in the basement of Central Presbyterian Church. The Food Pantry Network has grown to be the largest in the state, involving 14 partner pantries and more than 30 mobile pantries. Last year the pantry served over 58,000 separate individuals/families. Due to the pandemic, the numbers were down at stationary pantries but up at mobile units. Some government pandemic food benefits are now ending.



Unfortunately, food insecurity persists. While shopping in Des Moines grocery stores, you are likely to see red barrels at the exits. The food donations in these barrels are delivered to the DMARC Food Pantry. When we go back to in-person worship, you can donate food or dollars anytime, but especially on the third Sunday of

each month. Money donations do go further since the Food Pantry can buy food from the Food Bank or USDA for far less than it would cost in a grocery store. If you do donate food, the three most needed items are whole grain cereal, peanut butter and fruit canned in its

own juice.

Our next **CFUM meal** is **Thursday**, **June 3**. We meet at the church around noon to prepare. Last month was the first time since the pandemic started that we were able to serve the meal in person. We are still preparing sack lunches at this time, but we are able to hand them out ourselves instead of giving them to the staff.





Building & Grounds - Don Beeson

We met on ZOOM April 16 to discuss the completion of Spring Clean-up and various upcoming needs of WPC that will need attention in the near future.

Currently the phone lines are in process of replacement to better provide internet connections and building telephone access. The expectation is that this project will be completed by Century Link by the end of May. We are anticipating to begin in-person sanctuary service with a target date of mid-July. We understand that mask and separation of space will be required therefore we will provide masks, sanitizer, and anything else for the congregation's protection.

The committee also discussed how we can reach out to our community to provide support in a mission endeavor using the talents, skills, space, etc. we have to offer. Please contact our committee with your thoughts and suggestions. Finance & Personnel - Richard Ankeney

The month of April proved to be a good "springboard" month for Windsor. The Operating Account showed Net Income of \$2,300 and was that much over budget. Total Income (\$13,814) was \$400 over budget while all categories were positive.

Total Expenses (\$11,488) did even better, being \$1,900 under budget. Office Expenses broke even with actual versus budget, but all other categories were well under budget.

The Capital Account showed no income and a small amount of expense.

A recurring payment withdrawal plan has been set up with MidAmerican Energy for the monthly gas and electric bill. Similar arrangements are planned for water and garbage collection services.



An online giving option is being established through the Presbyterian Foundation. The fund will be administered by the Finance and Personnel Commit-

tee. An announcement will be made once the fund has been established.

Update on Sale of Property South of University Ave.

On Tuesday, May 18, we received a request by the buyer to extend the closing of the sales contract for another 30 days to June 17, 2021. This was granted in accordance with terms as set out in the original contract, which was signed September 14, 2020.

The sales contract stated that the closing date would be March 19, 2021. The buyer made a down payment of \$15,000 at the time of the signing. The contract also provided that three, 30-day extensions could be requested by the buyer if all conditions and contingencies were not satisfied for closing by any of those dates. The first extension date was April 18, the second was May 18 and the third is June 17, 2021. If the buyer is not satisfied to close as of June 17, the down payment of \$15,000 becomes non-refundable to the buyer, and either party may, in writing, terminate the agreement. If, however, both parties wish to extend the agreement beyond June 17, further negotiations will be necessary. We have been informed, unofficially, that the unsatisfied conditions and contingencies involve mainly location of turning lanes and entry and exit lanes to the property and, do not, for the most part, involve Windsor.



Josh McKenna



On June 20, we invite you to commemorate World Refugee Day in a way that is most appropriate for your community and respects your relationships. Join the global chorus honoring those in refugee situations by:

- recognizing the courage and resilience of refugees;
- <u>celebrating</u> the positive impact refugees have on U.S. communities;
- calling for peaceful resolution to conflicts around the world that cause so many people to become refugees and internally <u>displaced</u>;
- working to create welcome and safety in countries of refuge and transit; and
- working within our churches, our communities and with our elected leaders to expand the welcome that we extend to refugees and immigrants who are our neighbors.

Throughout June, the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.), Church World Service, and other ecumenical and interfaith partners will be offering educational events.

World Refugee Day is also a reminder to share concerns regarding refugee resettlement and asylum policies. In the near future, PC(USA) will provide a new postcard and Action Alert for you to download and use to contact your representatives. In addition, Refugee Council USA's Advocacy Toolkit is updated every year and helps guide visits with members of Congress during their August Recess. There are even tips on how to visit your elected officials virtually!

June 20 falls on a Sunday this year and July 5 is Immigration Sunday in the PC(USA). If you are still worshipping online, you might consider using this video prayer* by Valery Nodem as part of your prayers that day.



A reminder I go from ¾-time to ½-time for the months of May-August and typically take a family vacation in August. As we return to worship and as we plan for the fall, we want to put our best and most creative energies into living into the future mission and ministry to which God is calling us. Let me know if there is something you'd like to try this summer or fall.

Youth: We value our children and youth but haven't always had much for them because of our small numbers. Though I'm not sure what it looks like, the confirmation class has shown me that we can and must do more for the young people of our church and our community. Though I'm not sure what it is going to look like, it is a huge priority for me and us in the coming season of our life together.

Help us, like the trees, lift our heads into the wind and face it with enthusiasm, courage, and open arms.


Guide our hands and our feet as we figure out what is next, and be with us through it all.

I, the Lord of Sea and Sky (Here I Am, Lord)

A special hymn is "Here I am, Lord." When singing this hymn, It seems as if I have direct access to God.

Daniel L. Schutte is an American composer of Catholic liturgical music and a contemporary Christian songwriter best known for composing the hymn "Here I Am, Lord" in1981 and over 150 popular hymns and Mass settings. Schutte grew up in Elm Grove, Wi, and graduated from Marquette University High School before entering the Society of Jesus. His compositions are primarily written for Catholic liturgical use, but, over time, have found their way into Protestant worship.

Life's Railway to Heaven

Another that has meaning to me is "Life's Railway to Heaven," because many, many years ago, my grand-mother sang this hymn to me. She also provided the words that I wrote down. It's an "oldie" and we sang it once in church during a hymn sing.

Members of the Western Writers of America chose the song as one of the Top 100 Western songs of all time.

M.E. Abbey was a Baptist pastor in Georgia in the 1890s. He wrote the lyrics to a hymn based on the poem, "The Faithful Engineer," by William Shakespeare Hays. In 1890, **Charles D. Tillman** set it to music. He was a popularizer of the gospel song. He had a knack

for adopting material from eclectic sources and flowing it into the mix now known as southern gospel, becoming one of the formative influences on that genre.

This song has been recorded by Boxcar Willie, the Carter Family, The Oak Ridge Boys, Tennessee Ernie Ford, Patsy Cline, Merle Haggard, Johnny Cash, Willie Nelson, Brad Paisley, and many others.
